Country.

"The area of land suitable for the growing of agricultural crops in Canada is so vast that when presented in figures the mind needs a deal of training before their full significance can be grasped." This assertion is made by Professor William Saunders, direc the Dominion experimenta an instructive article of Wheat Growing in Canada," in th current number of the Canadian Maga zine. He estimates the cultivable area of Manitoba and the three provisional territories of Assiniboia, Saskatchewan and Alberta to be 171,000,000 acres divided as follows: Manitoba, 27,000,-000; Assiniboia, 50,000,000; Saskatchewan, 52,000,000; Alberta, 42,000,000. In addition there are 155 million acres of land in Athabasca and 340 million acres in Mackenzie, which will probably prove important factors in the develop ment of Canada; but what proportion of these districts will be capable of the profitable growing of crops is as vet a matter of conjecture. Prof Saunders has received from Dunnegan in Athabasca, 414 miles north of Winnipeg, samples of Ladoga wheat, weigh ing 64 pounds per bushel; oats weighing 40 to 42 pounds per bushel; sixrowed barley, 52 pounds per bushel and spring rye 56 pounds per bushel At Fort Vermillion, also in Athabasca on the Peace River, 591 miles north of Winnipeg, Ladoga wheat has been raised weighing 60 pounds per bushel; oats, 41% pounds; six-rowed barley 51% pounds, and spring rye, 571/2 pounds per bushel. 

a Musical Organ and University Is Said to Have Bargained for It St. Louis, Mo., March 31. - Edward Lewis, a Pole, who recently gave an exhibition of his "musical heart" at the Marion Sims Medical College in this city, says he has sold his heart to the Johns Hopkins University for

Lewis says he received \$500 cash and an iron-clad contract whereby on his death his heart is to be turned over to the university intact, and the school will pay Lewis' widow \$4,500 balance due for the organ.



FIRE HALL ESTIMATES. As foreshadowed some time ago, fire hall expenditure has taken a jump this year. Last year the estimates totaled \$19,160, but this year \$23,766 41 is asked or, or an increase of \$4,606 41 over 1903. Of this sum about \$4,000 is for the salaries of the new men, leaving the increase on general expense at about \$600. According to the estimates, the total salaries for the year amount to \$16,336, made up as follows: No. 1 station, \$9,610 45; No. 2 station, \$3,380 84; No. 3 station, \$3,375 12. The items for fodder for the horses are large, and amount to \$1,285, as follows: No. 1 station, \$965; No. 2 station, \$160; No. 3 station, \$160. Of course, the estimates as herein presented do not include the amount which the city pays the water commissioners for water.
