New York, Aug. 23-The wishbone, long of assistance to weather proposticators, has been put to new use in Brooklyn.

Blum declared it was necessary to jettison Poincare's programme in order to reach an agreement on the Dawes plan.

His Second Victory.

This is Herriot's second vote of con fidence in two days. On Thursday the chamber rejected an opposition motion to postpone debate on the Dawes plan until it was considered by the foreign committee of the chamber. With his vote of confidence Saturday morning, Herriot is now considered to have won certain victory for the Dawes protocols.

The pro-vince bases its claim upon the Ashbur-ton Treaty of 1842 which, it is alleged, gave to the New Brunswick Govern-ment the right to regulate navigation on the St. John River, where both banks thereof are within the province. The Court of Appeal of New Bruns-wick held that the Act of British North America had the effect of trans-ferring any right which the province theretofore had under the treaty to the Dominion Government. This is the only question involved in the action. It is expected that, should special leave be granted to appeal, the argument will take place in May."




