

THE FINER FRUITS OF DEMOCRACY

From an address on "Democracy," on the occasion of his inaugiration as president of the Birmingham and Midland institute, Birmingham, England, Oct. 6, 1884.

DEMOCRACIES can no more jump away from their own shadows than the rest of us can. They no doubt sometimes make mistakes and pay honor to men who do not deserve it. But is it democracies alone that fall into this error? I, who have seen it proposed to erect a statue to Hudson, the railway king, and have heard Louis Napoleon hailed as the savior of society by men who certainly had no democracies associations or leanings, am not ready to think so.

But democracies have likewise their finer instincts. I have also seen the wisest statesman and most pregnant speaker of our generation, a man of humble birth and ungainly manners, of little culture beyond what his own genius supplied, become more absolute in power than any monarch of modern times, through the reverence of his countrymen for his honesty, his wisdom, his sincerity, his faith in God and man, and the nobly humane simplicity of his character. And I remember another whom popular respect enveloped as with a halo, the least vulgar of men, the most austerely genial, and the most independent of opinion. Wherever he went he never met a stranger, but everywhere neighbors and friends proud of him as their ornament and decoration.

Institutions which could bear and breed such men as Lincoln and Emerson had surely some energy for good. No, amid all the fruitless turmoil and mesicarriage of the world, if there be one thing steadfast and of favorable omen, one thing to make pessimism distrust its own obscure distrust, it is the rooted instinct in men to admire what is better and more beautiful than themselves. The torchstone of, political and social institutions is their ability to supply them with worthy objects of this sentiment, which is the very tap-root of civilization and prograss. There would seem to be no readier way of feeding it with the elements of growth and vigor than such an organization of society as

MR. FIELDING MAKES TARIFF ANNOUNCEMENT

A Few Changes to Follow Ratification of Reciprocity-Borden Gets Hard Knock

Ottawa, April 12-"On the adoption of reciprocity it may be necessary to make some further changes in the tariff and in connection with the British preference. But these will be in small matters, and not of an important character. They will not include an increase in the British preference to fifty per cent, nor will they include free agricultural implements. We hope to persuade the people of Canada that they should not press for these changes now. We desire to see the manufacturer successful. We desire to see all classes of the community prosper.

"We are going to ask those who are urging for an immediate large reduction in the tariff, for the removal of duty on agricultural implements altogether, not to press these claims now. We do not think these things can be done to the best advantage of Canada at the present time. We believe that these things would have a disturbing influence on trade in Canada, and we aim to make reciprocity something that will work unfettered for the general advantage of Canada."

The premier announced, when the house adjourned over the Easter recess this evening, that when it resumed next Wednesday the debate on reciprocity would be continued.

Sir Alan Aylesworth may reconsider his determination to withdraw from public life at the close of the present parliament and fight another battle in North York on the reciprocity issue. The intimation of the minister of justice came at the conclusion of another stage-play challenge from the opposition and was received with prolonged enthusiasm from the Liberal benches.



HANDSOME NEW ELECTRIC LIGHTING DEVICE IN KING STREET WILL BE ATTRACTION

It is possible that the idea of having King street illuminated at night by extra electric lights may yet be brought about. It will be remembered that after the Dominion exhibition last year an effort was made to have the extra lighting continued and several firms agreed to pay a proportionate share of the expense. Some objected to going into the scheme, however, and the matter was dropped. Now, as a result of the action of one firm, the idea may be revived in a different form.

During the last few days workmen have been engaged in front of the hardware establishment of T. McAvity & Sons, digging up a portion of the sidewalk and putting in concrete work, and many people have been wondering what was the object of the work.
