*For the Guidance of the Members of the Medical Staff and Visitors,
adopted at a General Meeting of the Board of
Management held 27th May, 1881.*

THE FOLLOWING CLASSES OF APPLICANTS ARE NOT ADMISSIBLE :

1. Any one who has not actual incurable disease, which prevents the person from earning a livelihood.
2. No one merely infirm from old age or from debility.
3. No one merely blind.
4. No one whose disease is venereal in its origin.
5. No one suffering from mere functional disease.
6. No one suffering from epilepsy.
7. No insane persons.

HOME RULES.

Visiting days, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 2 till 5.

I. No person shall be admitted to the Home for Incurables until the Board is satisfied as to their character and respectability.

II. The inmates must at all times show proper respect to the Manager and Lady Superintendent, and a strict regard for the rules and regulations of the Institution. They are also urged to cultivate kind and cheerful dispositions, thereby making a happy Christian Home.

III. Those inmates who are able, will be required to keep their own rooms in order, and to assist in such other domestic duties as they are able to perform.

IV. All such inmates as are able to leave their rooms, are required to take their meals at the general table, and for sanitary reasons no one will be allowed to carry food or drinks to their rooms; good manners and cleanly habits are particularly requested at table.

V. All who are able are expected to attend morning prayers, prayer meeting and Sunday services at the hours appointed.

VI. Inmates shall not leave the premises without the consent of the Lady Superintendent. Any inmate wishing to be absent for more than one day must obtain the consent of the Board.

VII. Male inmates shall not be allowed in the rooms occupied by females, nor female patients in those occupied by males, unless in special cases.

VIII. Inmates desiring to make a request or complaint shall inform the Lady Superintendent, who will thereupon bring the request or complaint before the Weekly Board.

IX. The inmates shall not receive wines or spirits or other stimulants without the knowledge of the Lady Superintendent.

X. The inmates may be visited by their friends on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays in each week, between the hours of two and five o'clock. No visits at any other time except in special cases.

XI. Should an inmate become dissatisfied or unhappy, he or she is at liberty to leave the home, taking with them only such articles as they brought to the Home.

XII. If any inmate shall not conform to the rules of the Home or behave rudely or improperly, such inmate may be discharged by the Weekly Committee at their first meeting after the insubordination has been duly investigated.

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TORONTO HOME FOR INCURABLES,
ENDING MARCH 1st, 1889.

The Fifteenth year of our "Home" has passed away, leaving behind its record of earnest endeavour, of increased power for usefulness, and of deepened gratitude to Almighty God, on the part of the Managers, that they have been permitted to share in dispensing the blessings of this most excellent Charity.

Where the work of Remedial institutions for the sick and suffering ceases, ours begin. When the Hospital has done all that it can, and hope of permanent cure has been given up, the Incurable Patient cannot be allowed any longer to occupy the space required for those who are the Hospitals' proper care, the sick and injured ones whom nursing and science can assist to restore to health.

To such Incurable patients we open wide our doors, they are our first and greatest care.

But often in private cases of incurable disease, the constant attentions, the increased expenses, the weary watchings are too great for friends and relatives to bear. It may be a willing son, whose days are spent in struggle for daily bread, or a wife, whose household duties to her little flock must be entirely neglected in the nursing of the invalid. For families in such straits we offer the relief and help of our larger and more ample "Home."

But even should other circumstances be favourable, it often happens that the sufferers are in need of those pain-relieving appliances, or those constant special attentions which can be given only by

skilled attendants, in places fully provided for the purpose, or obtainable only at such a cost, as is far beyond the patients' limited means.

To the Incurables themselves we offer all the alleviations that are procurable by instructed care, and in a building healthfully situated and entirely designed for their special wants.

Three hundred and one (301) inmates, in all, have been admitted since the "Home" was instituted, and of these, 91 are now remaining in our care.

During the past year (1888), no less than 47 admissions were granted, or more than double the number of those in any previous year.

These came to us from the following sources:—From the Hospital, 11; House of Industry, 2; Municipalities, 4; Convalescent Home, 2; City Commissioner, 1; Old Women's Home, 1,—total, 21. From lodgings or their own houses, 26. Grand total, 47.

This greatly increased number is due to the recent enlargement of the "Home," but the limit of our capacity is again approaching.

Some friends have been disposed to criticize the action of the members of this Board for the refusal of applications, but we are confident that this has arisen from imperfect knowledge of our Constitution. The managers are obliged to maintain the institution strictly under its charter as "A Home for Incurables."

To quote from the records: "A Home for sufferers from Incurable disease, needing medical care and skilled nursing, *not for those who are unable to work from old age, or from some affliction which does not impair their general health*, but simply prevents them from pursuing their ordinary avocation."

The Board therefore earnestly asks that application shall be made for those, only, who come within these limitations.

During the year 15 of our patients were called to Rest, leaving behind them happy memories and comforting words for those who still remain. The details of their ailments are mentioned in the medical report.

We gratefully acknowledge bequests from the late Mrs. Pollard, of \$2,000, with the income of which, in accordance with her wish, here will be maintained "The Mary Pollard Bed;" from the late Samuel Platt 8 shares in the Toronto Gas Company, and from the late Joseph Wright, who was an inmate of the "Home" for a number

of years, a bequest given \$200, being by the late Mr. H.

All in the "Home" greatly enjoyed the excellent concerts and entertainments given during the year. The Board would gratefully acknowledge the voluntary services of the following Societies and personal friends:—The Robert de Bruce Camp, Sons of Scotland, Choir of St. Bartholomew, The Gaelic Society, Choir of Parkdale Presbyterian Church, Choir of Windermere Church, and a concert at which Mrs. Caldwell, Mr. Warrington and Mr. Fax delighted the inmates. Through the courtesy of Messrs. Nicholls and Howland, of the Permanent Exhibition, and of Mr. Geo. McMurrich (for providing the carriages), "The Hungarian Band" charmed the patients.

A concert was also given with success at the Horticultural Gardens by the pupils of Madame Stuttaford, the proceeds of which were given to the "Home."

On the 4th of January Lady Stanley honored the "Home" with a visit. Her Excellency was much pleased with the building and the management of the "Home," shook hands cordially with every patient, and promised to pay another visit when she returned to Toronto.

The spiritual wants of the "Home" in daily ministrations, and in regular services on Sundays, have been amply provided for by the Clergy of Parkdale, to whom we tender our most heartfelt thanks, and also to the kind-hearted visitors who come and read to our people. If ladies only knew the avidity with which a simple story is listened to, our "Readers" would be much more numerous.

Mrs. Craigie, our esteemed Lady Superintendent is, as ever, untiring in the fulfilment of her duties, and successful in obtaining the results of happiness and comfort to the inmates. Her services are highly appreciated, and thankfully recognized, both by the inmates and the management.

In a'l this work she has been most ably seconded by Miss Grace Mowat and her staff of seven nurses, and the Resident Medical

Officer, Doctor Silverthorne, whose skilled attentions are most gratefully acknowledged by the patients and by the Board.

The grants of the Ontario Government and of the City of Toronto and Municipality of Parkdale are thankfully acknowledged.

Our thanks are also due to the Medical Staff, who kindly give their gratuitous attentions to the invalids, thereby rendering valuable service.

To our solicitor, Mr. Mortimer Clark, and to the Editors of the daily papers we also give our sincere thanks.

In conclusion, the Board would call the attention of the benevolent public to our finances. We have admitted 47 new patients during the year, have largely increased our expenses by these additions to our numbers, and the enlarged size of our building. The expense of maintenance is increased nearly \$1,600 over the previous year. We have more nurses, more beds, more mouths to feed, yet the private subscriptions are not increased, and this year our working expenses will be still larger.

We have a debt of \$15,000 outstanding on the buildings, of which we desire to be relieved.

With confidence we tell these facts to the public, asking them to freely help, so that every comfort may be given with unstinted hands to those suffering, yet patient ones, whom the Good Lord has entrusted to our care.

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT,

MARCH 1ST, 1888, TO MARCH 1ST, 18 9.

The Medical Staff of the Toronto Home for Incurables beg to present their Fifteenth Annual Report.

On a recent visit of inspection the wards and corridors were found in a state of order and cleanliness, which left nothing to be desired, and which reflected great credit on the excellent management of the kind-hearted matron, Mrs. Craigie, and her able staff of nurses. The addition to the latter of Miss Mowat has been a great help and source of comfort to the patients, as well as a relief to the matron, who, in regard to the nursing, had thus had a large amount of responsibility taken off her hands, whereby she has been enabled to give more attention to the general management and housekeeping of the institution.

The walls and ceilings of the old building are discolored and require to be kalsomined or painted—the latter is preferable.

The large room, formerly used as a dining-room, has been converted into a ward, with accommodation for six additional patients, and the large dinner hall is now used. In every way this seems to be a great improvement.

I have always found the patients contented and happy, and thankful for their many comforts and privileges; were it not so, I should think they were very difficult to please.

The "Cameron" wards, with accommodation for twenty (20) patients, have been open for a year, and only three cancer patients have occupied them during that time, of whom two have died.

This is a very small number to be relieved, bearing in mind the great boon such a ward must prove to those afflicted with such a painful and troublesome disease.

It seems a pity that the public are not more fully aware of the splendid provision made in this institution for such cases, so that a

larger number may receive the benefits bestowed by the bounty of the generous lady whose name it bears.

Of course if these wards were full it would entail an increase in the nursing staff, as such cases usually require a considerable amount of nursing as well as surgical attention.

There are at present four patients in the male ward for phthisis, but none in the female ward, for an ample accommodation exists. Dr. G. Silverthorne has assiduously performed the duties of Resident Medical Officer, and taken especial interest in those under his charge.

All of which is respectfully submitted by the medical staff.

“That the mortgage debt of \$15,000 still remaining upon the main building is a burden upon the hearts and hands of the Board of Management ; and that the best interests of the Institution call for strenuous and immediate effort to reduce, and, if possible, wholly remove the incumbrance.” Adopted.

Fourth Resolution : Moved by Rev. Arthur Baldwin, seconded by Mr. W. D. Matthews,

“That cordial thanks are tendered to the medical staff, and to the clergy of Parkdale, for their faithful attendance during the year ; to the lady managers who have so energetically borne the care and responsibility of supervision of the interests of the Home ; to Dr. G. Silverthorne, for his skilled services as resident medical officer ; to Mrs. Craigie and to Miss Grace Mowat, and to the staff of nurses and servants for their happy and efficient care of the inmates and ample fulfillment of all their respective duties.” Adopted.

Fifth Resolution : Moved by Rev. H. M. Parsons, seconded by Mr. F. Barlow Cumberland,

"That the Board of Management desire to return their sincere thanks to all those kind friends who by their donations and subscriptions have sustained them in their work during the past year." Adopted.

The meeting was closed by the Rev. Dr. Parker pronouncing the Benediction.

The Inmates were much gratified at the size of the meeting and the kind words and interest exhibited by the visitors in passing through the building after its conclusion.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

HOME FOR INCURABLES

Adopted and Amended March 28th, 1884.

I. This institution shall be known as "The Toronto Home for Incurables."

II. Its object shall be to afford maintenance, nursing, and medical and surgical aid to persons suffering from incurable disease, and to provide for them, while inmates of the "Home," the ministrations of the Gospel.

III. Every subscriber of two dollars and upwards per annum shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting, at which a Board of Managers shall be elected for the ensuing twelve months. Every individual who shall pay in advance, and at one time, the sum of fifty dollars, shall be entitled to the same privileges for life.

IV. All money now in the possession of the "Home," or which may hereafter be collected or acquired by it, shall be applied (unless otherwise directed by the donor) to the general objects, uses and requirements of the "Home."

V. The affairs of the "Home" shall be under the direction, control and management of a Board of Managers, of whom at least forty shall be ladies, and twelve gentlemen, and who shall be elected at the annual general meeting of subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III.

The medical staff attending the "Home" shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board of Managers.

In case of a vacancy arising, the Board may elect a member to fill the vacancy until the next annual general meeting.

The Board shall control and direct all the business of the institution, and their decision upon all points of management shall be final.

There shall be chosen annually, and by the vote of the Board, a President and Vice-President, and, from among the Lady Managers, the following officers, viz ; First Lady Directress, Second Lady Directress, Third Lady Directress, Secretary, Assistant-Secretary, and Treasurer.

For the more convenient working of the Institution, the Board may from time to time appoint committees of not less than three of their number, such as an Executive Committee, and committees for visiting and superintending the "Home."

The Board may also enact By-laws for regulating the duties of the various officers and employés of the "Home."

The By-laws shall not be altered except at a regular meeting, after notice duly given, at least a month previously.

VI. The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings at least once a month, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. At such monthly meetings the Board shall have power to make additional By-laws regulating its own government, and for the government of the officers and employés, as before provided, and when necessary, after due notice, to alter and amend the same.

Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President and one of the Lady Directresses, or on requisition of five or more members of the Board. When a special meeting is called, the time and place of meeting, and the business for which it is called, shall be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and no other business shall be taken up at such meeting.

VII. The annual general meeting of the subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III, shall be held in the month of March.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make all necessary arrangements for said annual meeting ; to lay before the subscribers a report of the proceedings of the previous twelve months, and to exhibit a full and accurate view of the funds, property, and effects of the "Home."

VIII. In view of the large contributions given by the citizens of Toronto, and the grant made by the City Council in aid of the "Home," applications from the city of Toronto for admission to the "Home" shall have preference over others.

IX. The Board will receive incurable persons from any municipality in Ontario outside of Toronto, on condition that a bond be given by

said municipality to pay such sum as the Board may determine from time to time for the maintenance of each patient so sent. Provided always, that a certificate as to general character and circumstances shall have been received from such persons as the Board may approve; that a certificate be given by the gaol surgeon of the municipality, or by such other medical gentlemen as the Board may approve, that the person seeking admission is incurable; provided also, that such certificate be endorsed by the medical officers of this Institution, and that the application be approved by the Board at a regular monthly meeting.

X. The foregoing Constitution shall not be altered, unless it be at the annual general meeting of subscribers, notice of such alteration having been given at least three months before the annual meeting, and approved by a majority of the Board of Managers.

I. DUTIES OF
the Chairman (Managers) shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall cause a Chairman *pro tempore* to be appointed in his absence.

The Chairman shall be acquitted of all other duties.

He shall direct the Secretary to insert in the notices of the meetings of the Board of Managers are to be held.

II. The Secretary shall attend the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and shall do so for the purpose.

She shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall do not belong to the Board of Managers.

She shall cause notices of the meetings of the Board of Managers, at least ten days before the meeting, to be sent to each of the Managers, at least ten days before the meeting.

The Assistant Secretary shall attend the meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall do so for the purpose.

III. The Treasurer shall attend the meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall give a receipt for all money received by the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

Amended and Adopted March 28, 1884,
and March 20, 1886.

I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.—At meetings of the Board of Managers the Chairman (elected as such from amongst the gentlemen Managers) shall preside. In his absence the Managers present shall name a Chairman *pro tem*.

The Chairman shall be the judge of order, and his decisions thereon shall be acquiesced in without debate.

He shall direct the Secretary when special meetings are ordered, to insert in the notices the import of the special business upon which the Managers are to convene.

II. The Secretary shall keep fair and regular minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers in a book to be provided for that purpose.

She shall preserve all the records and papers of the Society which do not belong to the Treasurer.

She shall cause a notice of each stated meeting, and of each special meeting of the Board of Managers, to be sent to the address of each Manager, at least one day previous to the day fixed for the meeting.

The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in her duties when required, and act for her at meetings of the Board in her absence.

III. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Society, and shall give a receipt to the persons from whom she may receive money.

For the sake of regularity, and in order to establish the amount, all persons who may hand money to the Treasurer are requested to ask for a receipt of the money so paid over.

When the Treasurer does not require the money in paying accounts which have passed the Board, she shall deposit the money or such part of it as may not be immediately required in the Savings Bank, to the credit of her official account as Treasurer.

She shall keep a fair and regular account of the receipts and expenditures, and her account book and bank book shall be open to the inspection of the Managers at each stated meeting.

Prior to the general annual meeting she shall prepare a statement showing the receipts and expenditures during the year, duly classified and audited, that a lucid, full explanation, or exposition of the working of the finances of the "Home," may be submitted at the general meeting.

The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by a Committee of the gentleman Managers named by the Chairman or by the Board.

IV. The Treasurer only shall pay accounts for articles and services supplied to the "Home" when duly certified, and in all cases of payment, shall require a receipt.

Accounts shall be certified to be correct as to prices, by the Managers who made the purchase of the articles and shall be initialed "correct," accordingly. They shall then be initialed by the Matron or the Superintendent, to show that the articles were received at the "Home."

The accounts shall then be laid before the Managers at the stated monthly meetings, and when payment is ordered, the order shall be entered on the minutes by the Secretary.

The Treasurer can then pay the accounts, and an entry upon the minutes will be a sufficient authority to the Treasurer to pay whatever accounts or disbursements the Board may have ordered.

V. The Managers may appoint from time to time Committees from amongst themselves to attend to any special duties.

As a rule such committees shall consist of not less than three, and not less than two shall be considered a quorum to act.

These Committees, for the sake of regularity and for future reference, shall as a rule report to the Board in writing.

VI. The stated meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Friday of every month, at such hour as the Board may from time to time appoint.

VII. The Superintendent and Matron shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board.

They shall do all in their power to promote the comfort of the inmates of the "Home," and shall follow the instructions of the Board

of the lady Managers for the week, and of the medical staff when orders are given.

They shall keep a book for entering all such things as they may consider necessary for the use of the "Home," and submit it to the weekly visitors. When disbursements are ordered, a regular account of the same shall be kept for the information of the Managers and the Treasurer.

VIII. The Managers deeming the point of admission of inmates into the "Home," to be a very important matter, decided that the following formalities shall regularly be observed.

1st. Applicants for admission into the "Home" are to state how long they have resided in the city, their residence, age, disease, and circumstances, also whether he or she has been attended by any medical man, and whether any clergyman has visited.

2nd. Thereafter two of the Managers shall visit the residence named (two ladies if the applicant be a woman, two gentlemen if the applicant be a man). They shall look at the surroundings of the applicant, ascertain what can be practically known of the person's circumstances, habits and general character, in short, get all the available information about the case.

They shall see the clergyman and the doctor, if either have been in attendance, hear what each has to say about the applicant, and report to the Board of Managers.

3rd. That two of the medical staff of the "Home" shall visit each applicant for admission, and report to the Board of Managers, the character of the disease and if incurable ; and for any applicant outside of Toronto, the equivalent testimonials shall be required.

Each application for admission to the "Home" shall be presented at the regular meeting of the Board, and, if entertained, after due investigation, shall be acted upon at the following regular meeting of the Board.

4th. If, after the name of an applicant has in due course been approved by the Board, a considerable time should elapse before the occurrence of a vacancy, and there is reason to apprehend that such patient is at, or near, the point of death, then the resident medical officer shall be directed to visit the case and to report to the Board, as to the advisability under the circumstances of removing the patient to the "Home."

5th. All the inmates of the "Home" must distinctly understand that an admission confers no right of permanent residence in the "Home," and at any time the Managers have the power of dismissing an inmate for what they may deem a sufficient cause ; of its sufficiency the Managers are to be the sole judges.

6th. Any inmate who shall leave the "Home" without the consent of the Directors, thereby forfeits all claims for residence within it, and will not be re-admitted.

IX. Any person received into this "Home" as a free patient, if possessed of money or property shall be required to convey the same to the Board for the use of the Institution, and if inheriting property while an inmate of the "Home," and desiring to leave, shall be required to pay the usual charge for board, during the period of residence in the "Home."

X. Any members absenting themselves from three consecutive monthly meetings, except in cases of illness or absence from the city, shall have their names struck off the list of the managing committee.
