London, Nov. 19.—Lt.-Col. L'Estrange Malone, Liberal member of the House of Commons, who was arrested in Dublin, November 10, for alleged seditious utterances, was today sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Two surety bonds of a thousand pounds sterling each were demanded pending an appeal from the judgment of the court. pending an appeal from the judgment of the court.

Prior to the sentence Malone declared through his attorney that he withdrew nothing and apologized for nothing in his Albert Hall speech and was willing to stand trial. The case has caused a sensation in England because of Malone's position as a member of the House of Commons and his notable war record. ber of the House of Commons and his notable war record.

Col. Malone was also charged with the possession of two loaded pistols, in violation of the law. He also had two cloakroom tickets for parcels of pamphlets of an alleged seditious nature which were deposited in an underground station checking room.

### ALLIES WILL ACT TO PREVENT RETURN OF FORMER GREEK KING

Paris, Nov. 19.—Allied nations will probably intervene to prevent the return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne, says Charles C. A. Jonart, former French nigh commissioner in Greece, and at present French ambarador extraordiness at the Vation assador-extraordinary at the Vatican. bassador-extraordinary at the catican.
His views on the situation are set forth
In an interview published today by the
newspaper Excelsior.
"Constantine," says M. Jonnart,
"seems to me not only undesirable for
the Allies, but quite impossible. His

"seems to me not only undesirable for the Allies, but quite impossible. His return to the throne would mean that the greater Greece of Venizelos would be placed at the service of Germany. It is the right and duty of the protecting powers not to allow a Greece that is stronger than ever to become a vassal of Germany.

"It cannot be denied that Constantine acted as an autocrat, and the powers have a perfect right to oppose his return to the throne. A historical precedent may be found for this action. King Otto the Bavarian monarch of Greece, attempted in 1862 to set up absolute rule in that country. This resulted in Anglo-French intervention, and the deposition of King Otto was required. The Bavarian dynasty was later replaced by one having its origin in Denmark.





Demand Good in Some Lines -Scrap Metal Trade Very Dull.

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ending November 18. Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, Makes the following statement:
"Business is quiet in the tool, iron and steel market. But in saying that one should take into consideration that at any time this is a quiet season in these lines. Little purchasing is ever done in the steel market during the last half of November and December, and it is hard to say how much this accounts for the present state. Prices are holding firm, though, and if there is any tendency in the U. S. steel market to let prices sag seriously it is not being reflected here. In some lines the demand is good and deliveries not in keeping with the immediate requirements. requirements.
"It is doubtful if a decrease in prices

would bring much new business into the market just now. As a rule, ma-chine tools are not sold because the price is attractive, but because they price is attractive, but because they are wanted to do a certain work, buyers preferring to pay the high price and insist on the quality being equally high. Some markets have announced reductions, but the movement has not become general. It had been expected that the meeting of tool builders in New York would be followed by something approaching a general announce-New York would be followed by some-thing approaching a general announce-ment regarding policy and prices for the ensuing year, but so far there has been nothing forthcoming apart from the announcement of the president that costs were still very high, and would hardly permit of reductions. ### SEMINOLES ONLY **UNDEFEATED TRIBE**

Have Increased Since, War With U. S. From 296 To More Tran 600.

West Palm Beach, Fla., Nov. 18 .-That the Seminole Indians are a rapidly vanishing race of men is vigorously denied by E. P. Simpson, who is editor of the Tropical Sun, a local newspaper, and is known as an authority on the Seminoles, with whom he has lived and

He says that after the Seminole war when the greater part of the tribe was moved to a reservation, there were just 296 Indians who escaped to the Ever-

glades and refused to be moved.

This little group constitutes the present free Seminole tribe, said to be the only Indians in the United States who were never conquered by the United States and have never acknowledged the soverelgnty of its government. They constitute practically a little nomad nation living within the confines of our own.

Part of Local Color.

The Seminole and the alligator seem to be the two most characteristic things in Florida—an indispensable part of the "local color" scheme.

Mr. Simpson says that the original 296 renegades have now increased to a tribe of 600 individuals, divided into five different bands—the Miami, the Lauderdale, the Big Cypress, the Cow Creek and the Okechobee bands. This increase, he says, would be still more rapid except for the fact that the tribe suffers from a shortage of women. And their religion forbids them to marry women of any other tribe or race.

The fact seems to be that the balance of the sexes among the Seminoles has been upset by the relatively safe life they lead. Among most kinds of human beings, more males are born than females. In a savage tribe living a savage life, a great many more males are killed in war and hunting than females, with the result that there are usually more women than men, and polygamy is practiced.

But the Seminole men have no convenient or reliable way of getting killed. They have no wars, the Everglades are safe and healthy. So the men have been increasing faster than the women for several generations, and this promises to be a factor which more and more will limit the rate of increase.

Camps Near Resorts.

The Seminoles have camps or villages within easy reach of both Palm Beach and Miami, and a good man. The Indians in return come to the towns occasionally, and it is not unusual to see them on the streets of West Palm Beach. They bring various articles for trade, some legitimate and some contraband. One of the contraband is "swamp mutton," or venison, which, it is said, can be obtained from the Indians at almost any time by those who know how. Another article of secret trade is whiskey.

The Seminoles make a clear, white corn whiskey, which is much praised by those who have tasted it. It is sa

make for themselves.

Hold Dance Yearly.

At West Palm Beach there is held in March a carnival known as the Sun Dance. A number of Seminole Indians are then brought to town and persuaded by liberal reward to perform some kind of a war dance. As a matter of fact, the Seminoles have no dance of their own known as the sun dance, and this dancing they do in town is purely a commercial operation on their part. commercial operation on their part.
Their real ceremonial dances are held
in the depths of the Everglades, and no
white man is allowed to see them, although probably a few daring individuals
have done so. The great occasion of
the year is the corn dance. At this it is
customary for all of the Indians to get
drunk, it is said, except those who are
on guard.

on guard.
It should not be supposed, however that the Seminoles are a dissolute lo

that the Seminoles are a dissolute lot. Their drinking is an occasional and ceremonial proceeding, somewhat like the Saturday night spree so generally observed by our own tribe before prohibition went into effect.

Indians Alded Slaves.

Mr. Simpson has some interesting facts and ideas about the Seminole war. He says it was really an unjustified attack upon the Indians by our Government. A great many runaway slaves

tack upon the Indians by our Government. A great many runaway slaves went to the Everglades in those days, and a large part of these fell into the hands of the Seminoles. The Seminoles have always been farmers, and they put the slaves to work cultivating the rich lands of the glades. It is said that some of the Indians really made themselves quite fich by this slave labor, which they got without making an investment. The white planters in the surrounding territory, who were losing

ment. The white planters in the surrounding territory, who were losing slaves in this way, were the ones who really instigated the Seminole war, according to Mr. Simpson, and caused General Jackson to start on his famous campaign against them.

The slaves were recovered to a great extent, and then began the war of extermination, in which the Indians were so ably led by Osceola. It was the hardest, bloodiest and most unmerciful of all our later Indians wars. When the Indians had been worn down and scat-Indians had been worn down and scat

all our later Indians wars. When the Indians had been worn down and scattered, they were hunted with hounds like wild animals.

Make Informal Treaty.

The war ended only when the greater part of them had been taken prisoners and placed on a reservation, leaving only the little remnant from which the present tribe is descended.

For a while these Indians were mere fugitives, who dared not show themselves, but after a time they made a sort of informal treaty with the whites by which each party agreed to let the other alone. To this treaty the Seminoles rigidly adhered. They still regard the white men as murderers and liars, but there is no case on record of a Seminole having injured a white man. But there are several cases of white men having injured Seminoles, and this has naturally done nothing to improve the Indians' opinion of the "superior race."

### **EYE-WITNESSES GIVE REPORTS**

Councillor of Thurles Describe Killings by Soldiers.

CIVILIANS WERE SHOT

Says Barbarities Practiced On Dead Body of Civilian After Shooting.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 .- Eyewitness reports of recent disturbances in Ireland were given today at the opening hearing of the commission of the "committee of one hundred" investi-"committee of one hundred" in gating the Irish question. All nesses heard were partisans of the

Sinn Fein movement.

Denis Morgan, chairman of the town council of Thurles, Ireland, and three Irish-Americans who visited Ireland recently—John F. Martin of Green Bay, Wis Father Michael English of Wis., Father Michael English of Whitehall, Mont., and Father James H. Cotter of Ironton, Ohio—were heard. All maintained that civil processes in Ireland, except those of the provisional Irish republic, were practically at an end under the rule of the British mili-

end under the rule of the British military forces.

Morgan said he was a college teacher in Thurles, and that he had been elected chairman of the town council as the Labor candidate, winning over Sinn Fein and independent candidates. The witness described what he termed the shooting-up of the town of Thurles by Government constabulary. He testifled that after a constable had been shot on January 20 last, the constabulary in reprisal made a midnight raid shot on January 20 last, the constabulary in reprisal made a midnight raid upon homes and stores of townsmen prominent in the Irish independence movement. Ten houses and stores were riddled with bullets and hand

were riddled with bullets and hand grenades, he alleged.

"Was it apparent that these places were picked out?" asked Senator Waish of Massachusetts.

"Yes," Morgan replied. "They were all of people known to be associated with the movement for the independance of Verleyal leaders in the movement. ence of Ireland—leaders in the move-ment."

Houses Shot Up.

Of the houses shot up, Mr. Morgan said, four were of members of the newly-elected town council. No riotnewly-elected town council. No rioting preceded the shooting, he continued, and he was told that the constabulary was "practically acting under orders."

The witness described how he and his family lay huddled on a stone floor all night "to escape the bullets flying through the windows and doors." There were no religious differences between the Thurles inhabitants, Mr. Morgan said, and the town was law abiding.

The witness testified that he was arrested by a squad of eight constables when he left his home on January 30 to attend an organization meeting of the town council. He said he asked with what offence he was charged, and the constables replied: "No charge, just Government orders," was the reply he claims he received. he claims he received

Home Was Riddled.

Morgan said his home was riddled with bullets prior to his arrest and deportation to England without any definite charges being preferred against him. With 200 other "Irish republican" leaders, he said, he went on a hunger strike until all were released. He also told of "murders of Irish people by constabulary and soldiers," including the "black and tan" forces. war, distracting her witnessed the shooting of an Irishman,

whose body, he said, was beaten into an unrecognizable form.

Killing of Civillan.

Father Cotter, who is a Catholic editor, told of the killing of a Galway civilian by a British soldier without cause, he claimed. The soldier, he said, was seized by another civilian, and reprisals against the town followed an hour later. Soldiers "shot up" the streets for several hours, he said. The priest, who is advanced in years, added that he lay for an hour and a half under a window ledge of his hotel to escape flying bullets. Later, he declared, the military set fire to two houses and fired into a Galway newspaper plant, whose management was friendly to the Sinn Fein.

WILL SEND COMMISSION.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—"Only the direst necessity can justify a resort to arms for the adjustment of disputes in Ireland," Frederic C. Howe, chairman of the commission from the "committee of 100 investigating the Irish question," declared today at the opinion of the unofficial commission's hearing. He added that the conditions in Ireland "have created and are creating a widening rift in the friendly relations of English-speaking people not only in the United States, but all over the world."

Mr. Howe told the committee that what he termed "the orgy of destruction which is now ravishing Ireland is sending its repercussions "to every corner of the civilized world." It could not fail to postpone indefinitely the return of ordered tranquility to civilization, he added.







The statement was made by G. Denis, M. P., for Joliet, who said that as a result of the excise duties on Canadian tobacco, probably 200,000 pounds of stamps were cut up and palmed off or the public as tobacco. Mr. Denis further stated that Canadian tobacco grown in this province had so improved that it was largely used for cigars and it was practically as good as an ordinary imported American tobacco and rapidly becoming better.

He, therefore, argued that the tariff duty on foreign tobacco should be increased, while he strongly urged that the five cents a pound excise dnty be removed together with the inland revenue stamps.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18 .- Corn and oats umbled in value today and pulled down quotations on hogs to the lowest price eached in the last four years. Wheat also declined sharply, influenced by the depression of other grains,

Country loadings of corn were sai to have increased, and this circumstance, together with new low price records for commodities aside from corn products led to general selling of foodstuffs and then of wheat and hogs. An extreme loss of six cents a bushel was shown at one time in wheat as compared with yesterday's finish, the May delivery falling to \$1.67.

Corn went to 69\(\frac{4}{3}\)c. December, and one to 46\(\frac{4}{3}\)c. December, The average price of hogs today was about \$12.10 a hundredweight, a loss in many cases of \$750 since yesterday.

Dr. Jose de Arriaga resided for a long time in Brazil, where he collected notes on Brazilian life and literature. He is a direct descendant of King Alfonso III. of Portugal in the 17th generation, and of King Ramiro II. of Leon and Castella, and the 25th grandson of Hugh Capet, Duke of France and Count Hugh Capet, Duke of France and Count of Paris and Orleans.

His brother, the late president, died a poor man partly because of his inflexible republican opinions, which led him to refuse, at one time, to serve as tutor to the sons of the then King of Portugal. For this ardent efforts to establish a republic, the Portuguese feel that they owe a debt of gratitude to President de Arriaga.



Police Make Several Attacks On Houses in Cork.

LONDON, Nov. 18 .- Three men were ying dead today in the Cork mortuary, while two others badly wounded were while two others badly wounded were in hospital as a result of several attacks last night on individual houses by armed men following the killing of Sergeant O'Donaghue of the Constabulary, according to a Cork dispatch this afternoon. The people were afraid to venture outdoors, the dispatch added. The first affair occurred near midnight, the dispatch said, when two former soldiers were dragged from their beds, one of them killed and one wounded. Later, a civilian was called to his door, shot and killed. Sometime after midnight another civilian was shot dead and a former soldier wounded.

Absorption

From the countless number and variety of skin creams, alleged skin foods and similar concoctions exploited by near-doctors and beauty specialists, it might be imagined that it is possible to feed the body or nourish any part of it through the skin.

Will the skin absorb anything applied or rubbed into it? If it absorbs any medicament or food, what becomes of the material so absorbed? Is such material ever under any circumstances deposited locally to fill out hollows, wrinkles or any such blemish? In short is the credulous sex——?

The sebaceous (oil) glands and the sweat glands pour their secretions out upon the surface of the skin through ducts with a common opening. The openings or mouths of these ducts are larger in some places (as about the sides of the nose), than in others, and in some persons." Call 'em "pores" if you will, but remember that these "pores" do not open and close as many imagine. It is perfectly safe to go out in the cold with all the "pores" open, save the busy one between the ears.

The skin is practically impervious to water and to medicines, chemicals or foods dissolved in water. Likewise alcohol and alcoholic solutions cannot be made to penetrate the skin. Fats are absorbed in very limited quantity through the skin. If the fat is merely applied or kept in contact with the skin very little of it will be absorbed; but if friction is used, that is, if the substance is thoroughly rubbed in, an appreciably greater quantity will be absorbed. Fatty substances of solid or semi-solid consistence are more readily absorbed with the aid of friction than are liquid or soft fats. Medicines intimately mixed with fats may be made to penetrate the soft fats. Medicines intimately mixed with fats may be made to penetrate the skin in this way—and intimately mixed means that the medicinal substance must be extinguished in the mixture, so that no particle can be felt with the fingers or detected with the eye. That is the test of a well made ointment—a test which too many alleged ointments fail to satisfy. Mercurial ointment ("blue ointment") or the more cleanly calomel ointment is commonly applied to the skin by friction for the purpose of producing systemic effects.

Certain volatile substances, such as turpentine, guaiacol, iodine, oil of wintergreen, peppermint, camphor and chloroform may be absorbed through the skin.

Anything which is absorbed through the skin is carried immediately into the general circulation, never deposited or left at the place where the absorption occurs. This is sad but true. It will come as a great disappointment to many of the more credulous sex who harbor the fancy that one may feed the face through any other pore than the large one between the nose and the chin. ### **GERMANS HOPING** TO CIRCLE WORLD

Expect U. S. Help in Their Plans.

Berlin,, Nov. 18. - Harding's victory with the promise of an early peace between Germany and the United States, has awakened the liveliest interest in aviation circles. That is true especially among officials of the Zeppelin Company, whose hopes of circling the world with airships, larger than any existing, are revived.

I talked today with Dr. Huih Eckejust come from Friedrichshafen. He explained the airship situation. Most important was his statement that the Experient airship set aside for America was allotted to Italy, as the United States had failed to join the reparations

Hopes To Bulld for United States.
Dr. Eckner also declared the American army and navy had entered into negotiations for aircraft, but the par-leys failed for the same reason. The company now hopes to have the oppor-tunity to build for the United States. Furthermore, he declared that two American firms sent representatives to Germany last year, but no deal was made. He hopes that peace will be followed by the resumption of negotiations. which eventually will lead to make a reality of the rumored Spain, New York, Chicago, San Francisco Air Line, the first link in the plan to circle the

the first link in the plan to circle the world.

"Work on the first Zeppelin intended for the American trip was suspended in January by orders of the allied mission," declared Dr. Eckener, "but it is possible to complete it within eight months if we receive permission to go ahead. This ship will have a gas capamonths if we receive permission to go ahead. This ship will have a gas capacity of 100,000 cubic meters. It will be the largest airship in the world and will be capable of making three Atlantic crossings without stopping.

"Furthermore, we are not idle, but are planning bigger and better craft as war experiences proved that Zeppelins are the fastest, safest, and best means of transportation.

of transportation.

Ordered Not To Build.

"According to the treaty of Versailles we were not to be permitted to resume civilian operations for six months, but when the time limit elapsed we were ordered not to recommence. Various reasons for this order were given, but

reasons for this order were given, but we have suspicions that it was the hope of certain of the Allies to prevent Germany building until they had established commercial air lines and made competition impossible.

"Today all the Zeppelins, except Japan's, have been delivered, Zeppelin 113, which was intended for America, was given to Italy. Two have been given to France, two to England, and two to Italy.

Italy.
"The one intended for Japan will not

be shipped intact because Japanese officers who were here studying the construction ordered us to ship only the small parts, which we are doing.

Two Civilian Ships Left.

"We have two civilian ships left, one named the North Star and the other the Bodensee, which the Entente have prevented us from flying. Today we received word from Gen. Masterman, the Briton heading the reparations commission, saying we could fly those ships.

"We replied asking two guarantees, that the ships would not be confiscated, and that the sheds and wharfs would be left intact. When these guarantees are given we shall open a line between Stockholm, Berlin, and a point in Switzerland.

"We also have reason to believe that the Entente's order for the destruction of the sheds and wharfs will be re-

"I hope that when America declares peace and has members on the repara-tions commission it will confirm the order because unless we have sheds and

wharfs we cannot operate.

Expects World Air Line.

"When Americans are on the reparations commission we are sure that United States interests will take up the plan for the formation of an international syndicate establishing a line between Europe and America.

"We also are prepared to put together



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

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
