### PROBLEM OF LIQUIDATING THE TURKISH EMPIRE IS ONE OF GREAT DELICACY

Any Way It Is Looked At There Is Breeding-Ground For Future Wars-Most Intricate Conglomeration of Racial and Political Interests-If U. S. Is Willing To Make Sacrifice Solution Will Be Simplified.

Paris, June 6.—Germany and Austria, having received their peace terms, remains now to settle the problems presented by the Turkish Empire, which has also collapsed and must be dealt with in Paris.

Turkey presents two distinct questions-the question of Turkey in Europe, which is minor so far as territory is concerned, but of supreme importance on the strategic side, because it includes Constantinople and the northern shores of the Straits, and the problem of Turkey in Asia, which is, or was, an empire, greater than Germany or Austria in area, with a population approximately that

The ultimate disposition of Turkey in Europe depends entirely upon the decision of the Paris conference. As to the future of Constantinople, if this city and the surrounding territories are to go to the natural heir, to the counwhat both will regard as the hinterland

### AFFLICTED CLAIM TO BE HELPED BY APOSTOLIC HEALER

Lays Hands On More Than One Hundred Persons.

PRAYS FOR THEM

Denies That He Possesses Spiritualistic Powers.

New York, June 6 .- James A. Moore Hickson, the Church of England laynan apostolic healer, who, however, distinctly disavows any power to cure save through the Biblical authoritative quickening of the faith, held a public meeting yesterday at Trinity Chapel, 18 West Twenty-fifth street, where he laid hands upon about 100 persons, mostly women, and uttered prayers for

None of his 'patients' claimed to have been cured after the meeting, but their faces were lighted as if by a new born hope and their steps, for the most part legislated. part lagging as they approached Mr. Hickson, were noticeably firmer when

they departed.

Chronic Sufferers Appear.

The majority of the "patients" were clearly chronic cases who had abandoned hope of being helped by physicians. A few were so feeble that friends had to assist them to the choir, before which Mr. Hickson stood.

Each, apparently, was treated alike. Prior to the opening of the meeting a young woman passed through the audience with a notebook, jotting down names, with ailments, addresses.

The "treatment" was simplicity itself, consisting of a moment's conversation, followed by a murmured prayer by Mr. Hickson, while he laid his hands upon the "patients" heads or hips. Some of the women were in tears as they departed, but all wore smiles.

"Please do not charge me with being, a ing, or making any claim to being, a healer in my own person," said Mr. Hickson at the service's conclusion to those who had attended as observers. He said his first discovery that he had some power to help other persons came when he was with his own family. He was then 14 years old.

"I discovered then," he said, "my ability to inspire new faith in those who were discouraged by long suffering, even to the extent of their being able to resist pain and find a new vitality for getting well.



Among the resolutions adopted were the following:

"That this country generally, and especially the various governmental and legislative authorities, ought to recognize in thought and practice, and enact on the statutes the right and obligation of every man to work, and further that every necessary means and opportunity be given his children to prepare them for becoming efficient and contributing citizens."


