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Church School for Girls.

1897-98.

The Governing Body of the CHURCH SCHOOL FOR GIRLS desire to call the attention of parents and guardians to the efforts they are making to maintain and increase the efficiency of the Staff of the School and improve the Curriculum.

The success which has hitherto attended the work of the School is manifested by the Tables which represent the annual increase of pupils and the wide area from which the School has drawn its support.

Table No. III shows that no less than eight Provinces of the Dominion, Newfoundland, and three States of the United States, have sent pupil Boarders to Edgehill during the past year.

By the Act of Incorporation the "Church School for Girls" is an Institution "FOR THE EDUCATION OF GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN IN THE VARIOUS BRANCHES OF LITERATURE, SCIENCE AND ART."

The time has now arrived when the special objects of Incorporation

require to be more fully carried out than has hitherto seemed feasible or desirable. One of the first requisites in an Institution which has attained the standard acquired by Edgehill is the securing of Instructors, who, by their record in Academical training and distinction, furnish a guarantee for the proper fulfilment of the duties with which they are charged.

While regretting the retirement of the late Principal, under whose management the School has attained its present position, the Trustees and Directors have spared no efforts in filling vacated positions with ladies from Training Institutions in England whose record is of the highest.

Notwithstanding the superior standard aimed at, no addition is made to the School charges. Elsewhere in the Calendar it is shown that the sum of \$270 per annum secures education and training for Boarders in all English Branches and the French language, with three extras, such as Pianoforte, Drawing and Calisthenics. The details are given in full under separate headings.

Retrospect--Seventh Year.

The "Church School for Girls" at Edgehill, Windsor, Nova Scotia, closed the sixth full year (1) of its existence on the 15th June, 1897.

Progress of the School.

The following tables display the progress of the School since its first beginning in January, 1891.

(1) The School was opened on January 8th, 1891. The half year closed on the 23rd June, 1891. The first full academical year of the School began on the 19th September, 1891, and closed on the 21st day of June, 1892. The second full year opened on the 23rd September, 1892, and closed on the 20th June, 1893. The third year opened on the 2nd September, 1893, and closed on the 19th June, 1894. The fourth year opened on the 1st September, 1894, being the first Saturday in September, and closed on the 18th June, 1895. The fifth year opened on September 7th, and closed on the 10th June, 1896. The sixth year opened on September 5th, 1896, and closed on June 15th, 1897.

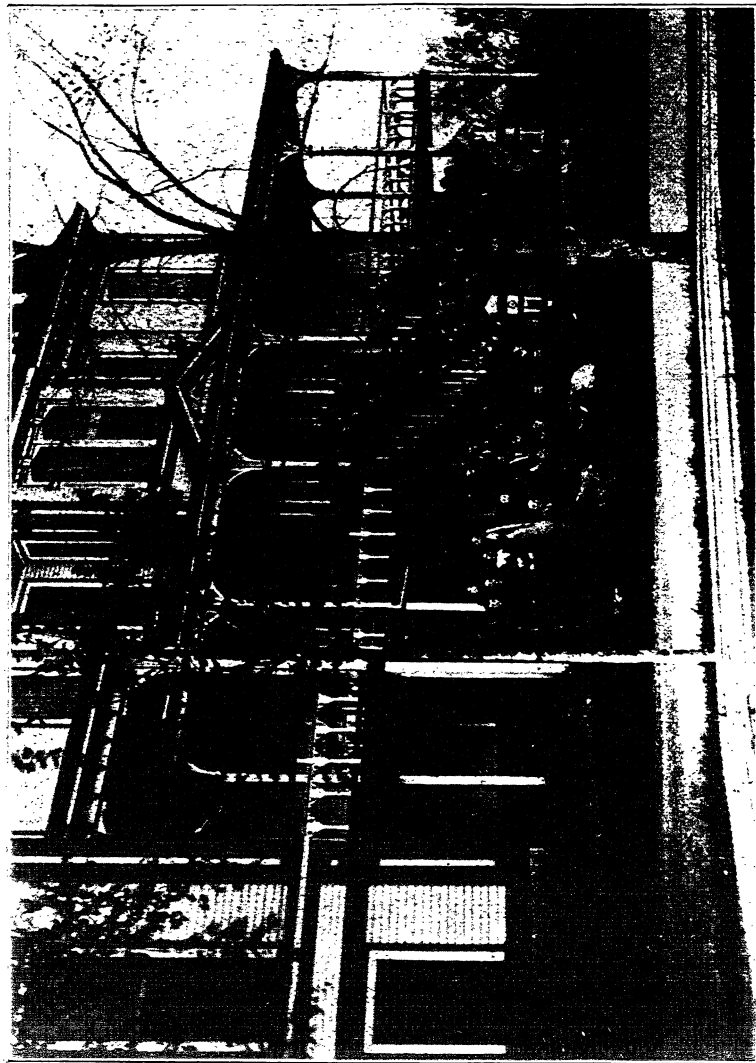

Brief History of the Establishment of the Church School.

The initiatory step in the establishment of this School was taken by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, on the 25th June, 1890. (1) The project was brought under the notice of the Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia in the address of the Bishop on June 27th, 1890.

On the 1st July the matter came before the Synod by resolution. After discussion, it was unanimously decided by both orders that a "Church School for Girls, at Windsor, Nova Scotia," should be forthwith established on the basis of a Joint Stock Company, and on the following conditions:—

I. The financial affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Board of seven Directors, to be elected by the Shareholders in such way as they may determine. (2)

II. The Discipline and Instruction, as well as the appointment of the Teaching Staff, shall be controlled by a Board of nine Trustees, three to be appointed by the Shareholders; one by the Synod of Nova Scotia, one by the Synod of Fredericton, two by the Governors of King's College out of their own body, the Bishop of Nova Scotia, and the Bishop of Fredericton. The Bishop of Nova Scotia to be Chairman *ex-officio*. (3)

On the 2nd July, 1890, the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton⁽¹⁾ concurred in the project. The first meeting of the Promoters was held at Windsor on the 10th July following, when arrangements were made for the purchase of the Edgehill property. On the 7th August, a meeting of the Shareholders in the "Church School for Girls," was held at Edgehill, and seven Provisional Directors appointed. On the 12th Nov., at a general meeting of the Shareholders at Windsor, liberal support being guaranteed, and the services of a widely known and most efficient Lady Principal having been secured, a Board of Trustees and a Board of Directors were organized, and it was decided to open the School on January 8th, 1891.

On that day the Lady Principal and a sufficient teaching staff, together with twenty-seven resident pupils and fifteen day scholars, were present. With much regret, several pupils had to be declined in consequence of the building at Edgehill not being fitted to accommodate more than thirty-five residents. That the school opened full was a matter for congratulation, but the insufficiency of the accommodation impressed on the Trustees and Directors the duty of providing, at the earliest convenient period, for those who had sought or might seek admission.

Steps were at once taken to procure plans for a building complete in itself, for the residence of fifty more boarders, with class-rooms, gymnasium, capacious dormitories and all modern conveniences.

The foundation of the New Building was commenced on the 18th May, 1891, within less than one year from the date of the initiatory proceedings taken on the 25th June, 1890.

The corner-stone of the New Building was laid on the 23rd June, 1891, by the Hon. Sir John C. Allen, D. C. L., Chief Justice of New Brunswick, assisted by the Very Rev. Dean Gilpin, D. D., Commissary of the Bishop of Nova Scotia, in the presence of the School and a large number of clergy and laymen. The New Building was completed, furnished and occupied throughout on the 16th January, 1892, at a total cost of \$30,000.

The rapid progress of the School, particularly in the MUSIC and ART DEPARTMENTS, soon called for the addition of eleven Music Rooms, an Art Room and an Assembly Hall. These adjuncts to the School Buildings were commenced in 1896, and sufficiently completed for occupation in September of that year.

During the vacation in 1896 the School-room was enlarged, and hot

water heating apparatus introduced throughout the Old Building in which the School-room is situated, thus completing the introduction of hot water heating into all the rooms both of the Old Building, the Main New Building, the new Music Rooms and the Art Room, sixty-nine rooms in all.

An Act of Incorporation was passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia on Tuesday, May 19th, 1891. Under this Act the liability of Shareholders is limited to the amount of their subscribed stock. The following provisions are embodied in the Act :—

1.—The Capital of the said Corporation shall consist of the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), divided into Ten Thousand Shares of Five Dollars (\$5.00) each. The said Corporation shall have power to increase the said Capital to a sum not exceeding Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000).

2.—The said Corporation shall have power and legal authority to establish and maintain an Institution of learning, to be called "The Church School for Girls," at Windsor, for the education of girls and young women in the various branches of Literature, Science and Art.

The first Wednesday in October of each year is the day appointed for the general meeting of Shareholders, to be held at Edgehill, in the town of Windsor, N. S.



Examinations in Musical Knowledge.

The CHURCH SCHOOL is now enrolled in union with Trinity College, London, England. (1).

Nine of the Edgehill pupils sent in their names to the Secretary of Trinity College, for "Examination in Musical Knowledge" during the last academical year. The "Visitors" who presided during the examination in June 1896, and transmitted the answers to the papers to the Secretary in London, were the Ven. Archdeacon Weston-Jones, Rector of Windsor, and the Rev. Canon Vroom, B. D., of King's College, Windsor.

The results of the examinations, for Pass and Honours, which are totally distinct, were sent to the Lady Principal in August, the announcement being as subjoined:—

(1) TRINITY COLLEGE, LONDON.—INCORPORATED IN 1881.

The objects of the College are generally "To advance the Art and Science of Music, and to improve the Professional and Technical Education and General Culture of Musical and other students," etc.

The Academical Board are empowered to admit into UNION or AFFILIATION with the College, Institutions, Schools, Societies, etc., subject to such regulations as the Board shall from time to time determine.

The President of the College is Sir Richard G. Webster, G. C. M. G., Q. C., LL. D., M. P. Among the Vice-Presidents are the Right Hon. the Earl of Aberdeen, who was President from 1884 to 1890. The "Court of Examiners" include the most prominent authorities in Music.

The Institutions in Union or Affiliation with Trinity College are very numerous, including colleges, schools, etc., in the United Kingdom (upwards of 200), Australasia, South Africa, India, Ceylon, Canada, etc.

More than 200 Local Centres have been established in the United Kingdom and the Colonies. The College grants MUSICAL DIPLOMAS and CERTIFICATES. The examination papers are sent to the Local Centres from London. The papers are answered in writing by students of the college or school to which the papers are sent, under the supervision of duly appointed Visitors. The answers are transmitted to the Secretary of the College in London, where they are examined under the supervision of the "Court of Examiners."

The Candidates at the Local Examinations are divided into three Divisions—Senior, Intermediate and Junior. Each Division is again divided into two Sections, PASS SECTION and HONOURS SECTION, according to the qualifications of the Candidate.

The Health of the School.

A notable addition has been made to the Staff by the appointment of a **MATRON and TRAINED NURSE**, whose special duty it is daily to inquire into the health of the pupils, and attend to them in cases of temporary indisposition or more serious and prolonged sickness.

Physical Training.

Calisthenics.

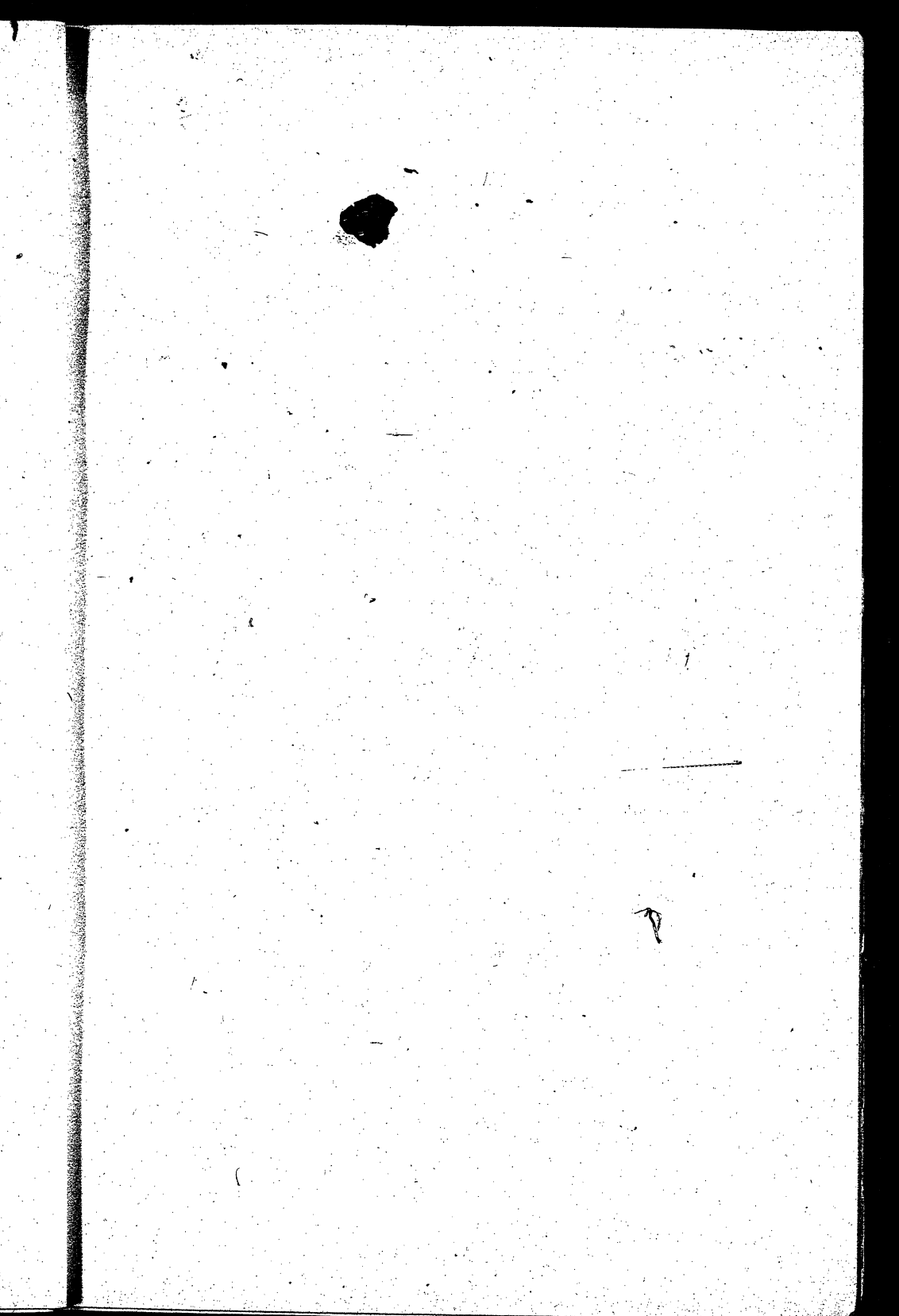
The Trustees are desirous that special attention be given to Physical Culture, chiefly on the ground that a good and serviceable mental education is inseparable from bodily health and systematic training.

Apart from these considerations, ease with grace in movement and bearing is a most desirable acquisition, and as a gift or a refinement often produces beneficial influence. Every encouragement is therefore given to Calisthenics and out-door exercise. The instruction comprehends:

1. Arena Drill or Figure Marching.
2. Physical Drill.
3. Indian Club Exercises.
4. Dumb Bell Exercises.
5. Bar Bell Exercises.
6. Wand Exercises.
7. Fencing.

Physical Culture—Delsarte.

The appointment of a resident Governess to take charge of the Physical Culture classes is a new feature in the Church School. The aim is to exercise constant supervision over pupils not merely in the Class Room devoted

to exercises in Physical Culture, but at all times and places during attendance at the School.

The Recreation Grounds.

These lie to the west of the School buildings, and consist of two level portions constituting an upper and lower plateau, separated by terraces about ten feet high in the aggregate, and a gravelled road 12 feet broad. The upper plateau is 250 feet long by 100 feet broad, and is divided into a Bowling Green, Lawn Tennis Courts and Croquet Ground. On the north side is a picket fence, supporting grape vines, to the north of which again is the School road to the fields. The lower plateau is 250 feet long by 63 feet broad. It is designed for Lawn Tennis and Croquet.

The grounds south and east of the buildings are chiefly in grass plots with terraced walks on the south and east sides, extending for seven hundred and eighty feet, and communicating with the Lawn Tennis Courts by means of wooden stairways.

The Flower Garden and Shrubbery are being enlarged year by year, with a view to cultivate a taste for gardening, as well as insensibly to educate the eye and mind properly to appreciate decoration, and make the external surroundings of school life attractive and enjoyable. A Skating Rink, covering an area of 1,600 square yards, forms part of the recreation grounds in winter, together with toboggan slides in an adjoining field.

The School Dairy.

Fresh milk is supplied daily from the School Dairy. The average quantity yielded by the Dairy is fifty quarts a day, the whole of which is consumed in the School.

The Laundry.

A capacious Laundry has been erected on the School Grounds. It is provided with modern apparatus and drying rooms, in which all the Laundry work for the entire establishment is efficiently and speedily performed.

The School Hospital.

This is a small building placed on the highest part of the property.

Being 100 feet above the sea level, it is thirty feet higher than the basement of either of the School buildings. It will be used in case of the sudden outbreak of infectious or contagious disease.

Standing and Aims of the School.

The additions and improvements have been undertaken with the object of placing the School in the front rank among Educational Institutions. In an age of keen competition, it is useless to seek public patronage unless special advantages and attractions are freely presented and persevered in. The best educational facilities and the best domestic arrangements are needed. The Trustees have employed a decided but most satisfactory method of securing teaching power in the Church School for Girls, especially in the Music, Art and English departments. But while the intellectual training of the pupils has been carefully attended to, the home life in the Church School for Girls has not been neglected. Indoor amusements of different kinds, especially for the younger pupils, have been provided, with a view to make School life as attractive as possible. And now the School possesses a handsome Assembly hall, a capacious and well lighted Art Room, and numerous Music Practice Rooms.



Remarks on the Register and Scale of Charges at the Church School for Girls.

In presenting the following Register for the year 1896-97, the Governing Body particularly request Parents and Patrons to examine the charges for Board and Tuition, and consider the additional advantages now offered to the public by the Corporation of the Church School for Girls.

From an inspection of the Table of Charges for Extras it will be seen that if a pupil elects to take ALL THE EXTRAS specified, namely, Drawing, Painting, Pianoforte, Voice Culture, Class Singing, Latin, German, (French is free to Boarders), Calisthenics and Needlework, the total cost would not exceed \$461.00 per annum for each pupil, as follows:—

The reason why the Governing Body of the CHURCH SCHOOL FOR GIRLS are able to ask such a comparatively small sum as \$188.00 per annum for Board and Tuition in all English Branches and the French language, is that the School, with an excellent Staff of Teachers, and enjoying the patronage of the Synods of the Dioceses of Nova Scotia and Fredericton, has relied upon, and has secured in a remarkable manner, the confidence of parents and guardians, not only throughout the Maritime Provinces, but also far beyond their borders, as testified by the Register herewith presented.

The CORPORATION has provided the large outlay involved in the construction of the capacious and well furnished buildings, which now comprehend sixty-nine rooms, and give ample and healthful accommodation to 100 Residents. The extensive grounds, covering nearly eight acres, give space for all the needful athletic amusements in a large establishment for the training of "GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN." The new Assembly Hall provides accommodation for Concerts and Recitations, Calisthenics, Dancing, Delsarte, and a Promenade in winter or during rainy weather. It affords scope for 100 pupils and room for 500 visitors.

The ART ROOM or STUDIO, of which a representation in photogravure is given, has ample capacity for forty students. It is a very attractive and enjoyable adjunct to the School. The new Music Teaching and Music Practice Rooms, twelve in number, afford very convenient and efficient facilities for the Music Department.

These advantages, coupled with low charges, could only be offered and maintained by securing a large annual attendance at the School. In like manner continued support can only be expected by gradually raising the standard of tuition and discipline, and by yearly improving on the methods of the past.

The attention of Parents and Guardians is drawn to arrangements noticed in another place, for students at Edgehill obtaining the distinction of "ASSOCIATE IN ARTS" at the University of King's College. The regulations concerning "Special Senior Students" will greatly facilitate the securing of this distinction and preparation for the University, besides affording opportunities for further studies in Music and Art, coupled with the advantages of a well regulated and comfortable home.

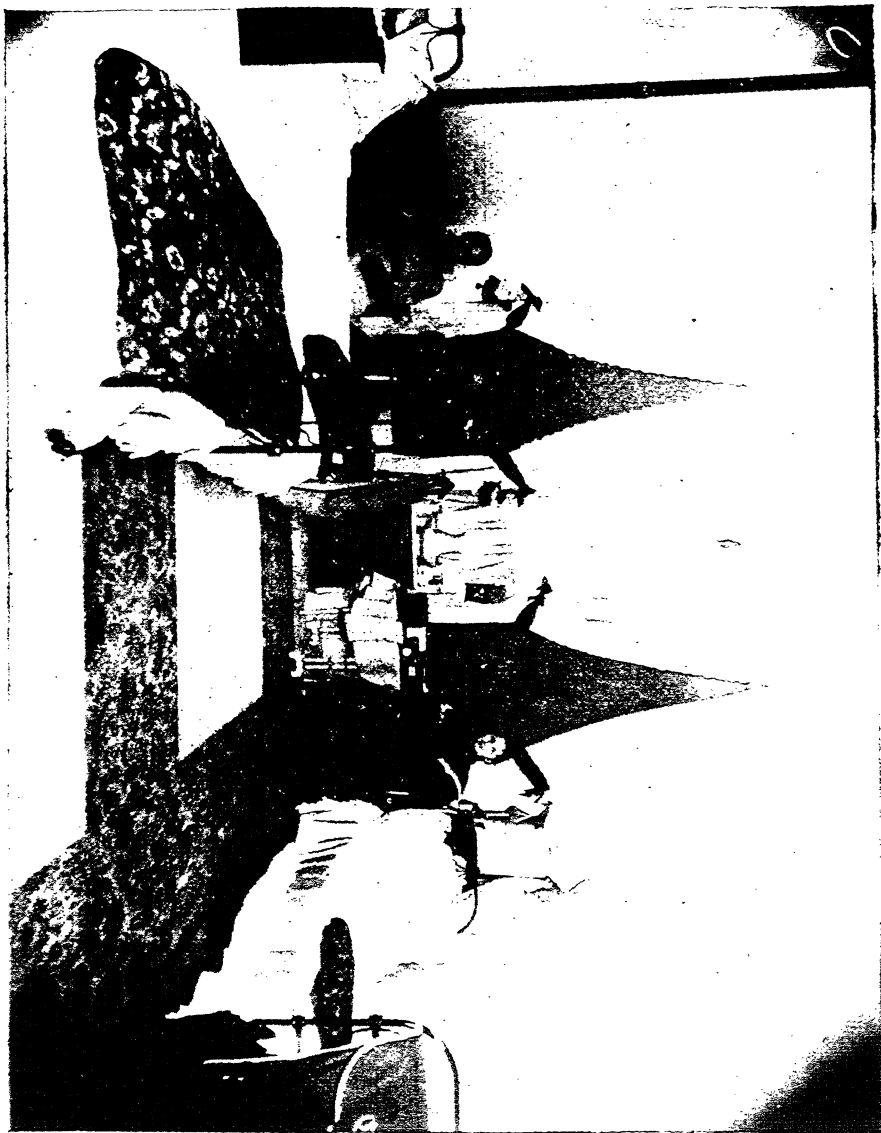

The School Year.

The School Year is divided into three Terms :—

Michaelmas Term—First Saturday in September to December 20th.

Lent Term—Third Saturday in January to First Saturday in April.

Easter Term—First Saturday in April to Third Tuesday in June.

There is no vacation at Easter, but Good Friday, and Monday and Tuesday in Easter week are holidays. Parents who desire their daughters to go home for these few days must make special application to the Lady Principal.

Charges for Board and Tuition in the English Branches and the French Language.

The charges for board and tuition in the ENGLISH BRANCHES and the FRENCH LANGUAGE are \$185 per School year, being \$75 for the Michaelmas Term, and \$55 each for the Lent and Easter Terms, to be paid in advance to the TREASURER at the beginning of each term. (See also “Trained Nurse” Charge, page 22.)

The English branches included in the charges for BOARD and TUITION are:—

The charges also include washing to the extent of 12 plain pieces and House Linen, weekly. Dresses, Pillow Shams, Starched Blouses, Skirts and other starched articles are charged according to a printed scale with which each pupil is provided. Plain washing beyond the number specified, will be charged at the rate of 35 cents per dozen.

Trained Nurse Charge.

An additional charge of one dollar a term for each pupil is now made for the purpose of retaining the services of a qualified trained Nurse to look after the special and general health of all the pupils.

A reduction of 20 per cent. will be made for the daughters of Clergymen on all charges. The reduction for sisters, not the daughters of Clergymen, will be 12½ per cent. on the fixed fee of \$185.

Day Pupils.

The Charges for day pupils (English branches) are at the rate of \$40 per annum, being \$16 for the Michaelmas Term, and \$12 each for the Lent and Easter Terms.

A set of apparatus to illustrate lectures on Electricity, Magnetism, Heat and Light, together with Elementary Mechanics, Hydrostatics, Pneumatics, etc., has been procured by the School, for the use of which no extra charge is made.

Boarders remaining during the Christmas vacation will be charged \$5.00 per week. No boarder can remain in residence during the summer vacation.

Terms of Payment.

In all cases an ADVANCE PAYMENT for one term is required, viz.: \$76.00 for the Michaelmas Term, and \$56.00 for the Lent and Easter Terms, respectively. Neglect of this condition will render a pupil liable to be sent home after an unexplained lapse of a period exceeding one month.

When a term has been entered upon, no deduction will be made for absence.

Half a term's notice of the removal of a pupil is required to be transmitted to the Lady Principal.

Application for Admission.

Applications for admission to the "Church School for Girls" should

be addressed to the Secretary, Dr. Hind, at Windsor, who will forward a printed form to be filled in by parents or guardians.

Children are admitted at the age of ten years, and great advantage is gained by their taking the entire course of the carefully prepared outline of Study embodied in THE SCHOOL COURSE.

School Requisites.

Boarders will provide their own bedding (except iron bedstead and mattresses, 2 ft. 6 in. by 6 ft. 2 in., which are furnished by the School), towels and table napkins; but on paying a net charge of \$15.00, bedding, etc., will be provided as long as the pupil remains at the School. The following articles are required:—Six table napkins, six towels, four sheets, four pillow cases, two white quilts, two pairs blankets, one under blanket, two pillows, two pillow shams. Boarders are required to bring for their own use a dessert and tea-spoon, two forks, two knives, and napkin ring, each marked with the owner's name. All clothing must be distinctly marked in the same manner.

Clothing, &c., Required.

1.—A suit for calisthenic exercises and physical culture, consisting of a plain black skirt (no drapery), short—reaching just above the ankle; a scarlet blouse waist, with loose sleeves and black collar and cuffs; black stockings and bloomers. Also, a warm, loose underwaist to replace corset.

2.—A warm dressing-gown and warm slippers.

3.—Warm flannel under-wear for winter.

4.—Stout walking-boots.

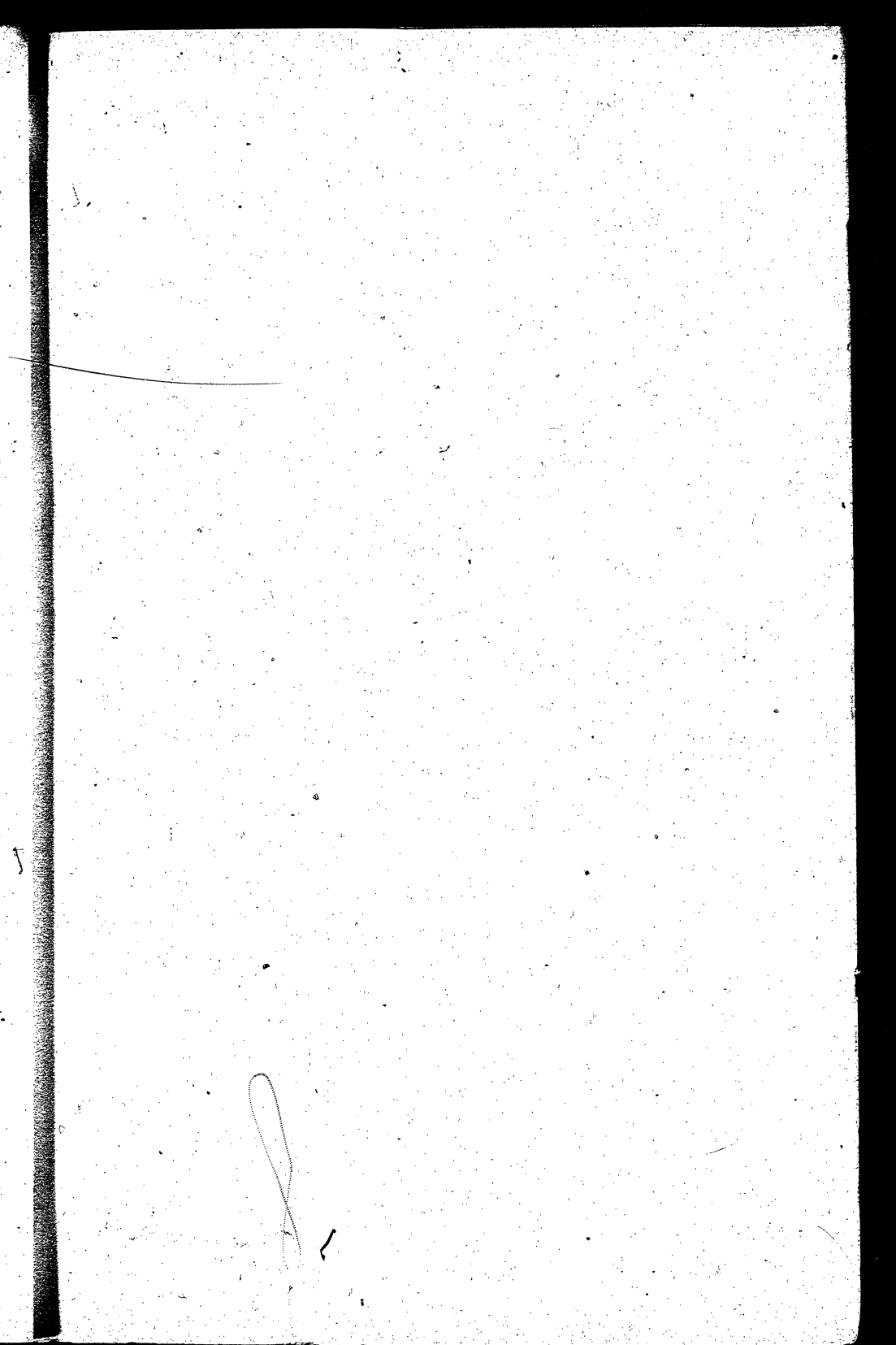
5.—Coloured petticoats for winter wear.

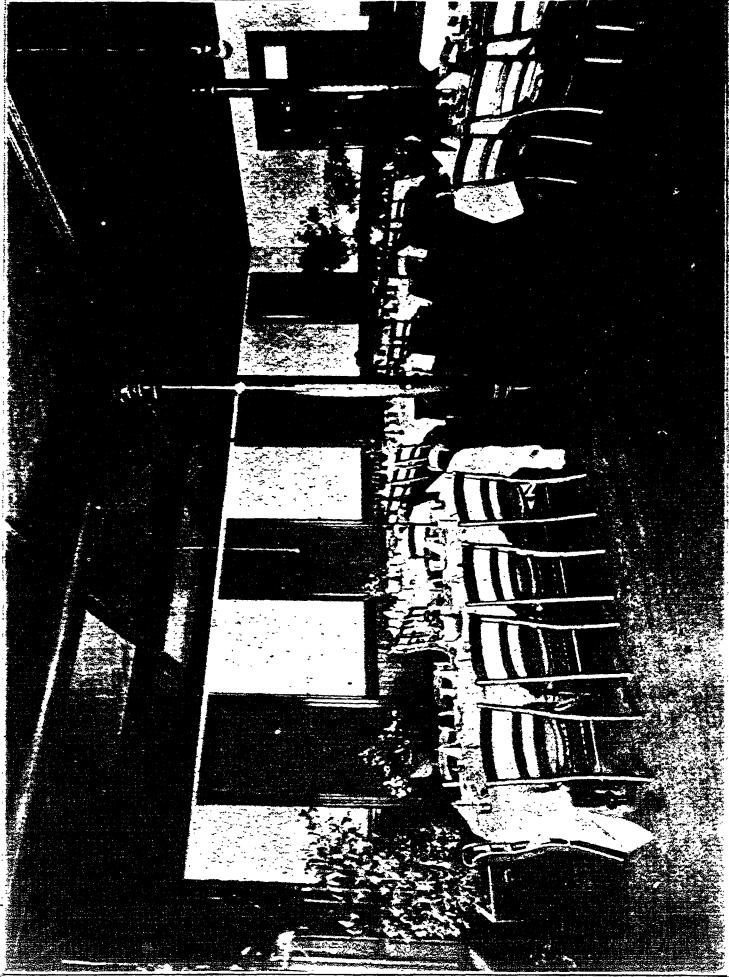
6.—Two bags for soiled clothing.

7.—Water-proof cloak, umbrella, India rubbers, and overboots and overstockings.

The only dresses needed throughout the year are:—Two or three print dresses for autumn and spring; two woollen dresses for School; two dresses suitable for church and street; one light evening dress of warm material, made high at the neck and with long sleeves.

No dress-making can be attended to at the School. Dentistry should be attended to before coming to School.

The School Course.

The School is divided into JUNIOR and SENIOR Departments.

Outline of Study.

JUNIOR COURSE.

Primary Department—Writing, Reading, Spelling, Geography, Language Lessons, Child's History, Arithmetic, (simple rules), Scripture, French.

Intermediate Department—Writing, Reading, Spelling and Dictation, Geography, Language Lessons, and English Grammar, British and Canadian History, Arithmetic to Fractions, Mental Arithmetic, Scripture, Composition, French.

SENIOR COURSE.

First Year—General and Physical Geography, English Grammar, Dictation, Analysis, English Composition, Greek and Latin derivations, Arithmetic, Mental Arithmetic, Natural Science, Astronomy, Roman History, Scripture; French, German, Latin (optional).

Second Year—Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Algebra, Physical Geography, Historical Literature, Analysis and Composition, General Elocution, Historical Readings, Grecian History, Scripture, Mythology, French, German, Latin (optional).

Third Year—Higher Arithmetic, Algebra, Critical Literature, Elocution, English Essays, Ancient History, Church History, Lessons on Art (the Old Masters), French History and Literature Readings, Geology or Botany, Physics; French, German, Latin (optional).

Fourth Year—Algebra, Geometry, Critical Literature, English Essays, Universal History, Church History, Lessons on Art (the Modern

Painters), German History and Literature (readings), Physiology, Astronomy ; French, German, Latin (optional).

Special classes for Elocution, Chemistry, Botany, etc.

It is particularly requested that the ordinary routine of the Elementary Branches of the School Course be not interfered with ; the Lady Principal undertaking that no studies will be imposed beyond the capacity of the pupil.

Music pupils may be candidates for the Examinations in connection with Trinity College, London, England.

Tuition fees in the above-mentioned subjects will be the same as stated on page 23 under the heading, "Charges for Extras."

Facilities and attention will be given to those Special Senior Students who are desirous of preparing for Matriculation Examinations.

Nominations at King's College.

Nominations exempting from certain fees at King's College during their Arts course are open to Special Senior Students. The privileges conferred are coupled with the advantages of continuing their studies in Music, Art, etc., and the comforts of a suitable home. In all such cases students will be required to conform to the prescribed regulations.

Associate in Arts.

The title of "Associate in Arts" of the University of King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, is open to all students at the Church School for

Girls who can pass the examinations prescribed in the Calendar of King's College for Junior and Senior candidates.

The fees for these, payable to the Secretary of the Examining Committee, are \$2.00 for Junior candidates, and \$4.00 for Senior candidates.

Both examinations must be passed in order to secure the title of "Associate in Arts," but the two may be combined in the case of Senior candidates.

Full information can be found in the King's College Calendar under the head of "Regulations for Local Examinations," or will be given by the President of the College on application.

Regulations.

1. The conditions of attendance at the School are **GOOD CONDUCT** and proper observance of **RULES and DISCIPLINE.**

2. Boarders are required to present themselves on the day before the commencement of Term. Day Scholars must be present on the first day of Term.

3. No correspondence will be allowed without the consent of parents and guardians; and it is advisable that correspondence should be limited. Visitors must present a letter of introduction from parents to the Lady Principal.

4. The Lady Principal is to be considered as the guardian of the Resident Pupils, and is responsible to the Trustees.

5. An accurate daily record of attendance, deportment and recitation is kept, and the results are reported to the Trustees monthly, or as occasion may require.

6. No useless articles of jewelry will be allowed. The dress of pupils must be neat and plain. A dark serge sailor suit is best for a school dress during the winter.

7. Presents of confectionery and eatables (except fruit) are prohibited, and packages of confectionery sent to pupils will not be delivered.

8. Pupils remaining during the Christmas vacation are subject to the restrictions imposed by the Lady Principal.

9. Reports are sent every half term to the parents, which indicate the progress made by their children.

10. Pupils may receive their lady friends on Saturday afternoons, from 4 to 6 p. m., but no young persons will be allowed to visit the pupils at any time without the special permission of the Lady Principal or the express wishes of the parents or guardians.

11. Telegrams should never be sent directly to the pupils, but to the Lady Principal.

12. All requests should be addressed to the Lady Principal, and not made through the pupil.

13. Pupils are not permitted to discontinue any branch of study upon which they have entered, without parents first communicating with the Lady Principal.

14. No pupil will be allowed to remain at Edgehill who does not submit to the rules and discipline of the School.

Advantage has been taken of the beautiful Lawn Tennis Courts at Edgehill to organize "The Edgehill Tennis Club," which now numbers forty members.

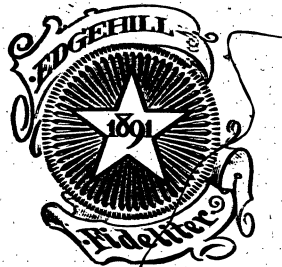
A Subscription of one dollar entitles each girl to membership as long as she remains at the School.
