Dr. Hetherington replied that in 1919 accounts were sent out by the Minister of Lands and Mines requiring payment from the Miramichi Lumber Company and Dalhousië Lumber Company of the sums of \$212,122 and \$163,-760 respectively, a total of \$375.882 pany of the sums of \$212,122 and \$163,-760 respectively, a total of \$375,882 being the amount of a penalty at \$2 per cord claimed by the minister for lumber cut and exported in contravention of the acts passed in the years 1911 and 1915. These amounts were arrived at by an examination of the books of the company made by Price, Waterhouse & Co. and were based on a rate of \$2 per cord.

MONEY ISN'T PAID. The companies concerned have not to this time paid anything on the account, said Hon. Dr. Hetherington. and the Government is not carrying the accounts or claims on the books of the crown lands department. Explaining the reason for this action, Hon. Dr. Hetherington pointed out in his reply that the minister of lands and mines in the year 1919, in addition to sending out the accounts, gave instructions to begin an action against these companies.
