FOURTH DAY AT WOODBINE

SEAGRAM'S BULLDOG WINS THE WOODBINE PLATE

Three Favorites, Two of Them, Melcha and Baso, at Prohibitive Odds, Finish in Front-Lawyer Wins Through the Field-Petrolina Defeats Halting and Petrolina Beats Kapanas Colt.

A bright afternoon, somewhat windy with, was witnessed at the Woodbine Jockey Club on the resumption of racing yesterday. The morning was most unpromising, but the heavy rain left the track in a most deplorable condition, to the dismay of trainers, whose charges disliked the mud. The weather mended, however; Old Sol showed his face again, and before the horses went to the post for the first race, the well-harrowed track had dried out into better condition, although around the club house, the going was heavy all afternoon.

The attendance was good, and speculation was fairly brisk. The bookmakers had by far the best of the game. Mr. Seagram and Mr. Woodbine each scored a win; the steeplechase went to the Wellington Stable, while American horses captured the other three races.

Owing to the heavy condition of the track scratches were numerous, but notwithstanding the odds in three of the races were large, and some capital racing was witnessed. Several of the events furnished waterloo handiaps, namely, the Flash Stakes, the Ontario Handicap, and the Woodbine Plate. In consequence the sport was equally good as the weather, and the racing was quick and without much delay, to the delight of the public. Mr. Fitzpatrick's horse so far has been the best runner in the field, and it is hoped it will continue. Through three favorites were successful, Melcha, Baso and Seagram, while the other three secured the bulk of the money, as Melcha and Baso were at prohibitive odds.

The opening event, the Flash Stakes, at five furlongs, had four starters, and the meeting in one of the closest finishes the two most favored, Melcha and Halting, each went in on Mr. Seagram's horse sent to the post. The favorite, Melcha, while Petrolina's price went back from seven to five, and Kapanas' from ten to five. The race was a close one, but Melcha won by a head, Green being ten lengths back.
