Protection Brings Steel Plants Here Trust Officials Foresee High Tariff

Canadian Business Has Assumed Enormous Proportions and up to the Present U.S. Concerns Have Got the Cream—Coming of the Trust Will Probably Mean the Combination of Plants in Canada Under One Gigantic Head—How Wall Street Views the Situation.

New York, July 17.—(From our own man.)—"It is not the bounty of the Dominion government on steel and iron products that is taking the big corporations dealing in those commodities into Canada, but the impression that is general here as to the near approach of the period when British possessions to the north of us will be protected by a tariff wall of prodigious proportions," observed a prominent Wall-street financier to The World representative yesterday. Having heard a part of the conversation between the World man and Broker Robert E. Sifton, the independent company with a million capital, and the United States Steel Corporation seeking entrance to Canada, the first broker commented on his interesting comment. "Up to the present the trust has been getting the cream of the Canadian business. This business has been growing in enormous proportions in the past decade. Now Canada is beginning to get some iron and steel industries of their own. There has been menacing the control exercised by the trust for some time. With this new bounty and the old tariff added the Clergue and other manufacturers of iron and steel in Canada will be in a position to cause the trust no little trouble. Then, too, the trust officials figure a long way ahead. They have discerned the inevitable transition of the Canadian sentiment from free trade toward a high protective tariff. They keep their hands on the pulse of every country in the world. They now realize the time has come when they must put up huge plants on Canadian soil and absorb this bounty and tariff or lose the vast trade of that boundless country. You can rest assured they will not stand such a ceremony.


Miss Sadie Burns, 235 Seaton-street, Loses Her Life in the Humber.

RITCHIE NOT FOR JOSEPH BRITAIN TOO PROSPEROUS

Rests With Those Who Are Desiring a Change to Show Cause for It.

London, July 17.—The Right Hon. Charles Ritchie, Chancellor of the Exchequer, was the guest of honor at a dinner given at the Mansion House to-night, by the Lord Mayor, Sir Marcus Samuel, to the bankers and merchants of London, and addressed the gathering briefly and in general terms on the proposed fiscal reform.



He said that with those desiring a change in the system, under which Great Britain was so prosperous to show that the change was necessary and desirable. The Chancellor of the Exchequer pointed out the increasing prosperity in the trade and commerce of the country, as shown by the statistics for the last six months, and he insisted that consols were still the best and greatest of the world's securities, compared with the premier securities of other countries. He congratulated the country on the condition of the sinking fund, which, he said, in four years would reach the unprecedented sum of £45,000,000, and, under its operation, the remaining debt of £800,000,000 would be extinguished in the year 1913.

POPE STILL LIVING ON TWO PEARS RESTS ON ALL

Liquid in Pleura Can Not Be Absorbed by the August Patient.

Rome, July 17.—From to-night's examination of the Pope it appears that the liquid in the pleura remains at about the same level, which is in accordance with the opinion of the Pontiff's side. The physicians think the liquid amounts to about 1200 grammes. Considering the physical condition of the Pope, the doctors do not believe it possible that his body can absorb it as might a strong, young, well-nourished organism. After the visit of the physicians, the Pope received Cardinal Rampoldi, who remained in the sick room only a few minutes. He again gave the Pontiff a full report of the prayers offered in his behalf all over the world, and Holy Mass, raising his arms and saying: "I bless all those who pray to God for me." In Vatican circles there is gossiping about the great reception given by Agostino, at Lisbon, to celebrate his elevation to the cardinalate and his return to the papacy. The Pope himself, however, learns that the Pope himself, in his last interview with Cardinal Agostino, urged the performance of today's ceremony. In sharp contrast with these ceremonies are the continuous preparations for the Vatican for the death of the Pontiff. A huge spit 12 feet long, which has been used for the dead of the Pontiff, was brought from an old store-room today, and will be employed to roast quarters of beef for the isolated cardinals while they are deliberating in the conclave over the election of the successor to Leo XIII.

SIFTON'S IMMIGRANTS ARE NOT SO DESIRABLE

Importation of Strike Breakers Brought Up in House by E. F. Clarke, M.P.

Ottawa, July 17.—(Special.)—During the discussion on Mr. Sifton's estimates, E. F. Clarke brought up the matter of the complaints of the Toronto District Trades and Labor Council against H. H. Murray, Canadian emigration agent at Glasgow, of having secured mechanics to come to Canada and take the place of strikers at the Kingston locomotive works. Mr. Sifton's explanations were not regarded by the Council as being satisfactory. Mr. Sifton answered that the correspondence did not show that Mr. Murray had been employed at Kingston. However, Mr. Murray had been given another position. The Glasgow office was given the details of a newspaper man of Brantford, at a salary of \$1800 per annum. Mr. Sifton read a letter sent to Mr. Wilson, M.P. for Lennox, by Richard Blair, secretary of the Charity Organization Society of Montreal, thanking Mr. Wilson for his efforts on the immigration question. Mr. Lane wrote that Montreal was the chief source of the evils of diseased and pauper immigrants. Mr. Clarke quoted from the evidence taken before the United States Senate Committee, in which it was declared that the reason the Beaver Line got so many passengers was that that company was given the best of the passengers from Europe, those who did not wish to undergo medical examination, and those who were not wanted by the Canadian government. Mr. Sifton replied that 90,000 immigrants had been medically inspected in the last year, and of whom 700 had been rejected or retained for treatment. The number rejected in the United States was 4974, which was about in the proportion of their total immigration. Mr. Sproule spoke of the large influx of Russian Jew peddlers into this country, some of them suffering from trachoma.

SPY IN THE UNION CAMP CARD GAINED HIS ENTRY

When His Purpose Became Known He Was Promptly Dismissed From Hall.

Excitement ran high at Cameron Hall, the headquarters of the striking moulders, last night. A man who is thought to be an emissary of the National Foundrymen's Association was discovered in the hall. A well-dressed man sauntered up to a dozen or so moulders in front of the hall and told them he was a union coremaker and moulder from Chicago. Some one remarked, "you're no moulder; look at your small teeth." He explained that he had been employed for some time as a bookkeeper, but disliked the work, and was anxious to get back into the trade. He told them he could make \$40 a month as a bookkeeper, "but," he said, "I wasn't cut out for that." While not quite satisfied with his account of himself, their suspicions were nevertheless allayed when he produced a small union card. Not till the evening did the strikers realize the true situation. Shortly after 8 o'clock, the C.I.O. word came in a snuff box, mentioning himself in a position where he could distinctly hear the conversation of some committee in the room. He was told to move away, as the conversation was private. He went, but within a few minutes he was back in his old spot, apparently unconscious of what was going on. Suspicion was aroused when he was seen to enter the committee went over to him and asked him a few things about the moulding trade. He did not require a half dozen questions to show that what his man knew about moulding did not entitle him to the union card he carried. Word came in a snuff box that a spy was in the camp. In a moment the room was surrounded, and violence to his person was only averted by his hasty exit.

WHERE IS THE DREDGE?

Can't Locate the Sir Wilfrid That Went Down Last Year.

Port Hope, July 17.—(Special.)—W. W. Sparks of Pickering is searching for the dredge Sir Wilfrid, which sank in Lake Ontario a few miles west of here last fall. The dredge was built for the Dominion government by the Port Hope Works, Toronto, and was being towed from the company's yards to Montreal when it sank. Mr. Sparks is of the opinion that the dredge sank in more than 200 feet of water. It will be impossible to raise it, but, from the fact that he believes that the water is not deep at the place where it sank. As yet all efforts to locate it have proved unsuccessful, but the search will be kept up for some time. It is valued at \$70,000, and was insured for \$45,000.

JURY SAYS RICHARDSON SHOT TO KILL MATTHEWS

Evidence at Inquest That He Several Times Threatened Colored Man's Life.

Barrow, July 17.—The adjourned coroner's inquest on the death of Edmund Matthews was opened this morning, and the evidence of eight more witnesses was heard. The evidence of the dying man was corroborated by that of his son, who was present at the time of the shooting. Several of the witnesses had heard Richardson on different occasions say he would shoot Matthews. Matthews had stated that he had heard Matthews make any threatening statements was Richardson's son. Richardson and his wife were present during the whole sitting of the jury, and took everything very coolly, and always paid good attention to the evidence. Detectives Campeau and Mahoney were with Richardson and took him back to Sandwich County jail.

PREMIER AGAIN DENIES INSPIRATION OF ARTICLE

Raymond Prefontaine Also Takes Objection to the Story of a Montreal Paper.

Ottawa, July 17.—(Special.)—This afternoon, in the House, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a second time disclaimed responsibility for the editorial published recently in The Toronto News regarding the retirement of Mr. Blair and Mr. Tarte from the cabinet. When Mr. Tarte stated yesterday that the article was inspired, he declared that the editorial Mr. Tarte at once replied that he had made no reference to the Premier whatever. To-day, when the House met, Sir Wilfrid rose to a question of privilege. He read from the parliamentary correspondence of La Patrie, Mr. Tarte's paper, a paragraph to the effect that the offensive News article was inspired by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "There is no foundation for the statement directly or indirectly," said the Premier, "that the article was inspired by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Tarte was not in the House at the time, but he will no doubt choose the occasion for reconciling his statement in the House with the dispatch in his newspaper. The Montreal Prefontaine had also a newspaper reference to unfold. He read from The Montreal Star a severe criticism on the policy pursued in connection with the Lawrence River, and pointed out that one per cent of the amount that is to be squandered on the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, and the Department of Marine and Fisheries had no jurisdiction in foreign waters. R. L. Borden again urged the Premier that if the Grand Trunk Pacific policy is to be brought before the House this session it should be brought forward at once. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that he expected to bring down the resolutions next week, perhaps early in the week. The discussion on this morning will be the following week. THEEVES GOT \$150. Niagara, July 17.—The home of Patrick Connel, a farmer living about two miles west of here, was entered by thieves some time last night, and about \$150 stolen. Mr. Connel had drawn the money from the bank yesterday, to make the last payment on his home, and on arising this morning found his treasure gone. There is no clue. BACK WAS BROKEN. "By all means, my good Mazoni," replied Pope Leo, smiling. Dr. Mazoni then produced a camera and took a dozen pictures of Pope Leo, who was taken seated, with Dr. Laponni standing beside him and his vest, Centre, kneeling at his feet.

WILL PASS ON TUESDAY.

London, July 17.—The report stage of the Irish Land Bill was completed in the House of Commons to-day, after a number of technical amendments, in fulfillment of Irish Secretary Windham's promise while the bill was in committee. The measure will pass its third reading Tuesday, and will then be sent to the House of Lords.

ONE OF A NUMBER.

The unionists believe that they are being spied upon, and that this man is only one of a number engaged to disclose their secrets. He is reported as having asked the secretary of the union if it was not possible to get work in the Canada Foundry Company, as he needed money. A hint was thrown out by him that perhaps they could send him to some place where he could get employment. This was done, and he thought, to get the union to assist him out of town, or give him financial aid. With the understanding that he would not work where the strike is on, and this is a criminal act under the code governing restraint of trade, there is a strong reason to believe that the man is here for no good to the union. When he was thrown out last night, he was arrested in a way that was reported to the men followed him to the street, and expressed a wish to disfigure his face. He protested against such usage, however, still declaring he was a union man. He could not get away too soon, however, as he caught the first car, and was soon out of reach of the angry strikers.

STANDS ON PRINCIPLE.

"But," says the Premier, "he has gone outside of the realm of practical politics. He has taken his stand on a question of principle. The principle is that after extending the electoral franchise to Montreal, adding heavily to its capital expenditure and fixed charges, the Government should not be asked to nullify its own policy in order to provide campaign funds through the extension of the franchise to his own constituents or to his own judgment. Added to this was resentment at the exhibition of supreme indifference to the franchise extension by the Premier in asking Mr. Blair to take the responsibility of announcing and justifying in the House a party to a country project to which Mr. Blair never has subscribed; a project which is sweeping over the province generally by the unionists of inner circles of the cabinet.

YANKEE AT BURNED.

Affair is Regarded as Being Capable of Easy Adjustment.

London, July 17.—According to authoritative despatches received here, an American warship visited a number of the islands on the northeast coast of Burned, some weeks ago, and hoisted American flags and excited American tabernacles on seven of the islands, all of which are said to be British. The affair is regarded here as being capable of easy adjustment, being, it is asserted, without doubt, the result of a misunderstanding on the part of the commander of the American man-of-war.

WASHINGTON KNOWS NOTHING.

Washington, July 17.—It is learned at the State Department that there have been no representations recently from the British government touching the ownership of any of the small islands in the south of the Philippine archipelago and adjacent to the coast of Borneo, nor is anything known here of recent naval operations in that corner of the world, although the fact is recalled that about a year ago one of the American gunboats, commanding the waters, did visit some of the native chieftains on the smaller keys, and asserted American sovereignty. It is believed here that there is no possibility of trouble growing out of this incident.

NO RURAL BANKS.

But Mr. Fielding Says Subject Will Be Discussed Before Next Session.

Ottawa, July 17.—(Special.)—When the bill respecting penny banks came up to-day in the House Mr. Monk asked if the government was considering the advisability of establishing agricultural banks such as exist in Germany. Mr. Fielding replied that the subject had not yet been discussed, but that he would receive full consideration before next session. The bill was read a third time.

The bill extending the time during which the sum of \$50,000,000 is voted annually to improve the City of Ottawa was from ten to twenty years, was considered in committee of the House.

Dr. Stoyan asked if the government proposed to do anything to free the city from the danger involved in the piling of lumber within the city limits.

Mr. Fielding replied that it was a matter of municipal regulation over which the government had no control. The Washington system of a commission, he said, had been advocated. It was easier, Mr. Fielding argued, to have such a system in a residential city like Washington than in manufacturing city like Ottawa. He did not think the people of Ottawa would favor the commission policy just now. A commission might possibly evolve out of the present plan of co-operation between the city and the government.

Wanted Long to Marry.

San Francisco, Cal., July 17.—Miss Anna Head, daughter of the late A. C. Head, a wealthy land and cattle owner of this city, is on her way to England to marry Captain A. J. J. Jepson, who was a member of the Stanley expedition to Central Africa. While visiting California for his health about ten years ago, Captain Jepson met Miss Head, and they became engaged. The marriage did not take place owing to the woman's father over the marriage settlement, and it was announced that the engagement was broken.

Postoffice Official Wanted.

Washington, July 17.—A special to The Star from Brooklyn says that George W. Beavers, formerly chief of the salary department of the Postoffice Department, has been indicted by the federal grand jury, probably on two counts. A bench warrant has been issued for his arrest, but has not been served.

Head of Retail Clerks.

Zanesville, Ohio, July 17.—John R. O'Brien of Buffalo was elected president of the International Retail Clerks convention to-day. The next convention will be held in Galveston, Texas.

On March 18, 1896, he disappeared, taking \$12,000 of the funds of the bank with him. He was arrested in Halifax, but discharged by the British courts before he was indicted. He turned over nearly all the \$12,000 to J. W. Candler of Halifax, as a trustee. He then disappeared only at night. Two Swedish girls in Edwards County in the custody of Agent Kimball of the Prison were taken to the bank in the case. No. 29 Pike avenue, New York, was yesterday asked for clemency for Stern, Charles H. Smith, a lawyer from Halifax, told Judge McLaughlin that Stern was anxious to pay all claims in full out of the fund in the trustee's hands. He would purport to be a penitent banker, and would start on an honest career.

Chief Constable Committed.

Milton, July 17.—(Special.)—Chief Constable Bradley was today committed for trial by J. H. Home, J.P., for a while making an arrest on July 9, in the evidence that Ward was not himself and while being taken to the jail was struck by the chief on the head. One of his knuckles was broken and Governor VanAllen said that Bradley had been guilty of similar acts before, and there is a very strong public feeling regarding his conduct. The chief said that Ward was a desperate character and he was afraid of him. The case will be tried before County Judge Gorham. T. G. Mathison appeared for the Crown and W. J. Elliott for the prisoner.

Stricken With Paralysis.

A well-dressed and respectable-looking man was brought to St. Michael's Hospital in an extreme case for some time unconscious and suffering from paralysis, which had been suddenly stricken while walking along East Queen street, according to dispirited remarks made by the man's brother, Mr. J. J. Murphy, a sea captain, residing in Toronto from St. Louis, Mo., who had been in the city for some time. His condition is pronounced exceedingly critical.

Drowned in the Thames.

London, July 17.—Thomas Irwin, a boy 13 years of age, was drowned this morning in the Thames near the Victoria street. He could not swim and went barefooted with his companions were smaller and unable to render any assistance, and by the time he was got out of the water the boy was dead. The body was found in the Thames near the Victoria street. Edward Irwin, an attendant at the hospital, is the father of the boy.

DEFENDED LIGHTNING RODS.

Robespierre was Benjamin Franklin's Counsel Once. Philadelphia, July 17.—The recent acquisition by the library of the University of Pennsylvania of a rare and curious piece of manuscript that was once the property of Benjamin Franklin has resulted in the discovery of an original letter of Maximilian Robespierre, the notorious leader of the revolutionary tribunal during the reign of terror in Paris in 1794.





THAT RAILWAY MEASURE AS VIEWED BY OTHERS

New York Sun Discusses Procedure in House as Compared With Theirs.

The New York Sun: In a review of Canada's proposal for a new transcontinental railway line, in our number of July 7, we said that in the event of ministerial approval of the measure a warm contest might be expected.

The opening guns of the campaign appear to justify that prediction. The ministry at Ottawa approved the bill after a hard and protracted struggle, and the Minister of Railways and Canals, the Hon. A. G. Blair, has offered his resignation.

For the information of those who are unfamiliar with Canadian parliamentary procedure it may be said that the approval of the measure by the Dominion ministry is the equivalent of the presentation of a bill by a Senate or a House committee in our own Congress.

The ministerial bill is of greater force than the committee bill, inasmuch as it becomes an administration measure which all members of the administration party are presumably bound to support.

The failure of such support to lead to a resignation of the ministry as a body, and may even result in a general election. The latter event is tantamount to a referendum, as it is supposed to result in a declaration by their votes, of the will of the people upon a measure of importance.

The resignation of a single Minister because of difference with his colleagues is significant rather than vital. It is a complication of incidents, but it was undoubtedly impelled and precipitated by the government's attitude toward the Grand Trunk Pacific project.

It seems probable that the measure will be introduced in the Canadian parliament in a few days, as the regular values of these goods were from \$2 up.
