It appears from the various dispatches received that the war of extermination against the Modocs is being vigorously pushed forward, and that no quarter whatever will be given to the Indians. They are being gradually closed in upon, and we will doubtlessly soon have word of a decisive action having taken place. No effort, according to the dispatches of Col. Gillem, will be spared to make the punishment of the Indians commensurate with their crime, and, if possible, no Indian shall boast that either he or his ancestors murdered General Canby, and later dispatches show that this determination is being carried out to the very letter, and that the Indians are being driven to the immediate vicinity of their strongholds. The treacherous murder of Gen. Canby has inflamed the soldiery — with whom he was a great favorite—and they at least, will take ample revenge for his death. In fact the war is one of vengeance and extermination, more than it is of justice, and, notwithstanding the namby pandyness of certain papers, which affect a pious horror that such should be the case, we imagine that all right-thinking persons will agree that the Modocs have brought it all upon themselves, and that they thoroughly deserve the inevitable fate in stone for them. The Commissioner's Decision.
Halifax, April' 18.—The Commissioner convened the Court of Enquiry into the loss of the Admirte this afternoon, and rendered his decision. The course of Capt. Williams in bearing up for Hadifax is commended as pradent. The ship had not sufficient ceal on board at the time of sailing for a ship of her class. The coalwas of inferior quality, of which she consumed 79 tons per day, thus giving her less than thirteen days' supply when leaving port.
