The ceremony will be performed at Apolquini next Thursday, and the bride and groom will make their honeymoon trip in the United States, visiting Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Washington, and on their return will keep house on King street, where the bridegroom already has a residence. Very few of the Doctor's friends were aware that he entertained matrimonial intentions until within the past week the secret leaked out, and many are the congratulations he has already received. KEARSAGE STOCK GOES UP.

McConnell's Nellie G. Makes a Record at Calais.

Fredericton horsemen were pleased with the news that came from the St. Stephen races Wednesday evening. It brought tidings of a great victory for Nellie G., the Kearsage mare reared by Alex. Gibson, Jr., of Marysville, and now the property of John H. Reid. Nellie G. had trotted in the St. Stephen races last week, but was not a winner. It is stated, however, that she was timed in one heat at 2:28, and her Calais record of Wednesday is not up to that. She trotted in the three minute class against J. O. C. Monte and Alex. B. There were four heats, J. O. C. winning the first in 2:30, but Nellie G. took the next three and the race, time 2:24, 2:30 and 2:32. The Telegraph's report says that after the first heat the crowd estimated that Nellie G. could do better, which proved correct, for she led from start to finish in three succeeding heats, jogging easily under the wire each time. Nellie G. was driven by John McCoy. Mr. McConnell bought her only the other day from Mayor Gibson for \$300, but her value is probably doubled since her Calais performance.

INSPECTION SOLICITED, AND BARGAINS MAY BE EXPECTED.

Among the visitors in Fredericton Tuesday was Dr. Darby Bergin, Surgeon General of the Canadian Militia, and his trip was for the purpose of examining the sanitary condition of the military property in this city. Accompanied by Dr. Bridges, who is acting Surgeon of the Militia, and Dr. McLean, Dr. Bergin made an inspection of the property and made a whole sale condemnation of it from a sanitary point of view. There were too few beds in the hospital for the number of men in the school; the heating apparatus was bad and the ventilation imperfect, and he will recommend that a new hospital be built adequate for the purposes required here. At the barracks the drainage and general sanitary condition were found very defective. No doubt as soon as Dr. Bergin's report is made at headquarters, the order for repairs contemplated the other day, will be renewed, and if the Surgeon General's recommendations go for anything, the repairs will be much more extensive than at first anticipated. Dr. Bergin is an old member of parliament. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1871, from Stormont and Dundas, Ontario, and sat for that constituency until 1890, when he was defeated. Like many of our Conservative M. P.'s, however, he went down with a life buoy around him, and has since enjoyed the lucrative appointment of Surgeon General of the militia. He was through the North West campaign in a similar capacity, and the liberal allowance he received from the Government chest, was afterwards the subject of considerable comment in parliament. Previous to his acceptance of his present position, Dr. Bergin commanded the 60th Stormont and Glengary Bat.

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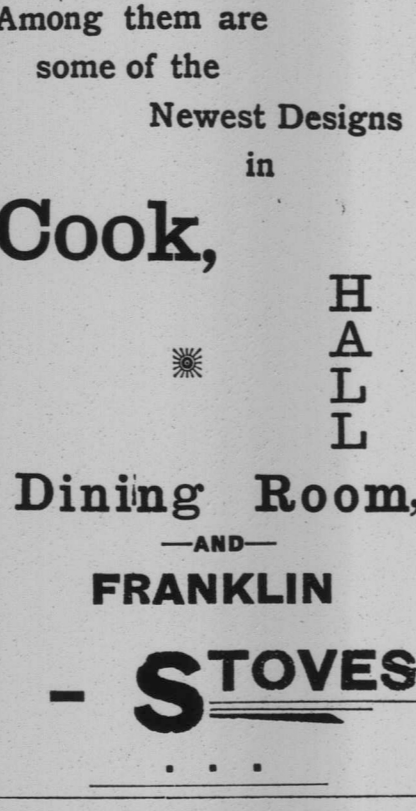
