C. A. Geoffrion Returned With a Majority Vercheres, Que., April 17.—The election for the vacant seat in the Commons to-day was very closely contested and re-sulted in the return of Mr. C. A. Geof-frion, the Liberal candidate, by 157 ma-jority. The county is sparsely equipped with telegraph facilities, and conse-quently the returns were difficult to col-lect.

Following is a detailed report of the polling, giving majorities in the different districts: Geofficion's majorities—Vercheres 218, 8t. Theodosie 68, Varennes 87. Bisaillon's majorities—St. Marie 23, Contrecoeur 16, Beloeil 13, St. Antoine 138, St. Julie 26.

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



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
