The grand May musical festival has come and gone, and Londoners enjoyed a rich musical treat. The festival was in every way a success, and its promoters have good reason to congratulate themselves. The attendance in the afternoon was smaller than the excellence of the programme and the reputation of the orchestra warranted, but in the evening, the spacious Princess Rink was filled by one of the largest audience that ever turned out to a musical event in London. THE SYMPHONY CONCERT.

The programme for the afternoon was, in the main, an unfamiliar one to London music lovers, but was nevertheless a most enjoyable one. The orchestra is one of the finest musical organizations that ever visited London, and well deserve the encomiums it has received from the press of the United States. Miss Mary Jardine Thompson, a young Canadian soprano, assisted the orchestra, rendering Gou-nod's valse "Romeo et Juliette," and Thomas' "Knowest Thou the Land," in a finished manner. Mr. Rogers' harp solo, the "Fantasie Characterisby Parish-Alours, was quisite in its fairy-like notes, and Mr. Hadley's 'cello solo, with orchestral accompaniment, was a fine rendition of Popper's "Hungarian Rhapsodie." 

Agreement Reached and Bill Passed Its Third Reading.

No Exclusive Rights Have Been Ceded to Russia by Corea.

London, May 22.-In moving the second reading of the Australian federation bill in the House of Commons Mr. Joseph Chamberlain announced that a complete agreement had been reached with the delegates on the lines of the government proposals. The bili, he added, would provide that the right of appeal to the privy council should be maintained in every case where other than Australian interests are concerned, but where Australian interests would be solely and exclusively concerned, the Australian legislature should adopt any course it pleased.

"The government also asks," said Mr. Chamberlain, "that words shall be inserted giving the right of appeal to inserted giving the right of appear to the privy council in every case in which both parties consent." After declaring that the result had been achieved by a discussion of the friend-liest nature, the colonial secretary read a letter from the Australian delegates expressing their satisfaction and thanking him for having secured so

satisfactory a result.

The bill passed its second reading amid loud and prolonged cheering. RUSSIA AND COREA.

The parliamentary secretary of the foreign office, Mr. William St. John Broderick, stated that the British government had leased a site for a coal depot and naval hospital at the treaty port of Masampho, in Corea. This port, he added, is open to navigators of all countries, and the landing and storage of supplies for the Russian fleet within the site just acquired is to be governed by the existing treaties there. Therefore no exclusive right was ceded to the Russian government, and the treaty right conceded to British subjects were not to be limited by the agreements recently arrived at. The government also understood that an agreement had been made by which Russia undertook never to ask for itself or its subjects any concession on the Island of Koji, or on any of the surrounding islands, and the Corean government engaged not to allow any other government to rent or purchase land in the localities indicated.

MATAAFA MAY REVOLT. Unofficial advices indicate that Germany is likely to experience trouble in dealing with the natives of Upolu and Savali, Samoa. Mataafa expected to be rewarded with the kingship after German sovereignty had been extended over the islands, and is very much disgruntled. No surprise would be ex-perienced if a revolt should occur.

CABLE NOTES. The Mansion House (London) fund for the relief of the victims of the Ottawa fire has reached \$50,000. A further remittance of \$100,000 was cabled from New York to Bombay, India, on Sunday, representing con-tributions to the India famine relief fund. This sum will be distributed by the inter-denominational commitof missionaries now in session a Bombay.

Electricity and Consumption.

In St. Luke's Hospital, New York, there is now being tested a recently devised treatment for consumption, the result of experiments conducted for some time past by Francisque Crotte. a French scientist. Physicians had previously discovered that the germs of tuberculosis could be destroyed by formaldehyde gas, but it was found almost impossible to introduce the gas into the lungs of diseased persons, as the breathing of it brought on paroxyems of coughing. Prof. Crotte, however, has discovered that by the use of electricity the gas can be driven through the tissues of the body and so into the lungs of the patient. Sponges filled with the gas and attached to the two poles of the electric machine are applied to the chest and back of the sufferer, and the electricity flows in a steady current through the patient's body, destroying afil germs with which the gas comes in contact. Prof. Crotte says his treatment will cure every case of consumption in its first stages; 75 per cent in the second stage, and 30 per cent in the third or so-called "hope-less" stages. 



Boers yelled: "Come out, you skulkers. Today we take Mafeking." Suddenly a Boer yelled: "Run! here are the Rooineks!" Nearly all fied. are the Rooineks!" Nearly all fied. Capt. Marsh opened fire from the fort on each side, cutting off and repulsing the main body of the Dutch, but driving the vanguard of about 150 into the native location which had been burned. The enemy broke into two parties, one being penned in the stone kraal, and the other hemmed in a hollow behind a koppe inside the outer defenses. They had no water, and but little food. Meanwhile, a strong party, estimated at 500, ran around the native location and reached the camp close to the railway. There they surclose to the railway, There they sur-prised, and after sharp fighting cap-tured, Lieut.-Col. Hore, Capt. Singletured, Lieut.-Col. Hore, Capt. Singleton and Veterinary Surgeon Dunlop Smith, who for a time were penned with 40 Boers in the offices of the British South African Protectorate. This position was covered by our forts. The Boers were called upon to surrender, but they refused, and the fighting was resumed for some hours. The Boers lost heavily. Finally two parties of the enemy surrendered, one party escaping. LAST DAYS OF THE SIEGE. Lady Sarah Wilson, in a dispatch from Mafeking, dated May 11, gives the final description of the final days of the siege: "As we near the end of the siege, conditions in this little town are perhaps becoming more cheerful. The rainy season is ap-parently over. The weather is splendid, and consequently the fever epi-demic is diminishing. Rations are still small, but it is wonderful how little one needs for existence, and the new food, brawn from horse and ox hides, is a great success. This food and porridge, the inventor of which has re-ceived a five-pound bonus from the government, is equivalent of six weeks' additional provisions. The natives pre-ferred it to any other, so that the slege has taught them a new food."

MANY MORE MEN FOR SOUTH AFRICA

London, May 22.—Six siege trains have been ordered to be prepared at Aldershot for transportation to South Africa.

The war office announces that eleven vessels will leave home ports during the next 30 days with 3,869 officers and men and 2,385 horses. The promotion of Col. Baden-Powell is generally expected to be followed by fur-ther honors, probably an important command, with a temporary rank of lieutenant-general. DECLINES TO INTERFERE.

Washington, D. C., May 21.—The state department has met the issue raised by the coming to Washington intenfere in behalf of the South African republics in the present struggle. In view of this announcement all questions as to the character of the recognition to be extended to the delegates and the sufficiency of their credentials dropped at once into the background. was, after all, of little moment whether or not the Boers were received as diplomatic agents or ministers, so long as they were powerless to promote the prime object of their mission, namely. "cause the United States Government to intervene to

bring about peace." The concluding paragraph of the secretary of state's reply to the Boer envoys is as follows:

"The president sympathizes heartily in the sincere desire of all the people of the United States that the war now afflicting South Africa may for the sake of both parties engaged come to a speedy close, but having done his full duty in preserving a strictly neutral position between them, and in seizing the first opportunity that presented itself for tendering his good offices in the interests of peace, he feels that in the present circumstances no course is open to him except to persist in the policy of impartial neutrality. To deviate from this would be contrary to all our conditions, and our national interests, and would lead to consequences which neither the president nor the people of the United States could regard with favor."

MURDEROUS MUTINEERS BE-HEADED.

The disposal of the wards or their rearrangement, which has been a matter of conjecture for so many months, was settled, at least for the time being, at last night's meeting of the city council, when it was decided to request the lieutenant-governor in council to divide the city into four wards, thus reducing the number of aldermen to twelve. During the discussion that preceded the settlement, a number of the aldermen made known their intention to oppose this decision, for various reasons. Some of them had previously signified their intention of favoring it, and Ald. Cooper had even moved that the reduction be made last year, but for some reason he had changed his opinion. Ald. Ross also was of a different mind last night to that in which he had been lately. However, the matter now stands with a motion passed to

Detective Egelton yesterday received an interesting letter from John A. Barnhill, a member of the force, now serving as a sergeant in D Battery of the Canadian artillery contingent in South Africa. Sergt. Barnhill wrote from De Aar Junction, Cape Colony, on April 15. "The life of a soldier on active service has its hardships," he says, "but I do not think we have yet had more than our share. We have been on half rations for some time while at Van Wyksvlei, and we were three days without water, except what we got from a pond caused by a three days' downpour of rain. It had to be well filtered and boiled before being used, and then we drank it at a risk of fever. The water we used for cooking was drawn about ten

"The country out here is almost all the same; very barren; in fact nothing grows but the karoo tree, which is only a shrub about the size of a currant bush, and covered with thorns."

Sergt. Barnhill had not, up to the time of writing, seen the first Canadian contingent. When at Greensport camp he met Private Charley Greene, brother of Policeman Harry Greene of this city and Private Bart Greene, of this city, and Private Bert Cole, wounded on outpost duty at Belmont, who was then returning to the front from Netley Hospital, England. Private Greene had gone down to Greensport camp with Lleut. Ma-son, of B Company, who was wound-ed in the fight with Cronje at Paardeberg. The Canadian artillery arrived in Cape Town the morning following the announcement of Kimberley's re-lief, and consequently did not participate in the celebration, but they were at Greenport when Ladysmith was re-lieved, and also when Cronje surrend-On each of these occasions

Sergt. Barnhill says, the blowing of whistles and the discharge of rockets and guns were continued until 10 o'clock at night. The next move of the artillery was unknown, and no person, not even the commanding officer, Col. Drury, would be made aware of it until the guns were on the road.
