

It looks as if our own country will soon be alone in Europe in having no nickel coinage. Nickel has many advantages for coining. It is hard and durable, and sets the fraudulent coiner at defiance by the fact that the alloy for the mint requires great skill and powerful machinery for its manufacture. Nickel being more valuable than copper coins of the metal can be of smaller size for the same value.

The above is from The Newcastle Chronicle. It is in the line of the argument advanced by Mr. Maclean in the Dominion House that Canada, which is the great producer of nickel, ought to set an example to Great Britain by adopting for her subsidiary currency a pure nickel coinage. If we do this, and if our new Minister of Trade and this, and if our new Minister of Trade and Commerce, Hor, Mr. Bowell, and our Agent-General, Sir Charles Tupper, put their heads together, the Mother Country may be induced to carry out the suggestions of The Chronicle, and Canada be the source of supply of many tons of nickel used every year in replacing the millions of money now represented by the copper coinage of the world. The Ontario Government have an opportunity to aid in the project, and we direct the attention of Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. Mr. Hardy to the extract. A very good idea of what the minor coinage of the world is, and of the growth of the movemen to substitute nickel for copper, may be got from the yearly reports of the Master of the British Mint for twenty years back.



He asserted that the administration of the assessment law was radically wrong, and that rehief could only be gained through a board of three assessors.

A REAL ESTATE RETROSPECT.

Mr. R. G. Barrett Tells a Reporter About Some of His Transactions. The lease of the Barrett property in King-street was talked of a good deal in real estate pircles yesterday, the general opinion ex-pressed being that the lease showed Toronto circles yesterday, the general opinion expressed being that the lease showed Toronto property to be in a good position. "Why," said a real estate broker, "these recent prices are higher than any got during the so-called boom. Two years ago the highest-priced property was only \$1800 to \$2000 per foot and now it is selling up to \$2500."

Mr. R. G. Barrett is one of Toronto's best known citizens. Thou, advanced in years he takes an active interest in business and property matters. Others have been influenced by the ups and downs in the city's prospects, but he has shown a steady confidence and acted accordingly. His policy has been to invest boldly in real estate rather than in bank and other securities, and the results of his operations justify his line of action.

This brings to mind the transaction I closed in the property where the Bon Marche now stands. I bought it at Oliver, Coate's auction room one day for \$23,000. When I was coming out a friend of mine, Mr. Smith of Smith & Ray, bar-

Afterwards I sold the same for \$39,000, and now I suppose it can't be bought for anything like the amount."

"Do you think real estate is a good thing to invest in?" the reporter asked.

"Most certainly I do. Years ago I was advised by a banker to put my money into bank stocks, but I preferred real estate security. What security have you that the banks will not fail? Look at all of them that have failed. Look at the old Gore Bank, the Commercial Bank, the Bank of Upper Canada, the Pederal and the Central and look at the recent failures in Australia. There is nothing more stable than well-located property—at least that is my experience. Of course there was no reason in the world for some of these bank failures, but the institutions went under notwithstanding.

"I remember a run on the old Commercial which was stopped by the late old Mr. Gooderham. The run began at the branch here and things looked serious when he brought up his bags of gold and placing them in rows on a table in front of the bank building invited all who wanted gold for the bank's paper to come along. Of course when the people saw Gooderham and his gold they were satisfied and the run was stopped."

Mr. James Dick, formerly engineer at the Musee-Theatre, has invented a new mechanical contrivance for use in furnaces and stoves and which he expects will effect a saving of 150 per cent. in the cost of fuel. The invention is a tank with attachments by which it is proposed to use oil in place of coal for both heating and cooking purposes, In large furnaces used only for heating purposes crude oil is used, while for cooking purposes crude oil is used.

Mr. Dick claims that by using his invention one barrel of oil will equal two and outhalf tons of coal.

The invention has a flue attachment coming out on top of the furnace, by which the furnes from the burning gas escape and the draft is admitted to the furnace.

The oil is supplied from a tank placed in front of the boiler, and there is a glass gauge tube by which the engineer can tell the amount of oil consumed per hour, and also when to pump in a fresh supply of oil. Mr. Dick has applied for a patent on his invention, which he claims will cost no more to apply to a stove or furnace than an ordinary hot water connection. Musee-Theatre, has invented a new mechani-
