BALDWIN LANDS IN CORN FIELD

Tries for Speed Record With Dirigible Before Army Board

HIS MOTOR BREAKS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—Captain Thomas S. Baldwin made the first official speed trial of his dirigible before the army board at Fort Myer today. When within a mile of the finish line a secondary wire connecting the coil of the engine with the commutator broke and the dirigible stopped. The airship was brought down in a corn field, and after Mr. Curtis repaired the motor, the flight was continued. The accident prevented any possibility of making the speed required by the contract, but Captain Baldwin has two more trials in which to demonstrate its speed.

Shortly after six o'clock this evening the airship was brought out of the balloon tent to the starting point.

As the time approached for making the flight, Captain Baldwin expressed the opinion that the wind was blowing too strongly.

"If it weren't for the crowd that is here and the fact that I would make the official trials today," he said, "I would not go up."

Mr. Curtis was in favor of making a flight, though the wind was too strong for a fair speed test.

The course was the same as that traversed in yesterday's flight, two and one-quarter miles to the westward of Fort Myer. The first mile and a quarter was apparently covered in less time than yesterday. It was at this point that the wire connecting the coil of the motor with one of the four cylinders broke.

Running the engine with the three remaining cylinders, Mr. Curtis endeavored to repair the break. He received several shocks of electricity from the batteries and had to bite off a piece of cord with which to tie the wire. He was compelled to let go of the lever with which the planes are controlled and as a result the big airship pitched and tossed at a height of three hundred feet at times, almost standing on its nose. Despite the danger he was in, Mr. Curtis continued to work on his motor, while Captain Baldwin, in his position at the rear of the frame, was unable to be of any assistance.

Just as Captain Baldwin brought the ship around at the turning point and started back to Fort Myer, Mr. Curtis got his engine in working order again. The distance of two and one-quarter miles was made in nine minutes and fifty seconds.

His wife, who was Mrs. Louise Scott, a beautiful woman, and well known in Washington, was arrested with him, on the same charge, but escaped imprisonment by depositing \$50 cash bail. The arrests followed a quarrel between the pair.

Garland, it is said, objected to his wife carrying on correspondence with officials in Washington. Garland specifically mentioned Colonel Charles A. Edwards, who stabbed him in May, 1907, following an encounter in the fashionable apartments occupied by the young woman, who was then Mrs. Scott.

"It is a conservative estimate to say that more than half the actual cash of Ellis county is hidden. Our deposits, chiefly from the Americans. Comparatively few of the Russians do any banking business. We have conducted a campaign among them for years and some of the younger element are beginning to patronize us. But the old timers are still holding off, and probably will continue to do so for the rest of their lives."

"Perhaps 70 per cent. of the people of Ellis county are Russians. More strictly speaking they are German-Russians. Originally they went from Germany to Russia and later came to this country. They are a sturdy, honest people, industrious, very religious, and great money savers. As debt payers they are celebrated. They never hide behind the statue of limitation. If a Russian buys a horse or a farm he is just as sure to pay for it as he lives. Mortgages are only used as protection in case of death."

BOSTON MAN SUICIDES

CORDELE, Ga., Aug. 12.—A special to the Dispatch from Alamo, Ga., tells of the suicide there at noon today of H. G. Rogers, aged fifty, a cow mill and ranch owner and capitalist of Boston, Mass. It is believed that Mr. Rogers' mind had become deranged from brooding over the death, about two weeks ago, of his business partner, C. L. Ordway. He placed a shotgun at his head and blew the top of it off. He leaves a wife and son in Boston.
