CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION.

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. That this Association be called the "Province of Quebec Rifle Association," and shall have for its object the encouragement of rifle shooting in the Province.

2. Any person subscribing two dollars to the funds of the Association shall be a member thereof for the year in which such subscription shall be made.

3. A donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time, for that express purpose, or of a prize of not less value than forty dollars, to be competed for at the annual prize meeting, shall make the donor eligible for election as a life member at next annual meeting of Council.

4. Any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps subscribing ten dollars or upwards, per annum, to the funds of the Association shall be considered as being in connection with it and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in proportion of one for every dollar so subscribed. The Association thus affiliating is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships.

5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, named by the Council. (The Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec for the time being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron.")

6. There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.

7. There shall be four Vice-Presidents—one for each Brigade Major's Division—to be elected in the same manner as the President.

8. There shall be a Council composed as follows, viz:

1st. Two members from each Brigade Major's Division, to be elected annually at the business meeting.

2nd. One representative member from each affiliated Association or Corps in this Province.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, the District Deputy Adjutants-General of Militia and Brigade Majors, for Province of Quebec, shall be members "ex-officio" of the Council. Five members of Council shall form a quorum, and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council shall have the power of filling such vacancies. All members of Council, excepting representatives of affiliated Associations, must be individual members of the Association.

10. Representatives to the Council shall be chosen by the Associations they represent, and the names of delegates when changed shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month prior to the annual meeting.

11. The Council shall, at its first meeting, choose from its members a chairman.

12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.

13. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually na ha an or for As by bei ond of

The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts or deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.

14. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such by-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no by-law being in any case altered or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.

15. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the Council, and the prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed from time to time by the Council.

16 An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the prize meeting as may be found practicable.

17. An Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association, for the election of Officers and Council, who shall assume office on first day of succeeding January, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the by-laws.

18. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made, except by a resolution duly passed at the annual business meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least previous to the annual business meeting, at which the same is to be proposed and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments, and also to post them on the bulletin board at the opening of the annual matches.

BY-LAWS.

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. The Annual Business Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second day of the annual matches.

2. There shall be two ordinary meetings of Council, the first of which shall be held immediately after the annual business meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

3. Extraordinary meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by any six members of the Council; notification being sent to each member of Council at least ten days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such extraordinary meetings.

4. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book, kept for that purpose, by the Secretary, open to the inspection of all members of the Council, and published with the annual report.

5. There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at their first meeting.

6. The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

7. All expenditure for current expenses, which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of a member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of he Council of the Association.

8. A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer. I pas ges J hav poli

THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

It is now the usual season to review the proceedings of the past year, and in doing so it may be well to refer to the suggestions presented in last report.

These have been carried out as far as practicable; the results have been satisfactory, and we would recommend the same liberal policy to be continued.

RANGES.

The Ranges themselves, are of course the first question. Very material improvements and changes were authorized by the Militia Department, and several others were, in consequence, undertaken by the Association; but, unfortunately, the contractor finished none of the work satisfactorily. This was a cause of much disappointment to those using the ranges, and a source of great expense and annoyance to the Association; as it was absolutely necessary to dig a temporary drain to carry off the water, which had flooded the range, and to cart quite a quantity of ashes and cinders to cover over the soft ground.

The new wooden targets also, were not properly fitted, and worked with so much difficulty that great delay was caused at the matches. The ranges were especially examined in October, a report submitted to the Executive Committee, and the suggestions made therein acted upon in due course.

The proposed improvements authorized, would give twenty third-class targets, or eighteen second-class, for use at once, and the plan of using a separate butt for each distance (200, 500 and 600 yds.) would reduce the risk of accidents to a minimum. It is advisable that a suitable building for offices be erected, and the present office fitted for a store-room; as the moves ble property of the association receives considerable damage yearly for want of proper storage.

The permanent acquisition of the ranges would be a great boon to the association, and to the active militia force, as it is now about the only piece of ground left in, or near the city which would be suitable for drill purposes, and it is to be hoped that finally, some way will be found to secure it. The question of the drainage of the ranges has been made the subject of a separate report by Major Kennedy, of the Engineers.

The question of draining the adjacent streets, appears to have come up repeatedly in the health, and other corporation committees, and it is high time some action was taken by them, as at present the ranges appear to be an open drain and cess-pool for Sebastapol street.

PRIZE-MEETING.

The various matches were arranged much as usual, with numerous prizes, but the values had to be reduced to meet our resources. The date was made a week later than usual, in order to accommodate our country friends, but owing to the backwardness of the season, they could not attend as numerously as expected; also the Ontario matches taking place the following week, we had fewer competitors from the West than usual. The skirmishing match was only in part successful, the practical working of the match giving much trouble. It is advisable that the cavalry, and this match, should be on different days, or else a longer time allowed for them; the cavalry, for the past two years, not having finished till long after the usual hour of closing.

The timing system was very advantageous, and the matches were easily completed in four days.

The marking was not as good as desirable, and the new committee would do well to consider if this department cannot be improved upon.

The Dolan cup was won this year by Pte. Jas. Riddle, 6th Fusiliers.

The Accident Challenge Cup is held for the year by the Prince of Wales Rifles.

The badges have been given, as usual, to the affiliated associations.

The total number of entries was 1630, against 1579 last year. The number of affiliated associations has increased, and the individual membership has been reduced.

MARTINI HENRY RIFLES.

Through the courtesy of the Minister of Militia we have been allowed the use of 20 M. H. Rifles. Of these, ten were placed for the use of the city corps, 5 were sent to Quebec, and 1 to Lt.-Col. Sheppard, Joliette. No other affiliated associations applied for them. As this is to be the future weapon of the Dominion, it is advisable that all associations should avail themselves of the privilege of practicing with it.

PROPERTY.

The list of the moveable property accompanies this report, a few additions have been made and everything put in good order.

GRANTS.

The usual Dominion grant was made to the association, but unfortunately, the Provincial grant was withdrawn without any notice. It was deemed necessary, in the interests of the association, to issue a circular to our friends to make up the deficiency; this was liberally responded to, but not sufficiently to cover the requisite amount, and our balance is consequently much less than last year. It is to be hoped the Provincial Government may see its way to restore their grant, the only contribution from the Province towards the active force.

D. C. R. A.

There was not as large a representation as usual at the Dominion Prize-Meeting, but those that were there worthily upheld the credit of the Province, winning 142 prizes out of 587; the following are some of the prize winners:

At most of the Council and Committee Meetings our interests have been attended to, chiefly by Lt.-Col. Fraser, Major Blaiklock, Capts. Balfour, Prevost and Hood.

Special Prize.

A handsome silver-plated cup was sent out by J. H. Steward, Esq., of London, Eng., and will be placed in the prize-list of next year. He was appointed optician to the Association in recognition of his liberality on a former occasion.

AFFILIATION.

We affiliated, as usual, with the National Rifle Association, of Great Britain, and the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

The Treasurer's statement shows a balance of \$217.09 on hand, the reduced grant, and unforseen expenditure on the ranges, has thus reduced our balance of last year. We must, therefore, make another effort to restore a good balance, so as to provide for the necessities of our members.

PROPERTY,

We have, this year, removed as much of the property as was practicable, immediately after the matches, as it was found impossible to keep it in good order on the ranges, no safe building being available for the purpose.

SUGGESTIONS.

For next season it might be suggested that the new committee should endeavour to continue,

1st—To improve the ranges and targets.

2nd—To make the marking more rapid, and at the same time more accurate.

3rd—To reduce the working expenses, if possible.

4th-To increase the number of subscribers and members.

5th-To improve the military match. *

6th—Also to consider the suggestion made at the annual meeting "That the battalion match be fired on the second day of the prize-meeting, as in former years."

MEETING OF COUNCIL.

MONTREAL, 18th April, 1883.

Minutes of Meeting of Council held in the Brigade Office, on the 18th April, 1883, at 4 p.m.

NOTE.—In further explanation of the Regulations and special rules for this match, it is intended to be carried out as nearly as practicable in the following manner :—

1. The sections will draw lots for places, after the officers, markers, &c., have withdrawn into the Butts and signalled that they are ready.

2. The targets will be raised and lowered by order of the officer in command in the Butts; he may raise them up at irregular intervals, but they will always be up 15 seconds; the score will be kept in the Butts until all the sections have completed firing.

3. In the 1st Series, skirmishing, at about 400 yds., the sections will be extended as far as the ground permits; officers will accompany each section, and one officer will command the whole line; this officer will give the order by bugle call to advance or retire, after the signal is given to the butts that everything is ready; the extended line will then advance or retire until the targets appear, when it will halt and fire without word or command, as the targets will only be exposed 15 seconds.

The line of sections will remain halted until the officer in command gives the order; but whenever the targets appear, the line will fire whether it has moved or not; the targets will appear ten times, but each man must only fire one shot each time.

Sights may be adjusted at any time, but rifles must not be loaded until the targets appear.

4. Penalty for each infringement of any of these regulations will be 3 points.

The officer in each section will have to see that these regulations are observed.

Richochet shots will be counted as direct hits.
