The attention of the public is drawn to the very ment necessity of strictly observing the regulations lished by this Department from time to time conterning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should

(1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds.

(2) Parcels should be addressed with the Regimental number, rank, name and surname of addressee, followed by the last known address of the Unit with which the individual was serving; for example:

No. 0978 Cpl. John J. Kent

The Royal Newfoundland Regt., Hazeley Down Camp,

- Winchester, Hant's Camp. England.

(3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded, if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The Original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written

on the BACK of the parcel. (4) If second address is not furnished at the time f posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for

(5) Parcels containing articles of personal nature or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.

6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to

(7) Parcels should be packed securely.

Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later than the end of November.

TURKISH CAPTIVES HORRORS.

LONDON, Nov. 20. of British prisoners in Turkey, issued to-day, says that of 16,583 prisoners taken by the Turks, 3,290 are reported to be dead, while no trace can be found of 3,222 others, and it is believed they have perished. These latter prisoners were all captured at Kutel-Amara, so it is certain they passed living into Turkish hands, but no word has been heard from them. The Kut-el-Amara prisoners were forced to march across the dessert to Asia Minor without food or medical attention, as a result, the White paper says, "parts of the men were lying exhausted under any shelter they could find, in all stages of dysentery and starvation, some dying, some dead; half clothed and without boots, having sold everything to buy a little

NEW EXPRESS RATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. The U.S. Railway Administration has issued an order, effective Jan. 1st, increasing the rates on express packages by 16 cents and 17 cents on first and second-class shipments in the Eastern States, and 12 cents elsewhere. This will raise about 24 million dollars additional revenue, about half of which will be distributed among the employees in higher wages

MORE GERMAN HONOUR. LONDON, Nov. 21.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.) -

In the House of Commons, Chancel-lor Bonar Law announced that the following message had been sent to the German Government, and to Field Marshal Haig, for communication to German Headquarters: "Information has reached His Majesty's Government of shirking and lack of organization in the release of British prisoners in Germany, and their being forced to return marching afoot, miserably clothed, without food, transport, escort or guide to the Allied lines, with the result that lamentable suffering and heavy mortality has ensued. His Majesty's Government cannot tolerate the continuance of this cruel treatment (loud chers) and must insist that adequate arrangements be made in all the above re spects by the German authorities, with whom the responsibility for such lies. Otherwise we shall be compelled to take this into account in any question of the revictualling of Germany, or in satisfying the require ments of the German people, by forwarding food, clothing and transport to prisoners' camps, where they are not otherwise forthcoming, and we are addressing Allied Commanders in this sense now. Field Marshal Haig has also been instructed to forward in the most expeditious way, food, clothing and means of conveyance for the use of our prisoners in Germany, and our Allies are being asked to co-operate in this." (Cheers).

DON'T WANT THEM.

LONDON, Nov. 21. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.) -In reply to questions in the Hous of Commons, Chancellor Bonar Law said that it was impossible to decide the question of the return of the Germans to parts of the British Empire whence they had been deported.





(From the London Times.) Many curious objects have found their way to Christie's, but among the strangest vicissitudes of fortune in its records is surely that of the "Clog an air" (bell of gold) being offered for sale at that famous marta renowned relic which for centuries have been venerated by the peasantry of the west of Ireland. From time immemorial the bell has been in the possession of a County Clare family, the O'Cahanes, now represented by Mr. Marcus Keane, of Beechpark and Dundehlin. According to tradition, it decended from heaven, ringing loudly to St. Senan, the patron of the Seven Church of Scattery, a holy island near the mouth of the river Shannon, opposite Kilrush, in the earliest years of Christianity in Ireland, Hence it. was originally known as "Clog na neal," or bell of the clouds. But the antiquaries are agreed that it is the work of human hands, not angelic, and from its decorations they date it from the eleventh century. The bell is known to have been used for a long period of time in the religious services at Scattery (now a place of ecclesiastical remains of great antiquity) before it was given into the care of the O'Cahanes, the ancient protectors of the island. It attained to an extraordinary degree of fame and sanctity throughout Clare and Galway. No oath was held to be so sacred as one sworn on the Golden Bell. It was believed that anyone who told a lie, after being sworn on the bell, would have his mouth twisted on one side; and down to about the middle of the nineteenth century it was used successfully for the discovery of information when all other means failed. On one occasion a pair of saddlebags containing £340 in gold were stolen. Search and inquiries by the police were all to no purpose. At length the priest announced that he would have the bell at the chapel on the following Sunday to swear all his flock upon it. On the Saturday night a man came to the priest's house and said, "Father Kelly, there's no occasion for the Golden Bell; here's the money, every bit of it, all safe and sound." Latterly the owner has refused to lend the bell for such purposes, as he did not wish to encourage this curious superstition. The relic is in the form of a shrine which probable once contained a bell and clapper, it is made of bronze and


