

THE NEW TAXES ON LUXURIES

A Summary of the Items Submitted at Parliament

OTTAWA, May 18-The following is a summary of the taxation proposals submitted to parliament by the minister of finance this afternoon: MOTOR CARS—Excise tax on Canadian manufactured and imported

SALES TAX-One per cent on the sale of all manufacturers, wholesale retailers.) This tax not to apply to large list of essential food stuffs, cattle foods, anthracite, or bituminous coal or to goods exported.

STAMP DUTIES—Existing tax on cheques continued, but rate increased on bills of exchange and promissory notes, two cents for bills of \$100 or less, and two cents for each additional \$100, or fractional part thereof.

STAMP DUTIES ON PATENT MEDICINES, etc.—Henceforth to be affixed by manufacturer or importer instead of retailer as now.

FILM TAX OF FIFTEEN CENTS FILM-For each day used abolished, because of inequality of incidence as between small and large theatres. All the above taxes are effective om the 19th instant.
