The Probability is the Will Allow it to Recome Law Without His Signature. Now that the Tariff bill has been passed by the House the next subject of specula-tion is as to the President's position re-garding it. Will he sign it or permit it to become a law without his signature, or will his disapproval of the measure lead him to veto it? There are few who believe that he will take so extreme a course as vetoing the bill. There are not many who believe the President will sign the bill. It is thought his opposi-tion to the measure is so strong that he cannot consistently affit his signature to it, but rather than have no tariff legis-lation by this Congress he will permit it to become a law without signing it. "The bill will of course disappoint the country. I have no intimation or idea what the President will do with it, and he alone must be the judge of his duty in the premises. It is a peculiar situa-tion which is full of embarrassment. The Wilson letter must prove a stumbling block which will stand in the way of an approval. If the President sees fit to veto the bill the country and the Demo-cratic party will approve his action. If, however, under all the circumstances, he concludes to accept it as the only ob-tainable relief at this time, notwith-standing its objectionable and inadequate features, the Democracy must accept the result with equanimity and defend it as best they can."

In giving judgment Mr. Justice Mathew decided in favor of the chair-men, and said that the Lord's Day Ob-servance Act did not apply to such gath-erings.
