Japanese are allowed to enter the country, but they are unstable and unsatisfactory. Sugar planting is the chief industry of the islands, in fact, the main stay of the country, and the planters are already complaining of a shortmain stay of the country, and the planters are already complaining of a shortage of labor. As time goes on the scarcity becomes worse and soon a crisif, will be reached. We have tried to import Portuguese and Galicians for the work on the plantations, but this has not been satisfactory. They are good workmen, especially the Portuguese who are a steady and progressive people, but they do not remain long on the plantations. After working for a space they make a little homestead of their own, and leave plantation work.
