SERIOUSLY INJURED

On Wednesday afternoon last Miss Addie Hunt, professional nurse, was very seriously injured in New York city, having both legs cut off by a rail way train.

A telegram to Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Stevens announced the accident, and they at once obeyed the call to "come at once." They were driven to Brockville on Thursday and took the afternoon train to New York. They found Miss Hunt in a critical condition in Flushing hospital, and the medical men then gave very little hope of her recovery. The first particulars of the accident reached here in a letter written by Mr. Luther Murphy who visited the hospital immediately on learning of the accident.

Miss Hunt had lately been giving electrical massage treatments, and it was while returning from a regular visit to a patient that the accident occurred.

A New York paper reports the accident as follows:—

"Miss Hunt was driven from Miss Alger's home, which adjoins W. Gould Brokaw's summer residence, to the station at Great Neck. She left the carriage and stood waiting for the train, which had almost reached the station.

"Suddenly she ran across the track to the carriage to get something she had forgotten. The train had begun to move. Miss Hunt ran for it and in crossing the east bound track was struck down by a train from Long Island City. The wheels of the locomotive cut both legs off, one just above the ankle and the other near the knee.

"Passengers on the train for New York had seen the accident and the train was stopped. It backed into the station and Miss Hunt was put in the baggage car. Mr. H. Bramhall Gilbert, brother-in-law of W. Gould Brokaw, ran up at this moment and took charge.

"The engine driver was told to put on all speed for Flushing, a run of fourteen minutes, and a telegram was sent ahead for an ambulance. Mr. Gilbert in the car ripped off his shirt, disregarding costly links and studs, knelt on the floor of the car and showed that he knew something of "first aid to the injured."

"He was aided by a young woman passenger, and together they did what they could by improvised tourniquets to stop the hemorrhage. Mr. Gilbert stuck to his work of nurse until the train pulled into Flushing, where an ambulance from the Flushing Hospital was met by the train.

"Dr. Benoit, of the hospital, who came with the ambulance, said there was not much hope that the woman would live. If she does it will be due to the quick action of Mr. Gilbert."

Latest reports indicate that Miss Hunt will recover. The news was a great shock to her friends here, among whom she has spent the greater part of her life. Her profession took her into the homes of many wealthy people, and they are testifying their friendship by securing for her the best medical and nursing skill obtainable.

Mr. and Mrs. Stevens will remain until there is a decided change in the patient's condition.

Anglican Lawn Social

The lawn social held on the grounds of the Rectory by the ladies of Christ Church on Friday evening last fully met the expectations of all interested. The weather was perfect, and the large attendance included many from neighboring villages. The lawn was illuminated with Chinese lanterns and a booth at which confections and fruit were sold was elaborately ornamented with flags, bunting and colored lamps. The company was most sociable and thoroughly enjoyed the hour spent amidst such beautiful surroundings. Piano music and selections from an excellent phonograph added to the pleasure of the evening. The refreshments included sandwiches, a variety of cakes, ice cream, tea and coffee, and they were promptly served by an efficient staff of waiters. The net proceeds of the social amounted to about \$100.

In accordance with the desire of a large proportion of the business men of Athens, the recess requests that Monday next be observed as a holiday instead of Saturday (Dominion Day). The business places generally will be closed on that day, and the public are respectfully requested to note the fact.

Music will be furnished by the Newboro Brass Band, and a number of distinguished speakers will be present, including Geo. Taylor, M.P., J. R. Dargavell, M.L.A., Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, Rev. S. J. Hughes, M.A., Rev. L. M. Weeks, B.D., Rev. R. B. Patterson, M.A., R. G. Harvey, Esq., and A. E. Donovan, Esq. Special excursion rates will be given on regular trains of the B.W. & N.W.

The Drainage Proposal

The meeting called by Mr. Loverin, Village Engineer, on Monday evening, to arrange for putting down the big drain in the south ward, was not very largely attended. It was a representative gathering, however, and the result will be accepted as conclusive. Mr. W. G. Parish was elected chairman and Mr. H. Jones, secretary. Mr. Loverin detailed the steps he had taken since his appointment to the office of Engineer and submitted statistics of measurement and estimate of cost. The total length would be 1,775 feet and the cost complete, using cement tile, he estimated would be \$767.51. This estimate covers cost of everything, including superintendence, connecting existing private drains with the new drain, etc.

The matter was discussed at length, and it soon became evident that a unanimous opinion on the mode of procedure and basis of payment was out of the question, and the meeting adjourned at a late hour without any progress having been made, excepting the agreement to disagree.

Mr. Loverin now announces his intention of proceeding with the work under the powers conferred by the Ditches and Watercourses Act.

Home from California

On Saturday last Mr. R. D. Judson returned home, after spending the winter at the Coast, and is being warmly welcomed by old friends. He left here on Dec. 26, and his arrival in Ontario County, California, was a very pleasant experience. He travelled in company with Mr. P. Strong and made his headquarters at that gentleman's ranch in California. From that point he made trips to mining villages in the mountains, to the chief cities, business centres and winter pleasure resorts, orange groves, fruit farms, plantations, etc., and after carefully considering the whole industrial situation, as he viewed it, he is of opinion that life there is not quite so strenuous as here and that the returns are rather better.

A trip to the Santa Catalina islands furnished him with material for a fish story that will put old Whitefish Joe out of business.

On leaving California this spring, Mr. Judson visited a number of the coast towns, including Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane. At Spokane he found our former townsman, Mr. Arthur Robeson, engaged in real estate business. He then visited friends at Victoria and Vancouver, spent a month in the Territories and Manitoba, and came home via the C.P.R. steamers from Fort William. The trip has agreed with him thoroughly, and he has probably only said adieu and not farewell to the Pacific Slope.

There was to have been a wedding at the Methodist church, Winchester, Thursday afternoon of last week, but owing to the absence of the bride couple, failed to take place. The minister was all in readiness and about one hundred and fifty spectators were present to witness the ceremony. A messenger informed the minister that the contracting parties were at the parsonage and desired his presence there. The spectators, taking the hint from the minister's departure, quietly dispersed. It seems the bride was too modest to stand before the crowd and preferred the seclusion of the parsonage. When last seen the couple were entering the photographer's studio.

EDUCATIONAL GRANTS

At the meeting of the counties council last week, the report of the committee on education, on being presented, was referred to a committee of the whole council, Mr. Alguire in the chair. It embraced several clauses with the following recommendations:

That the County Treasurer pay the Gananogue, Athens and Kemptville High Schools the county equivalent as provided by law when required by them. That the usual annual grant of \$200 be made to each of the High Schools in the United Counties.

That special grant of \$50 be made to the public schools of Westport, Merrickville and Lyn in aid of the continuation class, the money to be paid when the Inspectors of the districts certify that the said schools are conducted in accordance with the regulations of the Education Department for class "A" work.

A special grant of \$250 to the Athens Model school to assist in replacing the equipment which was lately destroyed by fire in February last. The committee had before them a statement from the Iroquois High School claiming \$416.28 for the maintenance of pupils from Leeds and Grenville for the year ending July 1, 1906.

As the committee had not sufficient information furnished them at present, and as the attendance cannot be made up until the close of the school in June, also that there is no money due the school until June 1906, it was recommended that the clerk be instructed to procure all further necessary information and to report to the Council at the November session the amount he finds due from these United Counties to Iroquois High School.

The committee had before them the annual reports from School Inspectors Kinney, Johnston and Craig, giving full reports of the number of schools, teachers, etc., all of which were recommended to be published in the minutes of the council. A lecture on "Shakespeare," delivered at the annual meeting of the West Leeds Teachers' Institute, at Newboro, on Oct. 6th and 7th, 1904, was recommended to be published with the minutes. The report was received and adopted.

The official referee for cheese and butter, located at Montreal, reports to G. G. Pablow, Chief Instructor for Eastern Ontario, that out of one hundred and eleven faulted cheese received from the section east of Toronto only seventeen were from factories which were receiving instruction. When it is remembered that fully two-thirds of the eastern factories are taking advantage of the instruction provided by the Department of Agriculture, and the Dairy Associations, the above comparison shows strongly, in favor of the good results following the efforts of last year and this spring. The chief instructors for both the eastern and western sections report that practically every factory which took instruction last year has made more or less improvement in buildings or equipment.

Kingston is likely to furnish a revolt from the action of stationing committee at the Methodist conference held at Ottawa in the person of Rev. Norman Tucker, Ph.D., of Princess Street Methodist church. Dr. Tucker has been in his present charge only one year and at the first draft was returned to that church. He claims that after this the representatives from the other churches there went against him and made a change in the second draft by which he was transferred to St. John's Quebec, a much smaller charge. He objects to going as he has built a house at Kingston, and for the educational advantages to his children in that city, and the change he declares to be one of spite on the part certain parties. He has decided not to go to his new charge at present anyway and may leave the denomination.

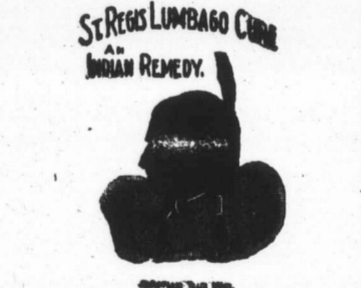

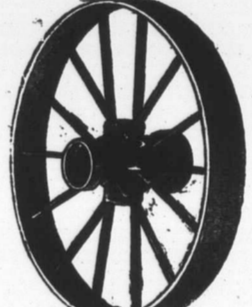

THE TOLL GATES

They're with us still, and the freeing of the roads from tolls through action by the counties council seems as far away as ever. As reported by the Recorder, the proceedings in relation to this matter before the counties council were as follows:

A deputation from Rear Yonge and Escott and Township of Elizabethtown was heard, regarding their abolition of toll gates.

Mayor Stewart of Brockville was first heard. He had been requested by the township representatives to accompany them. All recognized that toll gates should be abolished. They suggested that a deputation consisting of one representative from each municipality in the county meet any committee the council might name to take the matter into consideration during the sessions of the Good Roads Association in Brockville.

Mr. Thos. Pertem, reeve of Elizabethtown, and Mr. Brown, member of Rear Yonge and Escott council, also spoke briefly, urging that something be done to get rid of the toll gates in the county.

Mr. Bissell suggested that as Brockville and Prescott were interested in the matter, they should also send representatives to this proposed conference. Mayor Stewart said that as far as Brockville was concerned, representatives would be sent.

In reply to Mr. Britton, Mr. Bissell briefly stated the objects to be attained by the Good Roads Association. It was an educative organization, which discussed all matters relative to the betterment of the roads, and devised means to carry suggestions into practice.

Mr. Connolly and Mr. Berney also spoke briefly.

Under the heading of general business, Mr. Berney moved, seconded by Mr. Bissell, that this council grant the sum of \$500 towards the purchase of the Farmersville macadamized road leading from the village of Forthton to the village of Athens, a distance of five miles, and now owned by a company known as the Farmersville Plank Road Co., on conditions that Rear Yonge and Escott, Elizabethtown and the village of Athens pay the balance required to purchase said road, and the taking of tolls on said road cease, and said road be kept in repair.

Mr. Bissell's name was placed as seconder of the above resolution, but he vigorously opposed it, claiming that an agitation was now on to abolish all toll roads, and wanted to know why the council should give a grant to that road.

Messrs Berney and Alguire vigorously supported the resolution, but the opposition was strong. Messrs. Selleck, Baker, Arnold, Preston, Garvin, Stafford and Donovan opposed it equally as hard, although the sentiment was that all toll roads should be abolished.

An amendment postponing further consideration of the matter until the fall session was moved, but it and the motion were both finally withdrawn.

In the English ship Queneau, a swordfish penetrated to a depth of thirty inches, causing a leak which made it necessary to discharge the cargo. One of the Gloucester fishing schooners, while on a trip to George's banks in 1876, was attacked by a swordfish in the night time.

He assailed the vessel with great force, and succeeded in putting his sword through one of the planks some two feet, and after making fearful straggle, diving about three feet below the surface, leaving it hard and fast to the plank, and made a speedy vessel leaked badly, requiring pretty heavily to be pumped out.

The big swordfish, the sword penetrated the copper sheathing of the hull, and through the timbers about six inches. The crew had to pump steadily until port was reached.

In September, 1902, the Gloucester fishing schooner Emily County had an exciting encounter with a swordfish. While going through the South Channel three swordfish were seen and the vessel was attacked and one was harpooned. Immediately another monster fish appeared. At first he made off at a tangent, but the crew, and then, as if angered, turned, and with a terrific rush, made his way to the vessel.

First tried to reach the man in the "pulpit," but, being unable to do so, he charged at the vessel, and, diving about three feet below the surface, struck the craft with such force that the sword passed through the two and one-half inch plank in the ceiling and a foot of the blade was broken off. The blow was felt all over the vessel, and the crew below had just moved from where he was sitting, and a moment later the sword was driven directly through the spot where he sat. The vessel began to leak, and the captain ordered the crew to get ready to jump.

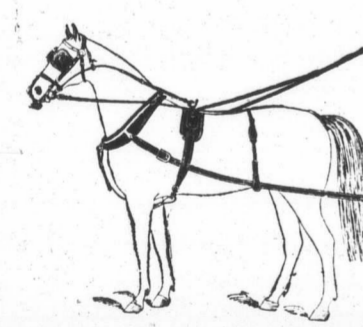
