London. Aug. 28.—Spelling reform is still the subject of keen discussion and editorializing. Must satisfaction is ex-pressed that President Roosevelt's pro-posals are meeting with opposition in America. Many prominent men hers are not averse to the idea of reform so are not averse to the idea of reform so long as it is the outcome of agreement between English-speaking countries. Lord Strathcona expressed this view when he said: "I would deprecate any radical change in the present English usage in spelling. I think such re-forms as are desirable should be by concerted action on the part of the two great English-speaking peoples." The Chronicle, editorially repeating its suggestion of an Angio-American conference, says reform by presiden-tial ukase is allen to the spirit of the English and apparently, also, of Am-erican.

Goldwin Smith's View. Bystander, in Weekly Sun: From the kase of President Roosevelt we the first time that to regulate the spelling of the English lan-guage is one of the functions of the president of the United States. Long usage has settled our spelling. All ou printed books have conformed to 1 and would be depreciated by the change; all our dictionaries would be discarded; while the saving to the printer would be trifling in compari-son. By substituting "thru" for "through" the printer would be saved three letters, while violence would be done to a general rule of the language which seems to repel terminations in "u" except in the cases of diphthong or incorporated in foreign names, such as "Hindu" and "Emeu."
