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

## SERIOUS TROUBLES IN ATHENS

ATHENS, Nov. 16.

Troops fired from a number of oints on several occasions to-day to disperse after election trouble makers. To-night there are fears of further trouble which may lead to martial law, and there is said to be danger that the army may get out of hand. Stores, Banks and Theatres are closed to-day and soldiers patrolled the streets. To-night the population was keeping close, not taking the risk of leaving their homes.

DELAY IN TRADE NEGOTIATIONS DUE TO RUSSIA.

LONDON, Nov. 16. In the House of Commons to-day Bonar Law said he hoped that within a week the government of Soviet Russia would have so far fulfilled the onditions upon which Great Britain ased the resumption of trade negoiations as to enable him to make a statement. One of these conditions vas the release of British prisoners in he negotiations, but said this was ot Great Britain's fault, being due o delay of the Russians in releasing ritish prisoners.
