RAIS TRADE POLICY WITH WEST INDIES

LOGAN SCORES GOVERNMENT FOR INACTIVITY

Says Steamer Service Inadequate And Out-of-date

U. S. AGENTS BUSY

Nova Scotia M. P. Advocates More and Better Trade Commissioners

MONTREAL, April 25.—Criticism of inactivity in regard to cultivating better trade relations and communications with the West Indies was made last night by Hance Logan, M. P., Cumberland, N. S., in the course of an address to the Export Club of Montreal and district.

Mr. Logan gave a talk on his recent trip to the West Indies and other countries of the Caribbean Sea as commissioner for the government to search out what was required to improve trade between Canada and these countries.

He considered it necessary that the Canadian Government should carry out its trade arrangements with these West Indian islands, and give the forthrightly service it had agreed to, with proper vessels for both freight and passenger.

PROFELY INDIGNANT. He said he had found a distinct feeling of indignation in Jamaica, and other of the West Indies against the Canadian Government for its failure to fulfill its trade agreements, which they had signed in good faith.

Another point Mr. Logan emphasized was that to get trade, it was necessary to send the proper kind of trade agents. He advocated the appointment of trade commissioners out, and putting it into the hands of the responsible minister.

U. S. AGENTS BUSY

"Everywhere I went," said Mr. Logan, "I found American busy meeting conditions and getting the trade, while nowhere did there seem to be any Canadian trade agents, except two, who had to cover nearly all the islands."

"We are paying now about \$1,000 a day in subsidies for a line of boats between Halifax and the West Indies—four antiquated vessels. And after paying this subsidy, the Government puts on its own C. G. M. M. boats to compete with them, and prevent them doing business on the Eastern service, and that section of the route."

CRITICISES SERVICE

The Canadian Government had entered into a treaty agreeing to put on a fortnightly service with 12 knot vessels and fortnightly sailings from Halifax to the Bahamas and Jamaica with passenger accommodation and cold storage. But after four years not a single effort has been made to fulfill this agreement.

Asks Government's Plan For Russian Agitators

P., Unionist representative from Bath has formally announced his intention of asking Premier Baldwin in Commons next Wednesday whether the Government will consider the advisability of deporting Russian communists known to be plotters against the peace of the country, regardless of their standing as representative of the Soviet government.

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N. B. FISHERIES SHOW INCREASE DURING YEAR

Product of Provincial Waters \$834,751 Ahead of Previous Year

ALL LINES EXCEPT LOBSTERS PROSPER

In 1924 Sardine Industry Had Best Year Since Close of War

OTTAWA, April 25.—An increase of \$834,751 is shown in the product of the fisheries of New Brunswick last year, as compared with 1923. The total market value for 1924, comprising fish sold for consumption fresh and fish canned, cured, or otherwise prepared, was \$5,868,256.

All of the principal varieties, excepting lobsters, showed increases in total value. The sardine fishery, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, had a product valued at \$1,241,205, which was the largest annual output for this fishery since 1918.

The quantity of sardines caught during the year 1924 showed an increase of 100 per cent. over the catch of the preceding year.

The lobster industry, however, showed a decrease last year both in the value of the lobsters marketed in catch and in value of product. In 1924, shell and canned was \$1,339,155, while in 1923, the value was \$1,203,554, a decrease of \$135,591.

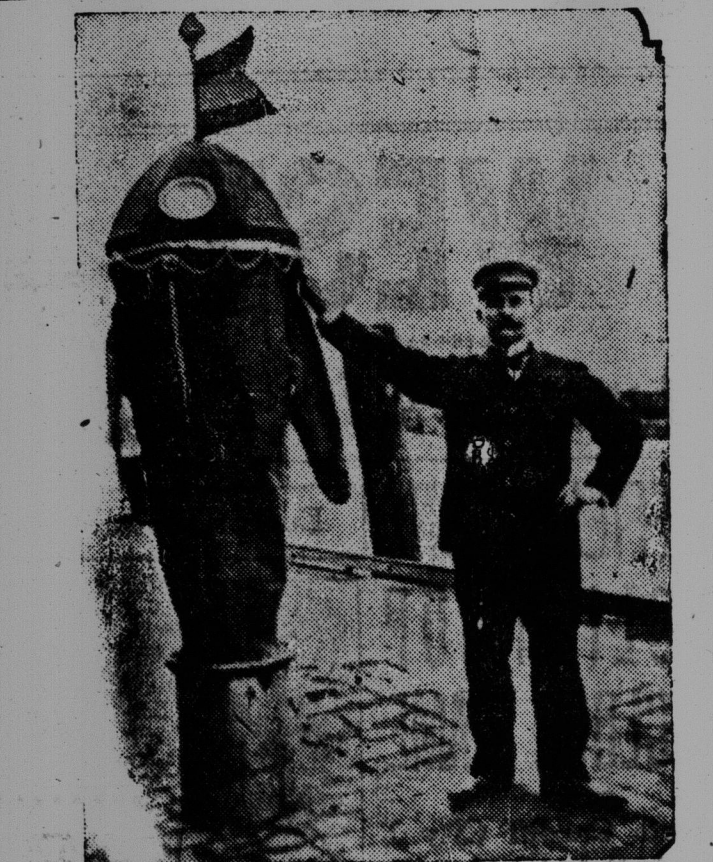

Detectives go Out For It—Story Told of Two Men Seen in Auto Line.

Another Tampered With. That the auto thieves who stole G. G. Murdoch's car from the south side of King Square last Wednesday night made a careful selection of the forty or more automobiles parked at the curb is believed from the testimony of the casual observers, who of course were innocent of the thought that the men intended theft.

The "passenger" limousine of J. Walter Holly was parked next to Mr. Murdoch's about opposite the Lansdowne Hotel and after the theft of Murdoch's car was made known Mr. Holly examined the lock of his car and found it had been tampered with. It was quite plain somebody had been trying to get the door open as the key-hole was scratched and the key-hole lid or cover somewhat raised.

One of the occupants of the Holly car says that while the driver was looking for an open space at the parking place in the Rue Parlement, early yesterday morning, in which four youths were killed, and more than 40 wounded, allegedly by Communists, he made a deep impression upon the French public.

GERMANY VOTES TO-MORROW.

On the eve of the German presidential election to-morrow the world feels a sense of uncertainty. The dispatches from Berlin, like those from other national capitals where this event commands uncommon interest, give little indication of the result, and the confident predictions that Hindenburg would be defeated, which marked the beginning of the campaign, are no longer put forward, though the prevailing impression appears to be that he will be beaten.

"Germany is goose-stepping," was the comment of an observer a few days ago when Hindenburg, with his hand on his sword reviewed a great parade of his supporters in Hanover. That comment had behind it the conviction prevailing widely in Europe, that if Hindenburg should be successful Germany would be turning again to its old gods of militarism and autocracy.

A COMPARISON.

"Have the citizens of Chicago any right to lift up their hands in holy horror at outrages in Bulgaria while placidly enduring the multitude of crimes of desperation in their own city?" This rather astonishing question is asked by the Chicago Journal of Commerce, which proceeds to say that the shocking record of crime in Chicago is made possible "by deliberately planned laxity of law enforcement" and that, all things considered, Chicago's plight is as shameful as that of Sofia.

The immediate cause of this rather startling indictment is that recently seven Chicago policemen were shot within one week, one of them fatally, in attempting to effect the arrest of a criminal. One man, who was taken to a hospital, died of his wounds. The chief of police of Chicago has instructed his men to carry their revolvers in such a way that they may be drawn without the slightest delay, and he tells them that if there is any shooting to be done, they are to shoot first. The Journal of Commerce protests that the police have been careless in hesitating to shoot every criminal who produced a pistol, without waiting to see whether he actually intended to make use of it. This advice was given to men in uniform, but those in plain clothes are warned that they must make it known that they are policemen before they kill anybody even in self-defence.

RAILWAY FUSION.

How keenly the country at large is interested in railway economy, in the hope that co-operation between the railways may result in lower taxation and ultimately in lower rates, is indicated by the wide discussion following the appearance of Sir Henry Thornton before a committee of Parliament, and the passing reference he made to a fusion of the two great railway systems. The Ottawa Citizen says editorially that the merging of the two great roads should be a practical political question at this hour, though it expects no immediate action in that direction. It evidently believes that a merger of the railways would properly be an outstanding issue in a general election. The Citizen's report of Sir Henry's appearance before the committee contains the following: "Perhaps the most interesting part of Sir Henry Thornton's pronouncement, although it was only on passing in answer to a question, was his reference to a fusion with the C. P. R. He did not say that it was in the realm of practical economics, but he said if the

Wonder Spots of The Empire

The Assouan Dam, Egypt

(Copyright.)

When the western nations turned their attention to Egypt, engineers were engaged to report on the cause of its decline. They looked with pity upon the squalor and poverty existing amid the mighty ruins that told their mute tale of the great things of the past, but their practical work showed that the unreliable Nile was at the root of the evil. The Nile would come down as a flood, sweeping all before it, to be followed by a season of low water, that was in turn remedied only by an abundance of rain in central Africa.

By 1880, British engineers studying Egyptian irrigation, had definitely decided that the storage of the river water at flood tide was the need. This was no easy task, as the water carried so much silt and mud that any artificial storage reservoir would be filled up and become useless in a few years' time. Patient observation, however, had shown that the flood was practically clear until the following March, and that the mud and silt came down during the first two months of the flood.

Then the British engineers designed the most wonderful dam that has ever been built. It is known as the Assouan dam and will pass the entire flood waters for two months, and then close upon the precious torrent like a steel trap and block back the life giving waters for millions of acres. The dam is 6,400 feet in width and when originally built was sixty-five feet high. It was completed in 1902 and has since been raised twice in 1907 and in 1912. The Assouan Dam cost ten million dollars to construct, and it has been the greatest feat in the restoration of prosperity to Egypt. The Egyptian government signed a treaty whereby half-yearly payments are made for six years, to pay for the work.

IT WOULD NOT DO.

A suggestion recently made in the British Parliament by Sir Victor Warren dealing with emigration to Canada has been received with little favor in this country, as it suggested a departure from sound and settled principles. He proposed that the British Government should secure tracts of partially reclaimed land in Canada to be settled by emigrants chosen by the British authorities, the idea being that those so selected would be free from the restrictions applied by the Canadian immigration authorities under the existing policy of restriction and selection in force in the Dominion.

However well intended, this plan could scarcely be accepted. There is no likelihood that the British Government would propose it, and less likelihood that it could be carried into effect. Canada, like the other Dominions, and like Great Britain itself, enjoys and must continue to enjoy complete control over the question of the settlers it admits to the country. Canada's desire is to acquire as many immigrants as it can from the British Isles. It welcomes first of all people of British stock and of Empire birth. It is a cause for gratification that for years past a very great proportion of our immigrants have come from the United Kingdom, and the hope is that the stream of settlers from that source will be maintained and steadily increased.

The Warrender's suggestion, which has elicited considerable newspaper criticism in Toronto and elsewhere, is essentially unsound because of the intimation that such an arrangement would make it possible to send to Canada a class of settlers of which our immigration authorities could not approve. Our immigration restrictions involve no hardship to desirable immigrants from any source, and the British Government would be the last to suggest that Canada be asked to surrender the complete right which the Mother Country and all of the Dominions exercise for themselves in immigration matters.

British and French negotiations over secession are to be resumed after the German political situation becomes more settled—if the new French government is still in existence.

SERIES OF BREAKS IN EDMUNDSTON

Several Places Are Broken Into on Two Successive Nights.

Albert's jewelry shop. Nothing of much value was taken from any, but the last named firm, where the robbers made off with more than \$800 worth of goods. This is the second time within a few months that this place has been broken into. The last time the burglars made off with more than \$1,200 worth.

TIME CHANGES ON CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS LINES EFFECTIVE MAY 3.

Time changes on Canadian National Railways lines effective Sunday, May 3, affect chiefly Suburban trains in and out of Saint John. All trains will continue operation on Atlantic Standard Time.

Suburbans will leave for Hampton at 11:20 a. m., 8:15 p. m. and 10 p. m. Sussex train will leave at 4:15 p. m. Suburban trains will leave Hampton for Saint John at 8:00 a. m., 10:30 a. m., 6:35 p. m., arriving Saint John one hour later. Sussex train will leave Sussex at 5:45 a. m. and arrive in Saint John at 7:45 a. m.

It should be noted that the noon train for Halifax, No. 14, will leave at 1 p. m. Instead of 1:25 p. m. as the double daily service to Prince Edward Island will go into effect, this train will make connection at Moncton with train leaving Moncton for Tormentine at 4:35 p. m. The morning train leaving at 7:05 a. m. will make the first Prince Edward Island steamer connection as usual.

It should be also noted that No. 20 train for Moncton, Truro and Halifax will leave at 6:10 p. m. instead of 6:15 p. m. The Halifax sleeper will be operated as under present schedule. The night trains, Nos. 9 and 10, will not go on until full summer service in June.

The Sunday trains between Saint John and Moncton, Nos. 40 and 50, will go on with this change. No. 50 will leave Saint John at 9:30 a. m. and make the suburban stop. No. 40 will leave Moncton at 4:45 p. m. and arrive Saint John at 8 p. m.

There are some changes on the Valley Railway. No. 45 train will leave Saint John at 4:35 p. m. daily except Sunday and run through to Centerville. Mixed train No. 241 will leave Fredericton at 7:45 a. m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, arriving at 1:20 p. m. Train No. 46 will leave Centerville every week day at 5:30 a. m. and arrive Fredericton 9:10 a. m. will leave at 9:20 a. m. for Saint John, arriving 12:35 p. m. Atlantic train. Mixed train No. 242 will run on Wednesdays and Fridays, leaving Fredericton at 6:40 a. m. and arrive Saint John 11:45 a. m.

ROMAN CITY IS BURIED UNDER AFRICAN SAND

Ancient Town, Vacated After Earthquake, Is Discovered

BIRTHPLACE OF FORMER EMPEROR Many Old Time Glories Are Being Revealed by Excavations.

By THOMAS B. MORGAN United Press Staff Correspondent. ROME, April 25.—The presentation to the world of an entire Roman city, complete in all its ancient magnificence, is planned when the heavy veil of sand is removed from the now buried city of Lepcis Magna.

Lepcis Magna flourished from the early third century. Unlike most of the great cities of the far-flung Roman Empire, it has suffered little from invasion by vandals.

The city was glorified by Septimius Severus, because he wished to honor his birthplace. It has all the aggrandizement of any of the other famous cities of Imperial Rome.

The luxury enjoyed by the Romans in these baths at Lepcis Magna was supposed to rival anything in the empire. They are said to have covered five acres and were fitted with hot and cold rooms, steam rooms, showers and massage rooms.

capitals were placed in lavish profusion everywhere. There were swimming pools entirely built of marble and granite.

Another wonder was the triumphal arch. It is said to be larger than any of those found in the Roman forum.

The mechanical prowess of the Romans also is shown in the excavations. It was discovered that the whole city received its water supply from huge cisterns which collected the rain during the wet season.

What we are finding at Lepcis Magna are not the ruins of temples and palaces destroyed by invaders, said Commendatore Paribendi, director of Italian Monuments and Excavation.

WOMEN HEAR PROBLEMS OF IMMIGRATION

Efforts to Be Made to Stem Tide to Other Lands

HISTORY STUDY IS URGED AS REMEDY

Doctor Praises Milk Fund Plan—Session of Women's Council.

Immigration problems were discussed and work which may be undertaken by the women of this province in connection with the bringing here of new settlers was explained in the report on immigration submitted by Mrs. Margaret Lawrence to the Women's Council yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the Board of Trade. It was suggested that in order to stem the stream of emigration it was necessary to find the cause of dissatisfaction among the people and meet the United States competition by showing the superiority of Canada.

Hope was expressed that there would be an increase in immigration as a result of the effort of the Canadian and

provincial governments. Reference was made to the work of F. E. Sharpe and Charles Magnusson, who had recently visited Scandinavian countries to interest settlers.

The president of the council, Mrs. A. W. Estey spoke of Dr. Margaret Parks of Saint John, as the only woman doctor employed by the Government in immigration work.

Taking up the practical side of how women in Canada might help, Mrs. Lawrence said the Women's Institutes, an affiliated society of the National Council of Women, had a body of women peculiarly adapted to the work of colonization. Immigration would continue, but the successful absorption of the newcomer demanded an organized effort.

SUGGESTS DETAILS.

"One cannot to a general audience outline a definite program, but the Women's Council, with its vast resources and touching as it does so many interests, can induce an enthusiasm for the home lands, can help its societies to whom this work of colonization is especially entrusted, can teach patriotism and show that Canada is a land of golden opportunity; can counteract the floods of propaganda that tend to lure the youth of the Dominion to alien shores; can insist on the teaching of Canadian local history—not only to the newcomer but to the native born who needs it quite as much; can further a knowledge of Canadian literature, Canadian industries and Canadian opportunities. A belief on the part of the individual that she individually is both necessary to and responsible for the success of the country will bring about that success."

There had been no action by the Women's Council in regard to the war memorial site, Mrs. Estey said, because she did not think the members were agreed on the question.

The fund at conducted by the council had been highly commended by a medical doctor and Mrs. Estey announced that there would soon be another appeal for funds in this connection.

FAIR AT CONVENTION.

Mrs. Staver, Calgary, answering a request for further information on a women's fair which has been suggested be held in connection with the annual meeting of the National Council in Vancouver, wrote it was hoped to have the fair demonstrate that Canada was a good country in which to make a home, a country safeguarding the interests of women and children.

Consideration was deferred to the next meeting.

Major Thomas Burton asked the Council to assist with the Salvation Army tag day on June 6. This was promised.

The Animal Rescue League's request for banks for a tag day on May 16 was granted.

George Buckley, a High School student, gave a graphic account of what a tremendous loss forest fires have brought New Brunswick and Canada.

Mrs. T. H. Carter, treasurer, reported a balance of \$20.54 in the general fund. She said many societies had not paid affiliation fees.

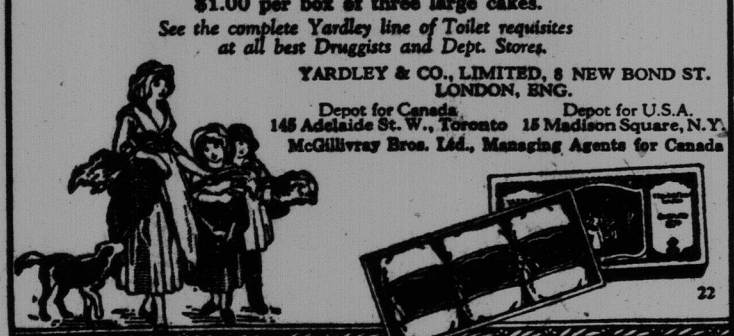

Urges Statement

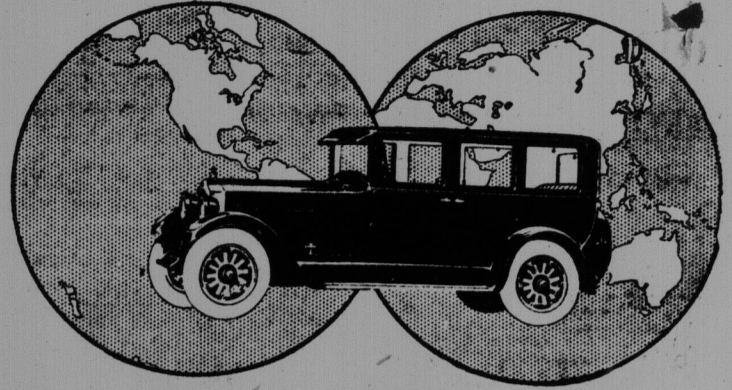

SCHEME IS TO BRING EAST AND WEST TOGETHER

Protection With Control of Selling Prices Urged as Solution

WOULD HAVE TARIFF COMMISSIONER NAMED

Power Given to Change Tariff Without Notice and Fix Costs to Consumer.

By Canadian Press. MONTREAL, April 25.—A tariff plan to bring together east and west, consumer and manufacturer, has been drawn up by Herbert K. Patterson, prominent citizen of Winnipeg, in connection with which he has interviewed manufacturers and consumers and gathered information over the last five years.

His plan is both to protect the consumer and the manufacturer. Mr. Patterson claims that the solution of the problem is high tariff, with control of selling prices, and his plan, which he states could be put into operation without delay, is as follows:

DETAILS OF SCHEME. "The government to appoint a tariff commissioner at a very substantial salary, to place him beyond the reach of outside influence, to whom power could be given to change the tariff without notice and who should also be given control over selling prices, but only when manufacturers of certain articles agreed in writing to abide by present-day selling prices as a maximum, with the right to sell for as low as possible. The commissioner also to have the power to examine the books of all concerns coming under the protection of this plan."

A subsidiary proposal to this by Mr. Patterson is for a commission of three men to consist of one paid commissioner, one representative of consumers and one representative of manufacturers, the last two in advisory capacity without salary. In case of dispute the Minister of Customs to be arbitrator and his decision to be final.

CONTROL OF PRICES. The tariff commissioner would be given power to call all manufacturers of any one line of goods together and outline the plan to them. If they agree to its application then they would be asked to give the commissioner their today's selling prices, labor wage scale and raw material costs.

The commissioner would then ask the manufacturers of that line to sign an agreement not to increase their prices, based on such labor and raw material costs. Further they would have to agree to allow the commissioner to investigate their books as to costs on labor, raw material and also selling prices at any time. On his part the commissioner would agree, when this document was signed by the manufacturer, to raise the import duty on imported goods to such a point that from 75 per cent. to 80 per cent. of foreign competition would be eliminated, thereby giving the Canadian manufacturer of that particular line of goods about 80 per cent. of the total business of Canada in that particular line.

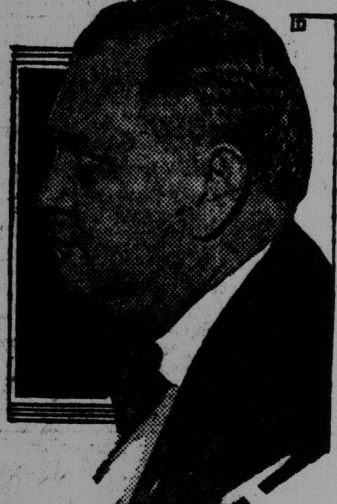

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VETERANS IN SERVICE

POSTMASTER THOMPSON

NOTE.—The Times-Star today begins a series of sketches of men of Saint John who have spent many years in the service in which they embarked when young. Some have devoted almost a life-time to the one employ. The series starts with Alexander Thompson, postmaster, 48 years in the postal service.

It was the year 1877 and the large, three-masted sailing ship "Lord Lytton," under the command of Captain George Dakin, was anchored in the Thames near London with cargo of lumber from the bustling port of Saint John, N. B., then ranked as the third greatest shipping port in the world.

Started in 1877. So, the call of duty was answered 48 years ago. Back in Saint John a month later, the boy entered the postal service as a letter stampers—Sept. 1877. Only a few days ago, the official news of his appointment as Postmaster of Saint John was gazetted. The boy's name was Alexander Thompson.

Born near Fredericton, one of a large family descended from settlers who came to this province in 1761, Mr. Thompson spent the early years of his life at Grand Falls where his father, Wesley Thompson, operated one of the first mills in New Brunswick. It is interesting to note his father contracted a channel to carry the water to operate his mill from the Grand Falls—the channel that it is now proposed to harness for electricity. That channel and the ruins of that water-driven mill can be seen to this day. When his father died, the family journeyed by stage and steamer from Grand Falls to Saint John.

Was Prominent In Sport. Few New Brunswick better than Mr. Thompson. He has been, for periods, acting postmaster at Chatham, Newcastle, Sussex, St. Andrew's and a score of other places while for six years he visited every nook and corner in this province where a post office was located in the discharge of his duties as inspector. His friends are countless as a result of these trips, made by train, canoe and bicycle, and his recollections are many.

LARGE AMOUNT DUE PROVINCE FOR PENALTIES

375,882 Assessment Against Two Lumber Companies, Unpaid, Says Minister

ACCOUNTS SENT OUT NEARLY 6 YEARS AGO

Information Given Regarding Standing Timber and Areas Destroyed in N. B.

FREDERICTON, April 24.—With most of the contentious legislation out of the way, with exception of the amendments to the New Brunswick Electric Power Act, effecting the proposed Grand Falls development, the fifth session of the eighth New Brunswick Legislature should prorogue by Thursday next.

The House adjourned this afternoon for the week-end and when the members return on Tuesday the Grand Falls development project is to be the main topic for consideration. The bill which increases the borrowing power of the New Brunswick Commission \$12,800,000, and makes certain provisions for increasing the commission from three to seven members, will be given a second reading on Tuesday afternoon and at that writing there does not seem to be much likelihood of any protracted debate.

INQUIRIES ANSWERED. This afternoon's session of the House was featured by several interesting replies to inquiries by the Opposition. Both inquiries had to do with matters affecting the administration of the Department of Lands and Mines and the echo of some past political history in New Brunswick was heard when Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington, Acting Minister of Lands and Mines, tabled his reply to one of them.

C. D. Richards, leader of the Opposition, had asked if certain bills or accounts were sent by the governor or

LARGE AMOUNT DUE PROVINCE FOR PENALTIES

by the Government to the Miramichi Lumber Company and the Dalhousie Lumber Company requesting payment of an amount in each case as a penalty for contravention of the act passed in 1911 and later amended respecting the manufacture of spruce and other pulpwood on Crown lands.

ACCOUNTS SENT OUT.
Hon. Dr. Hetherington replied that in 1919 accounts were sent out by the Minister of Lands and Mines requiring payment from the Miramichi Lumber Company and Dalhousie Lumber Company of the sums of \$212,122 and \$163,700 respectively, a total of \$375,822 being the amount of a penalty at \$2 per cord claimed by the minister for lumber cut and exported in contravention of the acts passed in the years 1911 and 1915. These amounts were arrived at by an examination of the books of the company made by Price, Waterhouse & Co. and were based on a rate of \$2 per cord.

MONEY ISN'T PAID.
The companies concerned have not to this time paid anything on the account, said Hon. Dr. Hetherington, and the Government is not carrying the accounts or claims on the books of the crown lands department. Explaining the reason for this action, Hon. Dr. Hetherington pointed out in his reply that the minister of lands and mines in the year 1919, in addition to sending out the accounts, gave instructions to begin an action against these companies.

STATUS OF COMPANIES.
As to Mr. Richards' question whether the Miramichi Lumber Company and the Dalhousie Lumber Company are subsidiaries of the International Paper Company, the reply of the minister follows:
The government has no official knowledge as to whether or not the Miramichi Lumber Company and the Dalhousie Lumber Company are subsidiaries of the International Paper Company, but the government has unofficial information that leads the government to believe that the Miramichi Lumber Company and the Dalhousie Lumber Company are subsidiaries or closely allied with the International Paper Company.

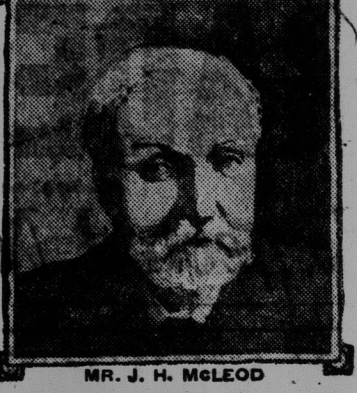

amend the act relating to highway construction under Federal Aid. He said that the bill asked authority to borrow an additional sum of \$500,000.
Hon. Mr. Veniot said that in response to a query of the Hon. Leader of the Opposition he had promised to bring down information relating to salaries and wages at the Provincial Hospital, and also relating to insurance on the buildings of the institution. He had secured the information and would leave it in the hands of the clerk where it might be seen by anyone interested.

The information which he had received from Dr. Anglin, superintendent of the Hospital, placed a value of all hospital buildings, including power and laundry plants at \$1,200,000. The value of the land was given as \$200,000; value of furnishings, \$80,000; live stock, \$5,000. The amount of insurance carried on the hospital property was \$288,000 for which premiums amounting to \$5,722.22 were paid triennially. On the main building there was insurance amounting to \$180,000. The total amount paid in salaries and wages was \$49,950. During the year a mason at a salary of \$1,200 and a veterinary at \$800 had been added to the payroll.
