

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ECLIPSES, 1900 (Standard Time)

In the year 1900 there will be three eclipses, two of the Sun and one of the Moon.

I.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, May 28. Visible to North America and the northwestern corner of South America, Europe, northern Africa, and the North Atlantic Ocean. The path of totality running through Mexico, New Orleans, Mobile, Raleigh, Norfolk, and across to Algiers, being of an average width of fifty miles.

II.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, June 12. Visible to North and South America, Spain and Africa.

III.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, November 22. Invisible. Visible to the southern half of Africa, and to Australia.





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

DYE RECIPES

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DIRECTIONS.

1st. Clean utensils and clean goods are absolutely essential to your success. Polish thoroughly your kettle, which should be of brass or copper. Wash the goods to be dyed thoroughly with soap and warm soft water. Afterwards rinse in clear, cold soft water. Dry thoroughly, and then you are ready to commence operations.

2nd. Dissolve your dyes in soft water free from soap.

3rd. Colors—Black will take on any color, and any color will take on white. Scarlet will cover salmon, yellow and orange.

Purple will cover light blue, orange, crimson and light green.

Brown will cover drab, orange, purple and light green.

Green will cover blue, yellow and pink.

4th. For real bright colors it is best to add a little good sour vinegar to the rinsing water.

WOOLLEN GOODS.

Black. Good also for silk or cotton. For I lb., I oz. of extract of logwood and ½ oz. of blue vitriol. Bring the water to a scalding heat. Put in the goods, and when thoroughly wet take out and drain. Add the blue vitrol to the water, and when it has dissolved put back the goods, and allow them to remain half an hour at a scalding heat. Take out and rinse in soft water. Empty the vitrol water into another vessel, and dissolve the logwood in sufficient water brought to a scalding heat. Put in the cloth and let remain fifteen minutes. Cleanse in soft water and let drain and dry.

Scarlet—Very superior. For 1 lb., ½ oz. cochineal, 1 oz. cream of tartar and 1½ bz. of sol. of tin. Cover the goods with water; when it is a little warm put in the cream of tartar and simmer; then add the solution of tin. Steep in the dye till the color suits.

Green.—For 1 lb, 4 oz. alum, and 1 lb. fustic. Steep it to get the strength, but do not boil. Soak the cloth until it acquires a good yellow color. Throw out the dregs, and add 1 oz. or more of indigo paste, slowly, until you have the desired shade of green.

BROWN.—Also for cotton or silk. For 6 lbs., 1 lb. Japonica, then add 1/4 lb. alum. When dissolved place in your goods and allow them to remain until colored, then drain. Disselve 4 ozs. bichromate of potash in lukewarm water, place in the goods, and leave until the color suits. For seal brown, add 1/4 lb.

BLUE —For 1 lb, 21/2 ozs. alum, 11/2 ozs. cream of tartar; boil well in a brass kettle. Afterwards take out the goods and put in water colored with ex-

tract indigo.

COTTON GOODS.

YELLOW.—For 5 lbs. dissolve ½ lb. sugar of lead and ¼ lb. bichromate of potash, each separately Dip the goods in the sugar of lead water, then in the bichromate water, then in the sugar of lead again. Wring out and dry. Rinse in clear cold water.

ORANGE.—Dip the above, while still wet, in strong lime water.

BLUE.—For 1 lb. take 2 ozs. copperas, dissolve in sufficient boiling water. Soak the goods one hour. Dissolve 3/4 oz. prussiate of potash in same quantity of fresh boiling water, and add 1/2 oz. sulphuric acid, then dip the cotton alternately from one to the other until shade suits.

GREEN —For 1 lb., fustic 1 lb.; logwood chips 1/2 oz.; blue vitriol 2 ozs.

Dissolve all separately; mix together and add goods,

RED.-For 3 lbs., 1 lb. camwood boiled in an iron kettle will color three pounds of cloth to a light red that will not fade. By letting it remain a while it will color darker if the goods are aired and heated occasionally.

PINK.—For 5 lbs., 2 ozs. nicwood and 4 ozs. solution of tin.


