EMPRESS THEATRE ON MONDAY

Black Beauty, the most famous horse in the world's literature, has a number of interesting human acquaintances. The wonderful horse, whose autobiography as recorded by Anna Sewell has run through countless editions and been read by millions in the past forty years, knew many things about these humans, and related them, but could not know or relate the intense drama going on indoors.

In preparing the motion picture version of "Black Beauty," Mr. and Mrs. George Randolph Chester have added the human story, to supplement the "Story of Black Beauty." The "Indoor Story," however has been kept entirely separate from the "Outdoor Story," which Anna Sewell had Black Beauty tell.

The film version has been completed at last, in spite of almost insuperable difficulties, as a Vitagraph special production, and will be shown at the Empress theatre on Monday with Jean Paige in the leading human role.

Contrary to the general supposition, the work of visualizing the story of "Black Beauty" was more a matter of awaiting and seizing opportunities than it was of training horses. In the action of horses described by Anna Sewell there are things which no horses do not do at some time under certain circumstances, naturally and spontaneously. It was the author's ability to observe with alert and sympathetic intelligence the conduct of horses under all circumstances, and present her observations in a brilliant literary style, that made her book one of the world's masterpieces for all time. After forty years it still ranks among the world's ten most popular books.

The visualization of "Black Beauty" was no small undertaking, but the splendid result has justified all the thought, energy and money expended in its accomplishment.

The entire enterprise, from the preparation of the film version to the final editing of the production, has been conducted with reverent regard for the sacredness of Anna Sewell's immortal work.

DOAKTOWN FAILURE WITH LIABILITIES OF \$163,000

Frank D. Swim ex-M. P. P. and Alexander Storey, of Doaktown, who have carried on a lumber business under a partnership arrangement have assigned to The Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, Limited, authorized trustees under the Bankruptcy Act, of St. John.

It was stated this morning that the liabilities were placed at \$163,000 with the assets estimated at \$105,000. The principal creditors were said to be two banks, the creditors being located largely in Fredericton, Doaktown and St. John.

AFTERMATH OF WAR NOT REAL CAUSE

Unrest Due to Organized Effort Against Society

R. B. MAXWELL'S VIEW OF SITUATION

Condemns the Canadian National Union of ex-Service Men as Dangerous

FREDERICTON, April 6.—That a great deal of the so-called world unrest which is being experienced at present is due to organized effort directed at the destruction of society, and not to the aftermath of the war as popularly attributed. R. B. Maxwell of Ottawa, Dominion president of the G. W. V. A. of Canada, declared in an address delivered here last night to a public meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. hall.

The seeds of propaganda of these organizations which are active at present in India, Afghanistan and Palestine, behind the troubles which have arisen in these countries and which have failed in others, have made their appearance in Canada recently through the underground channels and many so-called religious sects, declared Mr. Maxwell, and it was up to the ex-service men of Canada to stop those attempts and do it quickly. He claimed first hand information as the basis for his assertions, also attributing the general state of affairs in Ireland to the same source.

Particular mention was made of the organization in Canada known as the C. N. U. N. Canadian National Union of Ex-Service Men, which was entirely foreign in its constitution. Under the constitution of this organization Mr. Maxwell said that no man who belonged to any other organization or who recognized any religion was eligible for membership, and that while the name of the organization implied Canadian in its title, it contained aliens and alien ex-service men.

"Pay no attention to the propaganda that you may hear, say nothing of it until you have reached the truth of it," advised Mr. Maxwell in this regard. Only recently in Ottawa circulars had been sent out by some one in the name of the "Save the Children of Russia Fund," of which organization he was an executive member, in an attempt to collect funds from the school children of Ottawa for the purpose of the insidious propagandists. Investigation revealed the fact that the author of these circulars had flown.

KEEPING ACCOUNTS WITH NOTCHED STICK

Practice Still Survives in Rural France

To keep score and to keep tally are common enough phrases; but few of the ardent boys and girls who keep the score of an exciting game of base ball, and afterwards compare score cards to see if their records tally, have any idea whence these two words are derived.

Originally they were synonyms; a score being a scar or notch upon a tally stick, while tally comes directly from the French *tailler*, to cut, whittle or notch. The use of tally sticks, one would think, must belong either to remote antiquity or to regions beyond civilization and its accompanying school arithmetic; yet such is by no means the case. That it survives in rural France is attested by an American educator who has travelled much in that country.

Sitting among a group of blue-bloused peasants before the fireplace of a country inn, the landlady of which also conducted the village bakery, he noticed hanging from the mantel two great bundles of sticks. Examining them, he found that each rod was about eighteen inches long and was split up more than three quarters of its length, the split por-

tion being covered with notches, while upon the handle was inscribed a name.

The mistress of the inn observed him puzzling over these mysterious objects and good-naturedly explained that they were tallies and that all the bakery accounts were kept in that manner.

Every customer was provided with a hazel stick split through the greater part of its length and with his name on the handle. The split-off piece of wood was retained by the customer; the principal stick by the baker. When the customer desired a loaf or two he came to the shop with his stick. It was placed in connection with the piece from which it had been originally taken and then with a knife a notch was cut at the point of contact at one side, so as to mark both pieces of wood. When one side was scored full the score was carried down the other junction.

As soon as the account was paid the tally-stick was thrust into the fire.

The visitor carried away a tally as a curiosity, but on showing it in England he was surprised to learn that a farmer's wife in that part of the country in which he was staying kept her account for butter and milk on a notched stick.

AID FOR THE RUSSIAN CHILDREN

No Canadian can very well afford to withhold aid from the hundreds of thousands of Russian children who are menaced by starvation. A fellow feeling should make us wondrously kind. "But" some one may say, "how do I know that what I give will do any good? How do I know it will reach the sufferer?"

The work undertaken by the Canadian Save the Children Fund is no leap in the dark. It is not a mere venture. It is the result of a movement, that has been carefully planned, and which is assured of success. In the first place, this organization co-operates with the British Save the Children Fund, which, Dr. Nansen says, has perfected its arrangements so that the relief it provides cannot but reach its desired destination.

The support in influential circles

that this movement is receiving in Canada fit of itself an evidence that it is practical. It has the endorsement of the Canadian Government, the Honorary Vice-Presidents include: Hon. Arthur Meighen, Hon. T. A. Crerar, and Speaker Leimoux of the House of Commons. The Hon. Treasurer is Finance Minister Fielding; while the Honorary Secretary is Mr. Louis Davies, chief justice of the Supreme Court. The Treasurer is Sir George Burns, one of the best known of Canadian bankers.

Among the well known business men of Canada supporting the movement are President Beatty of the C. P. R., Sir Frederick Williams Taylor of the Bank of Montreal, Lord Atholstan, Sir Donald Mann, Vincent Massey, T. H. Estabrooks, Hon. P. C. Larkin, and H. B. Shaw of the Union Bank.

The very presence of these leading Canadians on the executive of the Save the Children Fund is an assurance that it is not only engaged in a meritorious work, but that it is practicable, and will achieve the results desired.

KNOCKED BOOZE—NOT TOWN

Exception to the Advocate, re its remarks recently, on the enforcement of the Prohibition Act in Newcastle, was taken by Mr. J. A. Creaghan at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade held on Monday evening 3rd inst. According to the report as contained in the "North Shore Leader" of the 7th inst. Mr. Creaghan stated that the town was receiving unfavorable notoriety from a local paper, in comments made by the Chief Prohibition Inspector in which he congratulated the town on having so few arrests.

To make the Advocate's position in this matter plain, we reproduce the comment above referred to.

"While in Newcastle on Saturday Chief Inspector Hawthorne gave a five minute interview to a temperance committee. It was impossible for the committee to go into detail concerning the situation in Newcastle in such a short space of time, but notwithstanding, he was informed by the committee that the temperance people were dissatisfied with the enforcement of the Prohibitory Act here. If the Inspector would get in touch with those who know the situation rather than with those who do not, he would be unable to make such a report as the above. The people of Newcastle are sick, sore and tired of reading reports such as this one."

The "Advocate" has no apology to make for these remarks and Mr. Creaghan is in error when he says that one of the local papers was knocking the town. For Mr. Creaghan's benefit the Advocate wishes to say that it has been boosting the town for the past fifty five years—long before he (Mr. Creaghan) was born and it is altogether likely that it will continue to do so long after he is gone. It (The Advocate) further ventures to say that Mr. Creaghan is unable to make any such claim for the few years that he has been a citizen of the town. The Town of Newcastle has yet to see his first progressive step and he can be assured, that he will find difficulty in making that initial step if he pursues tactics similar to the one now in question. In this particular instance the "Advocate" was knocking Booze not the Town, and it has never yet been guilty of championing the cause of Liquor. If Mr. Creaghan is unable to recognize the difference, that is his short-coming not the Advocate's. Ever since its inception the "Advocate" has always been a strong opponent of Liquor and it has no re-

Railway News in Brief

Calgary.—That the Canadian Pacific would be shipping coal out of the Drumheiler district in the course of the next few weeks was the statement made by D. C. Coleman, vice-president on western lines, Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. Coleman spoke in quite an optimistic view in reviewing present conditions and stated that freight traffic throughout the west showed an improvement compared with the corresponding period last year.

Sudbury.—By April 15th between six and seven hundred men will be given employment on the Sudbury district of the Lake Superior Division of the C. P. R. Of these some two hundred and fifty will be employed at the creosoting plant at Sudbury, which will re-open on April 15th. The balance will be employed on track maintenance and with the bridge and building department.

On April 3rd the C. P. R. started a large number of men at work replacing ties, while later on in the summer considerable rock ballasting will be done.

Winnipeg.—That there is plenty of elevator space on the Canadian Pacific tracks at the head of the lakes to take care of all loading done in the interior between now and the opening of navigation, which will be about April 25 was the statement made by Canadian Pacific Railway officials.

Approximately 285,000 bushels per day of coarse grains as well as wheat are being handled by the company. A percentage of wheat loaded does not reach the head of the lakes but is absorbed by flour mills at Winnipeg, Moose Jaw, Medicine Hat and Calgary.

Montreal.—The annual report of the C. P. R. issued last week showed gross earnings for the year 1921 of \$193,021,854, which were less than those of the previous year by \$9,619,484. Operating expenses were \$153,230,114 and net earnings were \$14,201,748, an increase for the year of \$1,642,696. The number of passengers carried was 15,311,256, a decrease of 1,690,991. The average journey per passenger was 29.97 miles as against 1.65 miles last year and the average fare paid was \$2.59 as compared with \$2.59 in 1920. The number of tons of freight carried was 22,105,283 tons as against 22,109,124 for the previous year. The year's tonnage of freight multiplied by the number of miles it travelled was 11,121,222,912, while in 1920 it was 12,904,508,976.

Vancouver.—Mr. C. A. Catterall, assistant general superintendent, British Columbia district, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, returned to the city from a trip through Southern British Columbia and over the main line from Field west.

He states that notwithstanding that spring weather is unusually late, there is a marked improvement in business activity throughout the interior. Shipments from the mines are very satisfactory, and there is quite an improvement in the pulp and lumber business. The movement of freight in British Columbia shows a substantial increase in comparison with the same period last year.

Just as soon as weather conditions will permit, the railway will be putting on a number of men to take care of the season's track work, which should help the unemployment situation materially.

Vancouver.—After waging warfare for some time, Canadian Pacific officials are of the opinion that they have at last exterminated the thousands of rats that used to infest the neighborhood, causing thousands of dollars damage to freight.

About six months ago the company brought all its territory to bear in the shape of a specially-prepared poison, which was liberally placed in every runway that could be detected, care being taken to see that dogs could not reach it. Not satisfied with this, a wonderful rat trap, of a pattern that has done great service for the company at other places, was purchased at an expense of \$15. The trap was placed in the place formerly most largely frequented by the rodents, the cooperage room. There it remained for a week or more but caught no rats.

The trap was found to be working properly, but investigation showed that the poison had exterminated the rats.

Vancouver officials of the company say they will be glad to give wholesalers and others who are sustaining heavy loss through rat destruction, the benefit of the methods used.

OPPOSITION TO CHURCH UNION GROWS

Prominent Presbyterians Express Belief Sentiment on Church Union Has Changed

Toronto, March 30.—It is said that no definite action may be taken this year to unite the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches as the Presbyterian special committee on property rights may not be able to report in time for the General Assembly to deal with the matter at its next annual session. If the committee, which is looking into the question of property rights, is unable to report to the General Assembly this summer, the Methodist General Conference cannot go any further in the matter of union in its September gathering.

It is believed by some prominent Presbyterians in this city that there has been a change recently on the question of church union, the opposition to it being on the increase. Rev. John G. Inkster, of Knox Church, is quoted by an evening paper as holding this view. On the other hand, Rev. Dr. J. H. Turnbull, of High Park Presbyterian Church, is said by the same paper to have stated his belief that union is growing in favor among Presbyterians.

THE PASSING HOUR

It must be a grand and glorious feeling to be an M. P. or an M. L. A. now-a-days.

In the one case, say in New Brunswick, they get \$1000, for a few weeks sitting still, speaking now and then, casting votes, arguing points, sundry vociferations, and so forth. It is a mixture of sense, and the people pay the piper.

In the Federal house, the price for operators of much the same sort, is \$4000 a piece to every man jack of them. There is only one lady in the house, and to her credit be it said, she considers the job, not worth the money, and she considers \$2500 good pay.

The local house, has a new assortment, called "the Auto Gang." In fact there is a disposition among New Brunswick Parliamentarians, to have a good time, at the expense of the people who sent them there. There is a beautiful talk about economy, and an attempt to get out of it. The people think, if their representatives want autos, they better provide them, at their own

expense. Former Parliaments, both Liberal and Conservative, did very well, without an "Auto Gang," even when members received less pay.

The High cost of living, has taken a considerable tumble. The wages of mechanics, and others, have taken a tumble too, and those are the sort of people, who make Parliaments. Can any one of common sense, give a reason why the pay of M. P.'s and M. P. P.'s should not tumble too, especially when for all the good some of them are, they are hardly worth their salt! So far as the present Government of New Brunswick is concerned, their most marked qualification is that of extravagance, and one of the Farmer Members, named them rightly as "a spendthrift Government."

Talking about Farmer Members, or Labor Farmer Members, one would like to know, what class the Northumberland Members belong to. The present Representatives came before the people, in contest with Liberal candidates, and the people returned them. It was distinctly understood that they would form a part of an independent and separate party in the house. Every man of them, has switched into support of the Liberal party; although the Labor Farmer Party has a leader in the person of Mr. Fawcett, who is proving himself to be one of the best members of the House. Even Vandenberg, has allowed suit, in servile support of the Government, although it is well known that a Liberal candidate, Allain, was brought out to defeat him; if possible. Of course they very nicely clubbed the Government, a few days ago, on an unemployment plea, and they got what they wanted. It is at least an acknowledgment of their services, but it is safe to say that could the Government keep place and power, without their help; they might go whistle "till the coos came home." That is where "the big stick" worked.

The Powers in Ottawa, have decided that the returned soldiers are not to get a bonus, and the one crop farmers, called Progressives backed the King Government up in the refusal. King and his party, may use all the artful dodges of argument and logic, or all the twisting and turning pledge breakers are capable of; but he cannot get over the fact, that the Liberal Platform—or "chart" and he himself personally guaranteed to the returned men, the bonus. Mr. Melglen rightly classed Kings pledges, as vote catchers. The result of the whole thing is; the Progressives joined the Liberals, and the returned soldiers, may go jazz for their bonus. One curious outcome of the tremendous victory for "broken pledges," is the way some Liberal party hacks, have crowed over the great Liberal victory, the greatest since Confederation, and planted big head lines of glorification, while it is an undesirable fact that the Liberal Party, has not a majority in the house, and anyone could not pass a single act, or win a solitary count. They are depending absolutely, for the very existence of their Government, upon whatever support they gain from others, not classed as belonging to the Liberal Party. No doubt the Liberals will amply repay them.

Watch future measures. The Progressives were loud in their anti coalition talk; but there is such a thing as mutual help tactics, first cousin to coalition. Meantime the crippled in power, depending upon the Pro-

FACTS THE PUBLIC SHOULD KNOW

A statement by the President of The Shoe Manufacturer's Association of Canada, from an address at the third Annual Meeting of the Association, held in Montreal, 1922.

The shoe manufacturing industry has been unfairly criticized by those who apparently do not understand why it is that, although hides are selling around pre-war quotations, prices of shoes still are higher than in 1913-14. Let us consider the necessary steps in the handling of a country hide from the farmer to the wearer of shoes.

Hides may be quoted at 5 cents per pound at country points, but this means a cost of 10 to 11 cents per pound to the tanner. These hides usually are collected by a small dealer, who goes about a section of country with a rig, and picks up perhaps 20 to 25 hides per week, probably from as many farmers. The average weight of such hides is about 40 pounds each and the dealer must add at least 2 cents per pound to the price which he pays, in order to cover the expenses and give him a small return for his work.

The small local collector ships hides to large dealers in the principal cities. To the prices received by the small dealer there has to be added freight and the cost of salt and salting. The large dealer must maintain a warehouse and employ men, at about the pre-war wages, to sort, by kinds, grades, and weights, the hides which arrive in mixed lots and to do other work in connection with the business. Those selections which are in small demand have to be sold at an advance of per-

haps one or two cents per pound over the price paid to the country collector, and for the better selling selections it is necessary to charge an advance of three or four cents per pound.

The tanner represents the next link in the chain. He buys hides from the large dealers and the invoice price to him is increased by about one cent per pound on account of freight, brokerage commission, and sales tax. At this stage the hide is only a raw material: it must still undergo expensive operations to convert it into leather. Tanning materials and dyes cost approximately twice as much as before the war. Machinery and most tanning supplies have to be imported and their price is increased by exchange, freight, and sales tax. Coal, which is a factor of large importance in the tanning industry, costs twice the pre-war quotation.

Tannery wages are 60 to 75 per cent. higher than in 1913-14. Overhead expenses have to be distributed over a smaller output than when leather was in greater demand; the necessary overhead cost per unit of product consequently is higher. The tanner also is required to pay taxes, at rates much higher than before the war, to the Federal, Provincial and Municipal Governments. The public ought also to understand that there is little demand at the present time for split leather for use in manufacturing shoes and the price of grain leather has to carry the major part of the cost. But notwithstanding all these factors, which in the aggregate involve a large addition to the cost of manufacture, leather from cow-hides is only about 25 per cent. higher in price today than it was before the war. The tanners have passed on to the trade the entire saving in the cost of leather which has resulted from the reduced price of hides. Moreover, if hides were given to the tanner free, it would not be possible under present conditions to reduce the price of shoes to the public by more than \$1.50 per pair, even in the case of shoes which retail at from \$6.00 to \$7.00 per pair. Working shoes of good quality can now be purchased by the public for \$4.00 to \$5.00 per pair. If there were a demand for split leather boots as was the case before the war, these could be purchased for much less.

All the great number of items in the shoe manufacturers' costs are much higher than in 1913-14. Many still are doubled. Labor costs 50 per cent. or more above the pre-war rates. Fuel costs much more. Taxes add still further to the shoe manufacturers' costs. Distribution expenses are higher and travellers in many cases have to make several calls where formerly one was sufficient.

Salesmen's expenses are probably 75 per cent. greater than in 1913-14. Some people appear to think that wages and leather are the only two items in the cost of footwear, whereas there is much machinery and many materials and supplies as well as overhead costs and distribution expenses to be taken into account. Nevertheless, manufacturers' prices for shoes are not more than 35 to 40 per cent. in advance of those prevailing in 1913-14. The shoe manufacturers have lowered their prices to an extent which passes on to the public all the reduction which has been made in the price of leather and other materials and supplies. Cost of production determines the prices at which the shoe factories sell their output and production costs make impossible any further reduction in manufacturers' prices for shoes under present conditions.

At the prices now in effect, no large profits are being made. If all the shoe manufacturers were to sell their product without any profit it would mean at most only a reduction of a few cents per pair in their prices.

The foregoing remarks refer principally to the situation in regard to shoes made from leather produced from country hides, as sold by farmers and country butchers. Most of the calf skins and goat skins which are the raw materials for the calf and kid
