

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VICTORIA COUNTY.

The election in Victoria may possibly not be contested since the fund which Mr. Gregory required to have subscribed forthcoming. Possibly, even Mr. Porter may not be in the field, although we incline to the contrary opinion.

The fact is there is no feeling of opposition to the government in Victoria county except among a portion of the residents of the Tobique, who erroneously hold the Dominion fishery regulations under which they are prohibited from spearing and netting in that river.

The impression that the provincial government was to blame for officers interfering with the privilege of spearing and netting which the Tobique people had long enjoyed was insidiously circulated at the time of the murder of Mrs. Howes and it is not an easy task to eradicate it.

Nothing, however, could be more unfair. The present Dominion regulations have been in existence with but little change since 1869, although, perhaps not very regularly enforced. The local government in 1884 obtained permission from the legislature, with the consent and approval of all parties, to reserve a strip along the to retain the right of fishing in the crown. In 73 seconds after the order had been given for the second current the response came and the sound that had horrified the isteners about the chair was cut off sharply. as the body once more became rigid. The dynamo was run up to its highest speed and again and again the full current of 2,000 volts was sent through the body in the chair. As the anxious group stood silently by it was seen that the body was burning and a pungent, sickening odor permeated the atmosphere. The current was again shut off and there was a relaxation of the body. Kemmler was dead.

WHAT THE DOCTORS HAVE TO SAY. Dr. Spitzka says the scientific uncertainty of the new execution law leads him to believe that this method will not be adopted in other states, and that this will be the first and last electrical execution.

Dr. Shrady said: "The execution was brutal. It was worse than hanging although probably not so painful, but the failure to kill at the first application was barbarous. Expert Huntley said: "No one can depict n words the apparent horrible sufferings of the man in the interval between the first and second applications of the electric current.'

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


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
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
