SINCE THE COMMENCEMENT of the present year there have been reported by telegraph in the columns of the Chicago Tribune 903 murders in the United States. This does not include cases where victims were seriously or fatally injured and died thereafter, or cases not reported by wire, which would be many more. Of this total of 903 murders, more than one-fourth were the result of quarrels. During the same period there have been but seventy executions in the United States. Of these, forty-nine, or considerably more than half, took place in the Southern States, and of the fortynine all but four or live were negroes, who are hanged in that section upon very small provocation and light evidence. The enormous disproportion between crime and penarty is shown by these figures.



The harbor of the Churchill is said to be deep enough to accommodate the largest steamships, and the only difficulty in navigating Hudson strait and Hudson bay (no bay, properly speaking, but a great inland sea) arises from ice. It is not supposed the route could be kept open for more than three or four months in the year, but the projectors imagine that it would be profitable, even with such a limited season for its annual operations.

From Liverpool the steamers of the proposed route, after clearing the north coast of Ireland, would steer a straight course to Cape Farewell, at the southern extremity of Greenland, and thence would proceed due westward across David strait to Resolution island, at the entrance to Hudson strait. This latter strait, leading to Hudson bay, is from forty-five to one hundred miles wide, and its navigation is not dangerous.
When Hudson bay were reached there
would be plain sailing across it to Churchill harbor. The distance from Churchill ill harbor. The distance from Churchill to a point on the Canadian Pacific railroad, which would be the southern terminus of the projected line, is about 350 miles. The country is a wilderness for most of the way, and is of a doubtful value for future settlement, but the construction of a railroad through it, following the valleys of the Churchill and Nelson rivers, would not be a very difficult undertaking.

The whole scheme looks Quixotic, but it may only anticipate the future by a few decades. When population becomes dense in this country and Canad and the reserves of arable wild land are exhausted, coming

of arable wild land are exhausted, coming generations may find that the enormous ter-ritory of British America is not all a frozen wilderness. Parts of it may prove as favorwhiterness. The Oka Indians.

(From the Montreal Minerve.) Arrangements have been made with the Ontario government for the purchase of 25,-582 acres of land in the township of Gibson, Muskcka district, near Parry Sound. The Muskeka district, near Parry Sound. The price fixed is 50 cents per acre. At Oka, the Indians occupy only 1200 acres. It will be seen that the emigrants, or exiles, as we may please to call them, lose nothing by the change. Besides this they will be paid for the improvements, buildings, &c., which they may have made on their old properties. Moreover, in their new quarters houses of eighteen by twenty-four feet will be erected for them and they will be furnished with provisions for fifteen days, and more if necessary, after which the tribe will be subject to all laws and rules of the ordinary regime determined by the Indian act. There are in all about 120 families at Oka, of whom 80 are Pro-120 families at Oka, of whom 80 are Protestants. About forty-five will leave within fifteen days for their new home. Work will e commenced this week to construct their uses, which will be completed by their arrival. The cost of transportation will be paid by the seminary, which will settle with the government about other costs. It will be understood at once that many details will have to be discussed, but the principles and the basis of the new arrangement are sufficiently established to prevent all diffi-culties. Last Sunday a meeting was held at Oka, and the tribe unanimously adopted the new advantages offered them by the noiseless, and guaranteed ten years. 84
