

The owners of capital, although not responsible for these conditions, have become PARASITIC. With no other form of ownership to conform to, they must of necessity sit upon the backs of the workers, until the working class get sense enough to hoist them.

RECIPROCITY NOT REAL ISSUE

The issue at stake during this election is plain. Shall capital continue to rule and labor remain enslaved or shall LABOR ASSERT THE RIGHT TO ITS PRODUCT and exploitation cease? This is the issue. Make no mistake about it. It will remain the issue until human slavery is forever abolished.

RECIPROCITY IS AN ISSUE BETWEEN OWNERS OF CAPITAL. Of what importance to Canadian workers by what bunch of capitalists they are exploited? What matter though they be American, Canadian, German or French? A Chinaman can buy stocks on the market and reap the benefit of your toil, although he may not have seen the industry in which you slave.

THE REAL ISSUE IS TO EXPLOIT CANADIAN LABOR. no matter of what nationality, creed or color. 
