Canard News.

Mowing began on the Kempt dike on the first of this week. Mr H. E. Lockwood is now spending a few weeks with his family in Canard.

Mr L. F. Eaton, of the incoming senior class of Acadia College, left Canard this week for the Commercial College at St. John. He expects to finish the full course in three months.

The prospects of a good potato and apple crop is not very encouraging as far as can be determined now. Potatoes are looking very well but a hard fight with the potato beetle in order to save their crops. It is likely that apples will give only a fair or average crop, but with the unusually large number of blossoms that were to be seen in the spring. During the last fortnight it has been noticed by a good many farmers that the apples have been falling very freely from the trees. If this continues long the crop will be very light.
