SOVEREIGN BANK ORGANIZED

Archibald Campbell, M.P., Presided at Yesterday's Meeting of the Shareholders.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTED.

There Have Been 15,331 Shares of Stock Subscribed. Representing \$1,533,000.

Organization of the new Sovereign Bank of Canada was effected at a meeting of the shareholders yesterday in the tempor ary office, 14 West King-street. Archibald Campbell, M.P., Toronto Junction, presided and D. M. Stewart, the general manager, the bank were approved, and a motion was passed, conveying thanks to the Trust and sistance to the provisional directors in connection with the preliminary work. T. P. Coffee made an appropriate reply.

On being called upon, Mr. Stewart reviewed the history of the institution since undertaken a short time ago, and reported that the total subscriptions thus far received amounted to 15,331 shares, or \$1,-533,000. It was decided, to meet the wisnes of the subscribers as far as possible, to made an allotment of \$1,300,000, instead of \$1,000,000, as at first intended, the authorized capital being \$2,000,000. The stock is distributed among 660 persons, or about 19 shares to each person. Mr. Stewart mentioned that the Sovereign was the first bank to get a charter inder the amended Bank Act, and in compliance with the requirement deposited \$250,000 with the Finance Minister and Receiver-General some five weeks ago. He reported that the Toronto office would be open for business on May 1, and pointed out that his aim would be to secure à safe and sound business for the shareholders, rather than to do a very large business at the risk of incurring losses. He had every expectation that the bank would do very well, but asked the shareholders to be lenient in the matter of looking for heavy dividends from the very outset. They would come, he was certain, in a short time.






