DISASTROUS BLOW TO JAPAN.

Four Warships and Two Transports Sunk in Repulsed Attack on Port Arthur.

**ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 24.**—It is officially announced from Port Arthur that four Japanese battleships and two Japanese transports have been sunk in a fresh attack upon Port Arthur. The attack was repulsed.

**PARIS, Feb. 24.**—A despatch to the Havas agency from Port Arthur says that the four Japanese cruisers and two Japanese transports have been sunk in a fresh attack on Port Arthur. The despatch adds that the attack was repulsed and that the Russian battleship Retvian covered herself with glory.

**NEW YORK, Feb. 24.**—Four Japanese battleships and nine transports passed this port today bound eastward.

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—The fleet which passed Wei Hai Wei today is supposed to have been Admiral Togo's fleet leaving Port Arthur.

**JAPAN'S ADVANCE BEGINS.**

**SHANGHAI, Feb. 24.**—The Japanese army corps landed at Chemulpo, Korea, totalling about 30,000 men, has already despatched a heavy force to the north.

He died in a short time without giving any description of his assailants, though he muttered several times that boys had shot him.

BIG FIRE IN ROCHESTER

Entire Business Section of the City Threatened, But Firemen Saved It—Loss \$150,000.

**ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 24.**—Fire which broke out between one and two o'clock this morning in the factory of the Phelps Piano Co., dry kiln, in Brockport, threatened for four hours to destroy the entire business section of that place and resulted in a total estimated loss of \$150,000. The local fire department were unable to control the flames which spread across the street after destroying the Phelps Piano Company's works and attacked and destroyed the Moore's Subscription Agency, a two story frame building which covered a large area. The loss to the agency is estimated at \$50,000, covered by insurance. The loss to the piano company is about \$100,000. The firemen fought bravely against great odds, the water supply giving out at certain points. The Rochester fire department was appealed to for assistance and Chief Little sent two engines to the scene. The fire was under control at two o'clock, but owing to the inability of the railway company to supply cars upon which the heavy apparatus could be loaded it was impossible to send the firemen to Brockport. At 4:30 a. m. the fire was under control.

**LOCKOUT OF 10,000 MEN.**

**NEW YORK, Feb. 24.**—The Lithographers' Union of New York has rejected by a large majority an arbitration proposition by the Employers' association, which takes in the employers throughout the United States and Canada.

**UNDER MARTIAL LAW.**

**ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 24.**—The railway between Samara and Zlatoust, in European Russia, and the Siberian lines, with all the territory appropriated by the government for the purpose of these railways have been placed under martial law, in order to insure the regular running of military trains. The full powers of the commander of an army in the field have been conferred on the commanders of the forces at Kanan and in the Siberian military districts, in whose charge these railways have been placed.

**THE A. P. DID IT.**

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—Reuter's Telegram Co. has given out an explanation of how the abolition of the censorship on Russia was brought about, as follows: "The abolition of the censorship of news telegrams sent abroad from Russia is understood to be the direct outcome of an interview which Melville E. Stone, general manager of the Associated Press, had with the czar at St. Petersburg. Mr. Stone urged upon his majesty the wisdom of abolishing the censorship, and as a result of the manner in which the matter was presented to him, the czar called upon M. **TOLSTOI IS NEUTRAL.**

**PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 24.**—In response to a cable request, the North American received the following message from Count Leo Tolstoy: "MOSCOW, Feb. 23.—I am neither for Russia or Japan, but for the peace of both countries, deceived by their governments and obliged to fight against their welfare, conscience and religion."

**JAPANESE HANGED BY RUSSIANS ON A BRIDGE.**

The Japanese who were hanged by Russians in Manchuria for attempting to blow up the railroad bridge over the Bungari river were disgraced as coolies. They were arrested just as they were about to make the attempt. Inquiry revealed that they were Japanese officers of the general staff, namely Col. And of the engineers, and Lieut. Zenelasha and Kaourat of the Sappers. They were immediately hanged on culverts of the bridge.

**TORPEDO BOAT REPULSED.**

**PARIS, Feb. 24.**—In a despatch from Harbin, Manchuria, a correspondent of the Math, says ambulances are being sent in there from all parts of Russia and that the Baltic railway has furnished a sanitary train for 200 wounded.

**ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 23.**—The czar received a deputation of provincial assemblies at the Winter Palace today, and received from them addresses of loyalty and patriotism. In expressing his thanks His Majesty said that in these painful times he found consolation in such expressions of patriotism coming from all the provinces.

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—In a despatch from Tokyo, a correspondent of the Times says some hundreds of Cossacks reached Chonju, thirty miles south of the Yalu river, the afternoon of February 20. Thirty troops crossed the river at Kasan the same evening, thus arriving within forty-five miles of Ping Yang, Korea.
