WILL SIR DOUGLAS ENTER CABINET? He And R. W. Wigmore M. P. Now in Ottawa

(Special to Times.) Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Sir Douglas Haas and R. W. Wigmore, M. P., have been here for two days, having come at the request of the premier to confer on the matter of the former entering the cabinet. Some time ago when it seemed probable that reconstruction would be so complete a nature that it would practically mean a return to a Conservative administration, Sir Douglas was said to be very favorable to the proposal. He is still not averse to it but apparently not quite so warm as he was. It is probable that something will be arrived at one way or another today.

BOSTON LOOKS FOR INCREASE IN SUGAR PRICE Equalization Board To Give Up Control On December 3

London, Dec. 5.—There was a persistent rumor in the stock exchange this morning that the general council of the peace conference had threatened to occupy Essen and Frankfurt. Up to this time the market has not been affected by the report.

LAYS BLAME ON MINE OWNERS For Conspiration of Coal at St. John—The Railway's Statement

(Special to Times.) Toronto, Dec. 5.—The Canadian national railways head office has issued the following statement: "A Canadian Press dispatch emanating from St. John yesterday concerning the confiscation of coal by the Canadian railway, the latter has no part in the matter."

(Special to Times.) Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 4.—Three great oil companies—the Standard, the Shell and the Anglo-Canadian—are evincing strong interest in the oil fields of the Great Slave Lake and Peace River Districts in the Canadian Northwest. Representatives of the English company, who have arrived here to view the work will witness enormous development there within the next few years.

Paris, Dec. 5.—The supreme council of the peace conference this morning considered further the note to be sent to Germany regarding the signature to the protocol of the peace treaty, but did not reach a decision.

Halifax, Dec. 5.—With the return of Principal MacLennan and Professor Ross from overseas and with a much larger enrollment than has hitherto been the case for some years, Pine Hill College, Halifax, has once more resumed its ordinary work.

FORTY THOUSAND FEELLE MINDED Canada Should Have an Ellis Island, Says Doctor Morphy

Montreal, Dec. 5.—Dr. A. G. Morphy, speaking here last night on the problem of the feeble-minded, before the St. James' Literary Society, stated that there were in Canada 40,000 mentally deficient persons, of whom less than 2,000 were receiving any care in an institution.

COL. Geo. A. Stinson Dead

Point Tupper, N. S., Dec. 5.—The Canadian National Railway train ferry Scotia, running between Millville and Point Tupper, grounded at 5 o'clock this morning while taking the night express for Sydney across the Straits of Canso. The forty-five passengers aboard were taken off in a tug. The Scotia is high and dry, with eight cars afloat.

New York, Dec. 5.—Following the Carpenter-Beckett contest in London last night for the European heavy weight championship there was a meeting in London, according to private advices received here, of prominent representatives of American and European boxing bodies to consider a new set of rules and regulations to supersede the Marquis of Queensbury rules which for decades have governed bouts in all parts of the world.

IN WALL STREET New York, Dec. 5.—Stocks were strong almost to the point of buoyancy, at the opening of today's session on the news that the department of justice had decided not to appeal the Southern Pacific oil land case recently decided against the government. Southern Pacific, which closed yesterday at 95-1/8, opened with a lot of 20,000 shares at 104 to 108, followed by numerous lots of 100 to 500 shares at 101 to 109.

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PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 5.—Two new world pocket billiard records were established here last night by Bennie Allen in his match with Edward L. Ralph, Highgate, N. J., in the national American pocket billiard tournament. Allen won the match, 128 to 66, in five innings. It was the smallest number of innings ever taken to complete a championship game, and Allen's high run of eighty-seven shattered the former record of seventy-four held by himself and Alfredo De Oro jointly. Experts said Allen played one of the most remarkable games they had ever seen. On his thirtieth shot he made four balls and twice during the match he sent two balls in with a single shot.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Sterling exchange continued its downward course today under pressure of huge offerings of commercial bills and touched \$3.86 3/4 for demand, a new low record, franc checks being quoted at 10.88 and lire checks at 12.72. The German mark declined to 22 cents.

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NO BETTERMENT IN COAL SITUATION Chicago, Dec. 5.—Efforts of governors of at least ten states to have sufficient coal mined to provide for uses domestic and absolutely essential industries marked the progress today of the strike of bituminous coal miners. Restrictions had been placed on consumption of fuel throughout the country. The New York city to the Sierra Nevada Mountains, as the general situation at the mines shows, is virtually no improvement and the miners maintained their attitude of hostility toward the proffered 14 per cent wage increase.



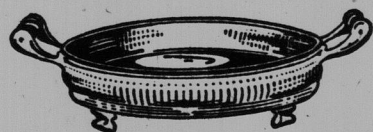

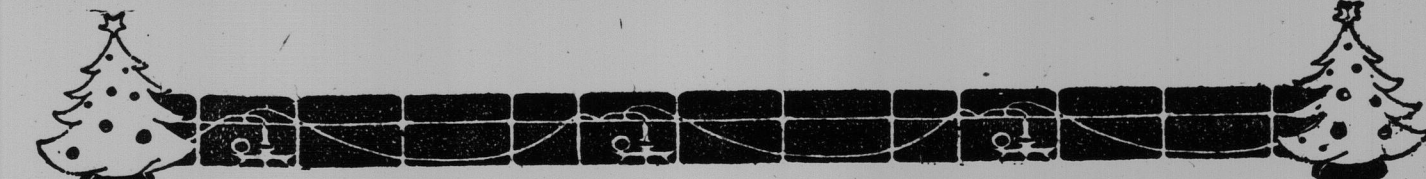
Brother-in-law of Senator Dandurand Not Expected to Live

THE GERMAN SHIP THAT HAS FOUND HAVEN IN HALIFAX

Toronto Writer Graphically Recalls Significance of Voyage After Foul Sea Record of The Hun

(C. H. J. Snider in Toronto Telegram) Salt of the sea where they murdered the innocent scow of the sky which swept to see the deed, shunning of honest seafaring men who knew and could not forget—these were the portion of the first Hun ship to show her shames face on the waters sullied by the sins of her kind.

Hailing from Hamburg, commanded by Herr Kapitän Wulf Krueger, the German bark "Paul" has staggered into Halifax after rebukes that would brand

the white and staring death's head of a devilfish with the blush of shame. Some surprise is expressed "That the captain was able to reach this port, as he did, without port charts, and ignorant of the coast—a tribute to the seamanship of the German skipper." Seeing that Halifax harbor is as wide open as a barn door and the captain was a pilot of a German seaplane in the North Sea during the war, the surprise is rather washed.

But the lesson was not yet complete. Wearily under jury rig, as the weather again moderated, the chastened Paul again plodded westward. Gust after gust swept the ocean. Since the beginning of her voyage the Paul had lost twenty-one different sails. She had now only one foresail, mainmast and one lower top sail left, and she crawled on the face of the waters as heavily as the mangled victims of her submarine sisters had twined on the decks of their sinking craft.

The Paul was now in those very waters through which German submarines had sneaked only eighteen months before, scattering destruction among the innocent fishermen of New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. In the blackness of the thunder squalls, a coastal steamer passed by. The Paul, very anxious for a tow, burned her distress signals—and burned them in vain. Herr Kapitän Krueger declared he could have "spit on to her deck." Probably he would have liked to do so!

He also declared that "those on watch were apparently asleep." But the remembrance of the Hun and all his infamy at sea was wide awake. And so on the last day of November

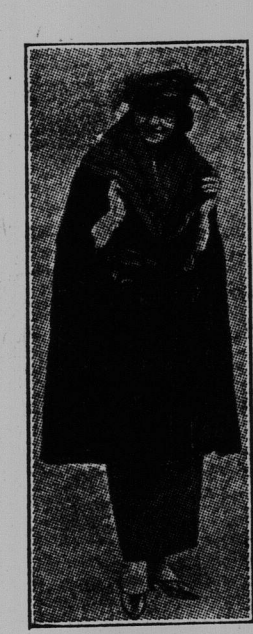

ON FRANCE TODAY AND IN WAR TIME

Interesting Address by Miss Agnes Warner at Meeting of Y. W. P. A.—Generous Gifts Are Voted to Several Funds.

The Young Women's Patriotic Association listened with interest and sympathy at its meeting last night to an informal talk given by Miss Agnes Warner on the conditions in France today and in war time. The meeting unanimously voted \$50 to Miss Warner to be sent by her to the refugees in France returning to rebuild their homes in the devastated regions. Miss A. Brock, the president, was in the chair. The sum of \$85 was voted for "Rough Day" collection for the Children's Aid Home, \$100 to the Y. W. C. A. to assist it in meeting expenses of equipment in its re-creational centre and \$10 to a needy soldier and his family. It was decided to send three or four hampers to soldiers' families at Christmas and Miss Dodge was appointed the convener of a committee of eight to take charge of the details in this connection. A request from the Provincial Red Cross Society that the Y. W. P. A. decorate the soldiers' ward in the East St. John Hospital at Christmas was acceded to willingly. Other arrangements for gladdening the friends of the society at Christmas were made. A letter from Captain Slater was read in which the thanked the association most cordially for the assistance it gave in making the artillery dance so successful. In the letter he enclosed \$100 in appreciation of those services. The association undertook to usher for the meeting to be held in the Imperial Theatre on Sunday under the auspices of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society. Miss Warner was warmly greeted when she rose to speak to the members. She exhibited some very interesting war

trophies, among them the gas-mask and steel helmet which she used while engaged in her nursing task ten miles behind the firing line, a German camouflaged helmet, a Canadian helmet, some broken shells and shrapnel, as well as a war-time electric torch that allowed no light to strike upwards and winged aerial bomb. She related how she had been able to brighten Christmas for soldiers and children in France, telling a pretty story of the children who said the Christ child had not visited them for four years and it was no use writing to him. Through Miss Warner these children had found on Christmas morning that the sabots which they had placed behind the stove were filled abundantly by the Christ-child on the Christmas they met her. Miss Warner spoke of the sterling qualities of endurance, fortitude and thrift which characterize the French people and said that, while Canadian wounded soldiers were taken away from the scenes of horror and devastation, the French convalescents must go back to the complete wrecks of their former homes and take up a new life with every circumstance contending against them. She also said that gifts of old clothing, money, socks and food which she had sent had been most gratefully received.

GERMAIN STREET, Y. M. A.
The Y. M. A. of the Germain street Baptist church held its regular social gathering at their club rooms, last evening, and a very pleasant time was enjoyed by those present. After a short programme of music, a spirited debate was held, the subject of which was Resolved that liquor has been and is more injurious to humanity than war. The affirmative side was upheld by Truman K. Copp, F. McA. Simms and E. J. Alexander. Those who spoke for the negative were David Thompson and E. C. Field. After an interesting debate, the affirmative was awarded the decision. The Rev. F. S. Poole acted as critic and the judges were W. C. Cross and S. H. Davies. After the debate, the society adjourned to the brotherhood hall, where L. W. Simms gave a very interesting illustrated talk on broom corn industry. Mr. Simms also spoke of his recent trip to Nice and Monte Carlo, and the war zone in France. Refreshments were served by the social committee after which the happy gathering dispersed.

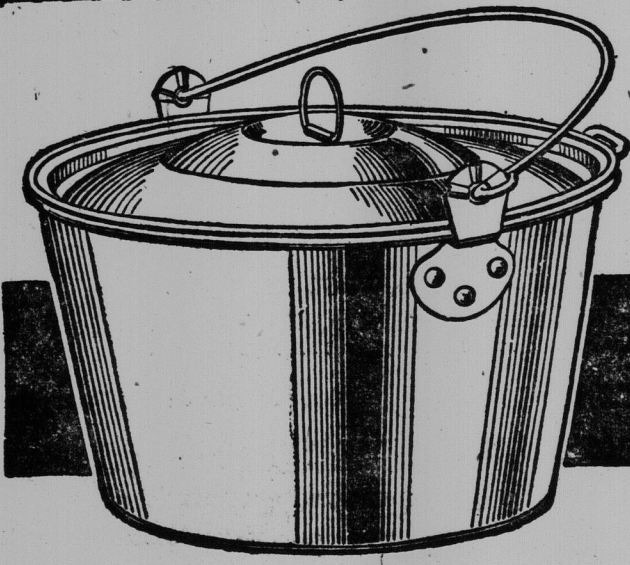

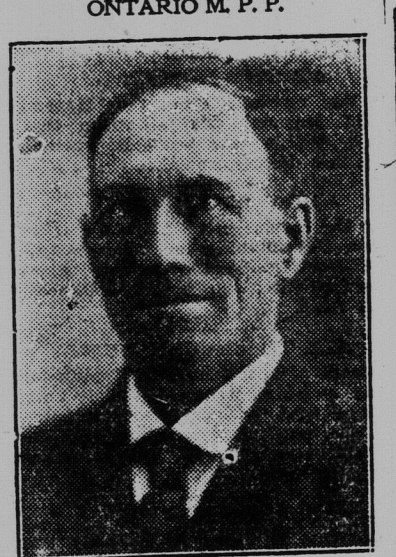

Noted Authority Endorses Vaccine

"Most Certain Preventive Known to Medicine" Says Prof. Stewart

Emphatic endorsement was given to vaccination by Prof. G. N. Stewart, director of experimental medicine in the Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, in an address on "Research in Medicine" before the Royal Canadian Institute, Toronto. He declared that of all the discoveries in medicine and the treatments in medicine none was more certain than the effect of vaccine in controlling and preventing smallpox.

He classed the discovery of the vaccine by Jenner in 1789 as one of the early outstanding advances in medical treatments and as an almost accidental discovery. He related his statement that it constituted one of the surest preventives so far established in medicine.

The speaker outlined some of the great discoveries made in medicine up to the present time, and touched especially on the most important. He pointed out that sometimes medical discoveries were made by accident, but were usually the result of persistent and intensive experiment on the part of a large number of investigators, the addition to the existing knowledge being added together. The accumulated results were not very spectacular, he said, and therefore seldom appear in the newspapers.

Prof. Stewart placed stress in importance on the discovery of vaccine in the proof that infectious diseases were due to minute particles, some vegetable, which were called bacteria, and other one-celled animals called protozoa. This discovery sprang out of Pasteur's work in 1873. The various bacteria were isolated first, he stated, in diseases of chickens, cholera, in anthrax. The discovery of the anti-toxins for these followed shortly after, and the bacteria of infectious diseases affecting human beings still later. In 1882 the tuberculosis bacillus was isolated, in 1883 that of cholera, and in 1884 diptheria, with discoveries in other diseases coming still more recently.

After the discovery of the bacillus the toxin was discovered, and, in turn, the anti-toxins developed, the speaker went on.

Another important advance cited was Lister's introduction of antiseptic surgery and the discovery of the use of anesthetics. Prof. Stewart pointed out that it was extremely difficult for those living in the present advanced age to realize the advantages which these developments gave in the treatment of surgical cases. "We do not know what it means to perform an operation without these aids," he explained.

Continuing, he stated that the discovery of protozoa had only taken place within the last twenty years, and so far it had been established that fifteen diseases were due to this one-celled animal germ.

THE BOY SCOUTS.

John A. Stiles, assistant dominion commissioner of the Boy Scouts, and H. O. Eaman, assistant provincial commissioner for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, arrived here yesterday from Halifax and will spend some days here in the interest of the Boy Scouts movement. His extension and development in St. John and throughout the province. They have in mind a progressive programme which has already found favor elsewhere, and their intention is to talk with leading men who are interested in a sort of forward movement in connection with this work. The Commissioner Stiles is to address the Rotary Club and perhaps other such bodies while here.



That community effort is not lacking on the part of the young Hebrews of the city can be seen readily by the fact that since their first meeting, about a month ago they have built up a thriving association which now numbers some 200 members, and is known as the "Young Men's Hebrew Association." The association will be conducted on lines similar to those of kindred organizations in the city, its endeavor being to inspire the members with civic and community pride and its programme consisting of literary, physical, musical and spiritual activities. The association has leased temporary quarters at 84 Horsfield street, formerly occupied by H. H. McLean, and they anticipate throwing open the doors soon to the Jewish residents of the city at an "at home." It is the ambition of the young men interested to purchase a permanent home in the future as a centre for Jewish communal activities which have grown considerably of late through the constantly increasing Hebrew population.

NEW BRUNSWICK IN F.W. DAYS TO TAKE UP MATTER OF LAURIER MONUMENT FUND

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The organization work which has for its object the raising of \$100,000 for a monument to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier is proceeding well in all the provinces, according to letters which are reaching Liberal headquarters in the capital.

Sir Robert Borden The Rumors Say, is to Have a High League of Nations Position

(Special to Montreal Herald.) Ottawa, Dec. 2.—Sir Robert Borden is again at the helm, but by none is it expected that he will long remain there. His health is much improved, but he is far from being in robust condition, nevertheless, and the strenuous burdens of the past five years have left a mark which neither rest nor recreation can entirely eradicate.

being frankly discussed, for it is believed that he would gladly retire were such a successor found.

That the premier will meet his followers in caucus next session is fully anticipated, that he will submit to them a plan for the perpetuation of union as a party with platform and organization certain and that at the same time he will beg to be relieved of the duties of leadership and will suggest a successor is more than likely.

Strenuous times are ahead and the leader of any political party in these days must be a man in full possession of his strength and health.

A Rumored Position.

In unofficial, but well informed circles here, it is believed that Sir Robert Borden may be given a high post in connection with the League of Nations. Had the United States entered the league, President Wilson, whose presidential term expires in 1921, would have held one of the highest positions in its gift.

With the United States outside the league, however, this is regarded as impossible and it is felt that the Canadian premier, who played no inconsequential part in drafting some of its main provisions, namely its labor clauses, will not be chosen to represent the democracy of the new world on the league.

Another story is that Sir Robert will be Canada's first representative upon the imperial cabinet in London which next year's imperial conference is expected to bring into being. Sir Robert, it is pointed out, possesses all the necessary qualifications for the post. He has wealth, experience in imperial and international affairs gained during a war premiership and he is well known to the statesmen of the empire. Onerous as may be the duties of either of these positions they will not call for the same slavish application to detail and will not entail the same nerve racking worry as the hurly-burly of politics.

Some of the Possibilities.

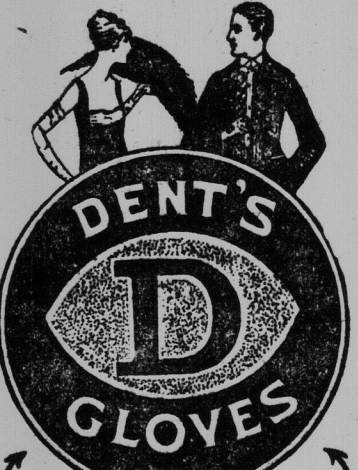
During the absence of Sir Robert Borden in England several of his colleagues have held the position of premier in an acting capacity. Sir Thomas White, former minister of finance, led the house through the first session of the present year and at the end of it was freely mentioned by all as the natural and logical successor of Sir Robert Borden.

Sir Robert Borden, however, returned and again resumed the reins of office and later Sir Thomas White, in the position of director of the Bank of Commerce, the National Trusts and the Steel Company of Canada. That he has thus burned his bridges behind him so far as the premiership is concerned is conceded in political circles.

During the past session Sir George Foster and Hon. C. J. Doherty took turns at leading the house and acting as premier. But at the end of the session nobody would seriously have mentioned either as permanent holder of the position in succession to Sir Robert. While they led the house, two other members of the cabinet bore the brunt of the battle.

Hon. Arthur Meighen and Hon. N. W. Rowell. The Probable Choice.

There has never been any harder worker in the cabinet than Hon. Arthur Meighen, nor any more resourceful in debate. In the matter of work and resourcefulness he probably does not surpass Mr. Rowell, who last session turned towards ingratiating himself in the formerly somewhat cold and distrustful estimation of the men who sat around and back of him.

W. D. MATTHEWS LEAVES ESTATE WORTH \$2,291,163

Two Sons And Two Daughters Share Bulk of The Grain King's Fortune—Stocks, \$815,367, Bonds, \$1,065,435

The late Wilnot Deleur Matthews of Toronto, capitalist and grain king of Canada, who died on May 24, 1919, left an estate valued at \$2,291,163.42.

Under the will, executed on April 24, 1916, exactly thirteen months before his death, the late Mr. Matthews names his two sons and two daughters to share the bulk of the fortune, and by a codicil executed subsequent to April, 1918, a number of bequests to Toronto charities are made. The Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, receives \$10,000.

The estate is inventoried as follows: Household goods and furniture, \$16,500; book debts and promissory notes, \$296,588; mortgages, \$786; stocks, \$815,367; bonds, \$1,065,435; cash in bank, \$85,071; personal property, \$1,500.

The real estate is valued at \$60,000, and consists of two properties, the home at 89 St. George street, which is valued at \$60,000, and a summer place of residence at Roche's Point, valued at \$90,000.

The late Mr. Matthews carried life insurance worth \$168,471 and is payable to each of the children, share and share alike.

His Father Was "Barley King."

The late W. D. Matthews was sixty-five years of age and a life resident of York county. He was a son of the late Wheeler Douglas Matthews, who was known for some time as the "Barley King." Wilnot D. Matthews entered the grain trade in this part of the country in 1878 and until the time of his death was associated with many grain dealing enterprises.

In 1907 the late Mr. Matthews was rated as a millionaire, and was one of the twenty-three men of Canada who were supposed to be, according to the Montreal Standard, at the basis of Canadian finance.

The following are some of the prominent companies in which the late Mr. Matthews was interested in one time or another: Dominion Bank, Confederation Life Association, Toronto Electric Light Co., Canadian General Electric Co., Steel Company of Canada, Canadian Pacific Railway Co., Toronto General Trusts Corporation, Toronto Railway Co., and the Northern Navigation Co.

Canadian Coal Supply

Almost Inexhaustible Supply That Needs Only Development

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—While there is every prospect that some Canadian people will shiver this winter if the American coal strike keeps up, and that industry likewise, will suffer, Canada has an almost inexhaustible supply of bituminous coal of her own if her people want to develop it, according to officers of the mines branch of the geological survey the question reduces itself wholly to one of economics. The coal is there, the question is one of mining it, and particularly, finding a market for it.

The total production of coal in Canada last year was 17,636,190 short tons. In addition there was 3,229,881 tons of lignite and 115,403 tons of western anthracite.

In the same period the country imported 21,778,837 tons of coal, of which 4,785,160 tons was anthracite and the rest bituminous coal.

Question of Economics.
"It is wholly a question of economics," asserted one of the heads of the mines branch today. "There is practically no

limit to what the country can produce if we have the men and equipment and the market. The Canadian bituminous mines can produce as much as those of the States if the areas are worked. Where the difficulty is met is here; our coals are not located near the biggest Canadian markets. Some of the mines are in eastern Nova Scotia, the rest are in western Alberta and British Columbia. Ontario and Quebec, particularly the former, are sufficiently near the American mines to enable them to purchase cheaper there than in Canada. Before the war, when shipping was plenty, about two million tons of Nova Scotia coal came to the Montreal market, but beyond that it was difficult to compete with the American mines.

"In no way is Canada dependent upon the States for soft coal, but there is little sentiment in business, and the great hindrance to development of our own resources is that the mines of the United States are closer to some of our greatest consuming centres and able to more than compete with our own mines."

HEAVY EXPORTS TO GERMANY

Washington, Dec. 4.—Since the signing of the armistice the United States and Great Britain have resumed trading with Germany, as shown in reports made public by the department of commerce. Exports from the United States to Germany for the first ten months of the year totalled \$32,420,095, and imports from Germany \$4,914,787.

Great Britain, from the signing of the armistice to Oct. 1, exported to Germany goods valued at more than \$60,000,000 and received imports from Germany valued at \$1,088,000.

Of the total American exports to Germany, \$20,658,221 were exported in October. Officials of the department of commerce stated that although Great Britain apparently had started off with a rush in the German trade, the United States was overhauling her rapidly.

Exports from the United States to South America amounted to \$89,399,045 in October, against \$17,481,221 a year ago. Argentina received \$12,874,154, or nearly three times as much as in October, 1918. Brazil at \$12,979,900 received almost six times as much as a year ago, while Chile at \$3,140,293 decreased her purchases by about a million dollars.

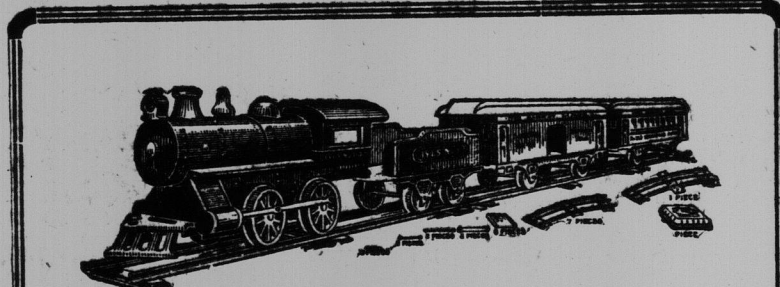

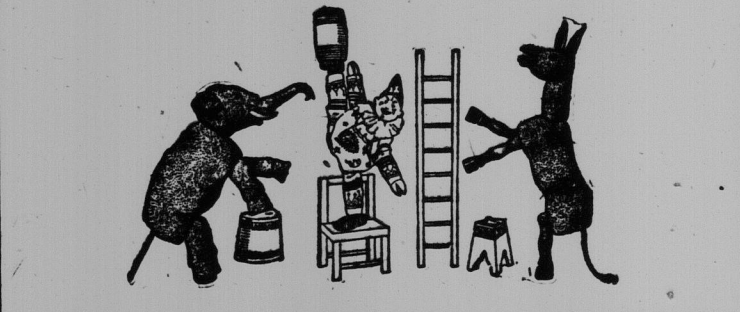

BECKETT GOES OUT IN FIRST ROUND

Carpenter is Champion of Europe — Prince of Wales Attends But

Holborn, Stadium, Ringside, London, Dec. 4.—(By the Associated Press)—Georges Carpentier, the French champion, knocked out Joe Beckett, champion of England, tonight in a brief and decidedly one-sided fight for the heavyweight championship of Europe.

Seventy-four seconds, as announced by the official timer, sufficed to decide whether Carpentier or Beckett should meet Jack Dempsey, the American heavyweight for the championship of the world in June next. From the moment the referee, B. J. Angie, called time, Carpentier had the battle entirely in his own hands. Beckett never had a chance of hitting the agile Frenchman, who landed blows with enormous strength whenever he felt inclined.

Amid absolute stillness most of the spectators could hear the terrific crack of the swing that put Beckett to sleep. There was a roar of cheering as Carpentier, assisting Beckett to his corner where the Englishman opened his astonished eyes and saw his opponent being carried on the shoulders of some of the enthusiasts around the ring.

The contestants presented a notable difference in appearance when they stepped and were introduced—Beckett, swarthy and muscular; Carpentier, white-skinned, with slight figure. Carpentier looked about him as though accustomed to his surroundings; Beckett seemed somewhat nervous. The Prince of Wales, peers and peeresses, members of the house of commons, high officials of state and many women, most of them in evening dress, looked the fighters over critically as they squared up.

As a fight the contest was not spectacular. Carpentier was fast on his feet, with the Englishman from the first. With lightning swiftness, Carpentier left Beckett out and caught Beckett on the face and a suppressed sigh was audible all over the house. A quick break away followed a short clinch, and the Frenchman landed two more hard lefts. Beckett, with a sort of bulldog determination, forced Carpentier almost to the ropes. But this was a diversion for a moment only, for the Frenchman stepped back and landed a heavy blow with all his strength and the weight of his body, swung his right to Beckett's jaw, putting him down and out.

The betting was heavy before the contest, odds of 7 to 4 being laid on Beckett, and most of those present were losers, although Carpentier had plenty of supporters.

After the fight Beckett said to the newspaper men: "I had not started to fight, when I got it. I didn't realize what had happened. I was just falling in for the first round when he slipped in."

C. B. Cochrane, the promoter of the Carpentier-Beckett fight, will leave here for the United States in a few days. He hopes to arrange for a championship match between Jack Dempsey and Carpentier to be held in London in 1920.

Los Angeles, Calif., Dec. 4.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, said tonight that George Carpentier's victory over Joe Beckett in London, was no surprise to him, as he and his manager, Jack Keenans, had picked the French champion to win. Dempsey said that Carpentier was more scientific, quicker and a harder hitter than Beckett.

"I am ready to fight Carpentier or any other fighter in the world—I get my price," said Dempsey. "Carpentier in all probability will be my next opponent, and the meeting probably will come off next spring."

Bridson Greene Rated Among World's Best

(Boston Globe.)

The six wrestlers who are to meet in the three matches at the Grand Opera House tomorrow night promise a variety of styles that will prove interesting to followers of the sport. Each man is original in his method of operation, depending on cleverness and finesse to carry him through a winner.

This is especially true of the meeting between Kelson and Matsuda Oishi, the Japanese, who uses a combination of Jiu-jitsu and catch-as-catch-can with such startling results. They will go best two out of three falls.

Bridson Greene, the Tech and Anderson instructor, rated among the world's best welterweights, meets Tommy Record of Somerville, while Tony Ajax, the California star, tackles Cyclone Peters of Brooklyn, N. Y. Both the latter matches are to be a one-fall finish, without time limit.

Note:—It will be recalled that Greene wrestled here recently and made a host of friends by his clean and clever work.

COFFIN PENETRATED BY PINE TREE TOP

One of the most peculiar accidents in connection with the 70-mile gale that swept the St. Thomas, Ontario, district Saturday night occurred in the St. Thomas cemetery. The top of a huge pine was snapped off and driven a distance of 250 feet or more, knocking over several large monuments and tombstones. One of the limbs of the tree was driven into the frozen earth to a depth of six feet, penetrating the cover of a coffin.

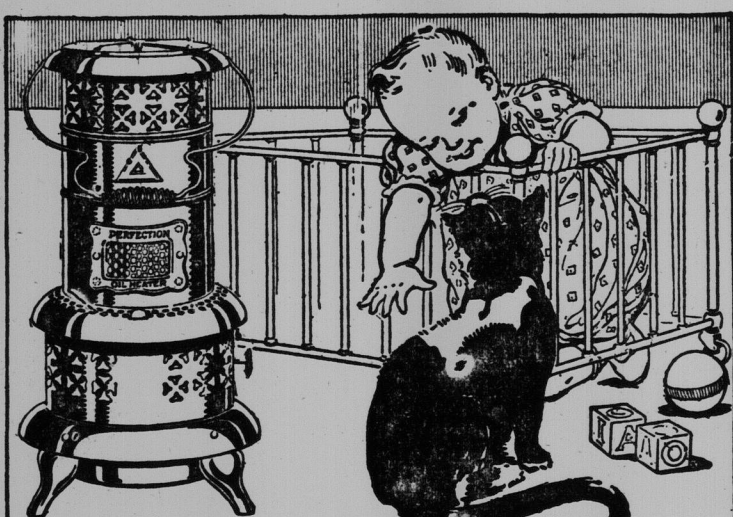

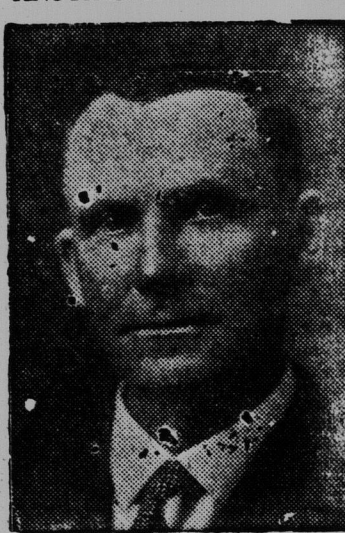

**SIR HENRY DRAYTON
DISCUSSES THE
TRADE BALANCE**

Striking Address by Canada's
Finance Minister in New York
TO INSURANCE MEN

He Suggests Increased Purchases
And Investments by The United
States in Canada—Some Signifi-
cant Figures

The following is a portion of the speech of Sir Henry Drayton before the Association of Life Insurance Presidents in New York that week—

"While Canada is prosperous, the question of the exchange between our respective countries is something that I am sure you do not view with complacency. Your insurance premiums are paid in Canadian dollars and as a result of the trade balance existing between the countries the Canadian dollar is at the moment at a discount, and a serious discount when the value of the Canadian dollar, the property and assets of the country are considered. The effect of present trade balances does not reflect in the slightest upon the intrinsic value of Canada's obligations. The depreciation of the Canadian premium in New York funds is simply owing to the fact that we do too much business with you and you do too little business with us.

"I wonder if the extent of Canada's purchases in the United States are realized. In South America you have a whole continent, you have been doing business with that continent for many years, you have trade commissions and trade representatives and, I think, have covered that field with characteristic American energy. Your statistics show that your total trade with all South American countries amounted for the year 1918 to the sum of \$881,977,051, with a trade balance against your country of \$202,859,658. In the same year your business with Canada amounted to \$1,216,744,889 and resulted in a favorable trade balance of \$94,528,487 to your country. In 1919 the United States business with all South American countries was \$969,976,808, the balance of trade against you being \$167,478,208. On the other hand, for the same year with Canada your total trade amounted to \$1,289,677,549 and the balance of trade in your favor amounted to a sum no less than \$844,708,212. With such a balance against us and with the further fact that Canada is doing some business overseas, settlement of which is ordinarily made in New York in credit instead of for cash, the reason why your Canadian premiums only net you approximately ninety-five cents on the dollar in New York funds is very readily apparent. While our respective countries have always very largely traded one with the other, the adverse balance of trade used not to tell so heavily upon Canada. In 1910 the adverse balance was \$106,888,088, and in 1918 it was \$110,899,450 and at these times of course Canada was selling overseas for cash.

"That Canada is a very large purchaser in the United States and that the tendency to purchase is increasing is made very clear by the exhibit of the percentage of imports in comparison with Canada's total imports from United States, but during the fiscal year ending March 31, 1919, that percentages had grown to 81.60. On the other hand, the percentage of purchases made by the United States in Canada in comparison with our total exports not only has not increased in a like ratio, but has declined, as the percentage of Canadian exports to the United States in comparison with our total exports for the year ending March 31, 1918, was 89.37, and for the year ending March 31, 1919, only amounted to 87.66.

"It may be suggested that the best way of restoring the full value to your Canadian premium would be for Canada to do less purchasing in United States, but I do not think that this solution of the subject is one which would commend itself to you as American citizens. We want to do as much business as possible with you and I think you want to do as much business as possible with us. I think we all realize that two of the very necessary essentials in any proper re-establishment are firm currencies and standard exchanges. I am quite sure that you would much sooner see the exchange situation righted by additional American purchases in Canada rather than decreased Canadian purchase in the United States. Temporarily, and from time to time, these adverse balances may be easily rectified by the investment of America's large surplus reserves in Canada, and this solution is one which is probably as much in the hands of the presidents of great American companies as in anybody's. The field for investment in Canada is very large. There is still great room in Canada for development.

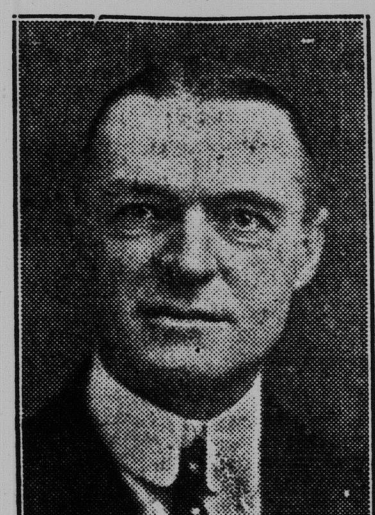
"Apart altogether from the exigencies of the exchange situation, I feel that little argument is necessary to interest United States life insurance companies in Canadian investments. The Canadian life insurance companies earn upon the average one per cent higher interest than do the United States companies and this higher earning naturally materially affects policy-holders' profits. The average rate of interest in your investment

ARMY FUND FRAUD TRIAL

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 4.—Charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States government in the sale of \$80,000,000 worth of army supplies, two former army officers and four wealthy civilians will go on trial before Judge Arthur J. Tuttle in the United States district court here.

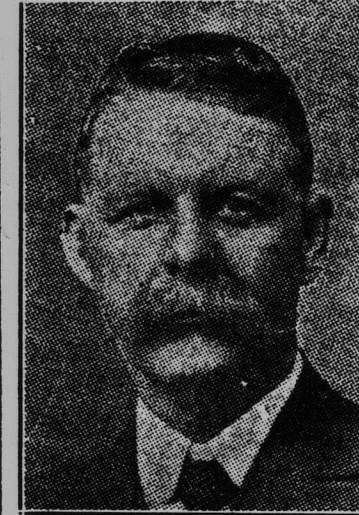
The defendants are Grant Hugh Browne, New York millionaire and sportsman; Fred C. Collins, Detroit capitalist and Vice Consul for Greece; Bert Harris, wealthy New York junk dealer; Monroe H. Burdick, secretary of the New York Steel and Wire Company, Albany, N. Y.; Carlorus Nicholson, former captain in the army, financial officer, and member of the Army Salvage Board at Fort Wayne, and Raoul Watersbury, major in the Ordnance Department, A. E. F.

The conspiracy, according to Chief Arthur L. Bergey of the Department of Justice, was to eliminate all bidders on \$80,000,000 worth of army salvage. Burdick, Browne and Collins were to have entered bids, it is said. The highest bid of the three was to have been accepted by Captain Nicholson. It would have been far below the value of the supplies offered for sale, Chief Bergey said. The material was then to have been disposed of through Bert Harris.

One dual federal agent declared, was consummated before arrests were made. It involved the sale of \$80,000 worth of material to a concern in Rochester, N. Y.

PLANS FOR ROSEBUD DAY

A meeting of the conveners of the various committees in charge of the Rosebud Day appeal for the Children's Aid Home was held in the home in Garden street yesterday afternoon with Mrs. E.
