FATALLY INJURED IN

PROVIDENCE, B. I., Aug. 12—J. Montgomery Sears, a member of an old Boston family, was fatally injured, and George Sanders, his chauffeur, was severely hurt in an automobile accident on the Apponaug Road about 5 miles from here today. The car was being driven at the speed of 60 miles an hour. At the point where the accident occurred there is a sharp curve. They came upon it unexpectedly and in attempting to round it at the high speed, one of the front wheels of the machine broke down, the tire burst and the car plunged over an embankment. Another automobile rushed to the scene of the accident and the occupants found Sears and Sanders unconscious on the ground with their automobile in flames.

Lookout and the Frying Pan, we en-countered a heavy squall which car-ried away the jib. The ship began to leak badly and all hands were required to work the pumps.

"Aside from Captain Mitchell, myself and Second Mate Bendchor, we carried a steward, five seamen and the captain's wife. The next day a sowtheaster beat upon us and we were compelled to shorten sail. On July 31 a terrific hurricane struck us with all its force. At two o'clock in the morning the wind was glowing sixty miles an hour and directly from the south. Knowing that we were near the coast we dropped anchor but as the vessel did not come up in the wind was paid out as the gale beat down with fury and then we found that the anchors were dragging.

"We were less than three-quarters of a mile from shore and could hear the breakers pounding furiously under the driving hurricane. At the captain's orders every one adjusted life preservers and preparations were made to leave the barkentine.

"Bendchor undertook to handle the largest lifeboat. He was floating the small boat to the windward side of the vessel, a rope tied to the bobbing boat and made fast to the barkentine's deck. With a paddle he was endeavoring to keep the small beat from being hurled against the hull of the John Swain and crushed like an eggshell by the driving sea. Suddenly the larger craft lurched heavily in the waves, and this tore out the stanchions of the small boat to which the rope was made fast. In an instant Bendchor and the boat were driven away toward the breakers. There is no doubt but that the man lost his life.

The aeroplane is forced into the air on an oblique angle by perpendicular propellers and must glide back to earth, supported by the horizontal planes.


