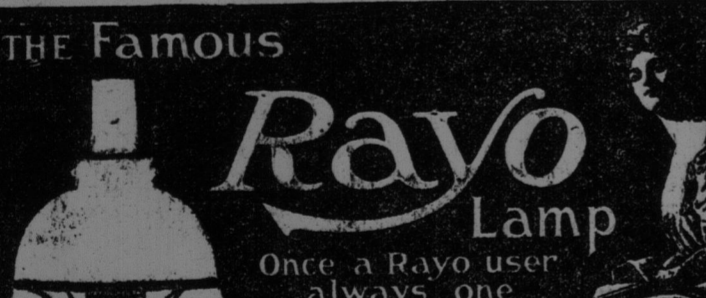

NEW MAYOR OF TORONTO HAS 4,000 MAJORITY

Road Race at St. Catharines Ends in a Fatal Row

Montreal's Emergency Hospital Ready in Record Time for Typhoid Cases—North Toronto for Sunday Cars—London's Mayor

Toronto, Jan. 2.—Ald. G. R. Geary was elected mayor of Toronto Saturday over E. G. Hocken by 4,002 majority. The results are as follows: Geary, 19,017; Hocken, 14,985; Davies, 604; Noble, 98; Briggs, 84. Board of control—Spence, 12,822; Church, 12,612; Ward, 12,309; Foster, 10,581.

In the plebiscites for subways and surface subways, for 19,298; against, 10,907; majority for, 8,391. For election of board of education by wards, for, 14,889; against, 13,262; majority for, 1,627.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—(Special)—George Bullman, of Thorold, was struck by William Bradley of Merriton, on a car while returning from the St. Catharines road race Saturday. Bullman's jugular vein was fractured and he died within an hour. Bradley was arrested. The men had a dispute over the race.

Montreal, Jan. 2.—One of the quickest pieces of hospital work ever undertaken in Montreal is now under way for the relief of the typhoid situation here, and it is expected that within three days from starting operations a fully-equipped hospital with a capacity for from 100 to 150 patients will be in operation.

The move was started by Lieut.-Colonel Jeffrey Burland and several well known philanthropists, and at once several offers of a building were made, that of the Bell Telephone Company of a vacant factory being accepted.

The building was taken over yesterday morning and since then almost everything needed to equip a hospital for upwards of 100 beds has been donated by various companies and business men here, while in addition \$8,000 has already been subscribed in cash.

It was stated today that the first patients will be received on Tuesday, when one of the most remarkable emergencies in the history of this country has ever seen will be opened to the typhoid victims of the city.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has homesteaded a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of home-stand entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

The steamer it is thought, was out in the gulf of December 26, which was very heavy along the Atlantic coast.

DEATHS LAST YEAR IN ST. JOHN TOTALLED 769

Of This Number 110 Were Caused By Consumption—Twenty-six Deaths By Violence

The annual report of Secretary T. M. Burns, of the board of health, for the year ended December 31, 1909, shows that there were 769 deaths in the year. Tuberculosis as usual claimed the largest number of victims, 110. Heart disease was responsible for 92; Measles, 22; congestion, 25; pneumonia, 38; infantile diarrhoea, 28; diseases of infancy, 67; senile debility, 34; cancer, 34; typhoid fever, 15.

There were twenty-six deaths by violence as follows: Suicide, by poison, 1; suicide by firearms, 2; fractures, 2; other accidental deaths, 7; burns, 6; sunstroke, 1; accidental drowning, 3; accidental poisoning, 1.

The total number 167 died in infancy (under one year). There were forty-six between the ages of 1 and 5; sixteen—5 to 10; sixteen—10 to 15; thirty-four—15 to 20; thirty-two—20 to 25; twenty-seven—25 to 30; fifty-three—30 to 40; forty-nine—40 to 50; sixty-two—50 to 60; eighty—60 to 70; 115—70 to 80; and seventy-one—80 and over.

Divided into months they were as follows: January, 63; February, 68; March, 84; April, 80; May, 83; June, 84; July, 82; August, 75; September, 66; October, 63; November, 68; December, 73.

There were 401 of the number males and 368 were females. As to nativity, 617 were Canadian, 149 foreign, and 3 not stated. Regarding social condition, 294 were single, 372 married, and three not stated.

FAIR VALE IS THE PROPER NAME

I.C.R. Adopts Title of Suburb at Request of the Residents

The name "Armstrong" applied for some years to an I. C. R. siding a mile east of Rousesay, has been changed to Fair Vale at the request of the people in that vicinity. This name is suited to the place and has been the title of the new post office in that vicinity for more than a year. Because of the fact that summer residents' mail was addressed to the railway name of the place "Armstrong's" letters almost always went to a post office called Armstrong's, above Sussex and a week later found their way to their proper destination.

Fair Vale is one of the growing and popular summer resorts along the I. C. R. and will soon demand more accommodation than is afforded by the small siding there at present.

SNOWBALL PLAY ENDED IN FIGHT

North End Lads in the Police Court This Morning

Two lads, named Bart Carey and Joseph Carr, each aged 16, were in the police court this morning charged with fighting in Main street on New Year's afternoon. They pleaded guilty. They said that the trouble started by an exchange of snowballs between them, which finally resulted in their going further with their fists. They were engaged in settling the dispute when Police-woman Ward happened along and placed them under arrest.

His honor delivered quite a lengthy discourse on fighting in the street, especially on the beginning of a new year, when everyone should be trying to live in peace and harmony. He told them they were liable to a fine of \$20.

Four men charged with drunkenness were fined \$8.

EDWARD BLACK OF NORTH END DEAD

A well known young man of North End passed away this morning in the person of Edward Black, who died at his home in Main street, after an illness of more than a year. He was in his 26th year, and was survived by one sister, Miss Beatrice, who resided with him.
