REVENUE.

Each subscriber is particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their names and pew number on the outside before it is handed in.

A special collection for reducing the mortgage debt will be taken up on the second Sunday of October.

MISSION COLLECTIONS.

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the last Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes, which will be found on entering the Church just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the last of the month, any other time will do.

Those wishing to subscribe by envelope, and who are not at present supplied, can secure envelopes by applying to any of the members of the committee or to Mr. Warren, Church officer.

It is expected that as far as possible subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the committee think it best.

FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Managing Committee of Knox Church

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1891.

Your committee beg to present their annual report for the past year, and in doing so feel that the year has been one of general prosperity notwithstanding the removal of a number of our members from the city.

The loose collection falls short of last year by \$112.51, and the envelope exceeded it by \$4.69. The debt collection falls short of last year by \$143.30.

The following are the figures as taken from the Treasurer's statement: envelope, \$5,597.23; loose, \$936.93; mortgage debt \$322.75. There was also received from collections at preaching services in the Mission, \$97.65, and as special contributions for such Mission services, \$120.00.

The congregation, at their annual meeting held in January, decided to engage a student for three months at \$50.00 per month, and at a special meeting held June 17th decided to continue the services of a student for the balance of six months, and on Oct. 7th for Sunday evening services during the winter. This incurred an expense on the funds of the church of \$378.00, against which should be considered the collections and special contributions already referred to.

The number of subscribers by envelope is 475, giving the sum of \$107.64 per Sabbath, an increase as compared with last year of 7 subscribers and 9 cents per Sabbath. The arrears at the close of the year were \$217.00.

Your committee would recommend the continuance of one collection for the debt fund and that it be taken on the second Sabbath in October.

In April Mr. Colin Arthur resigned his position as manager owing to his inability to attend to the duties of the office. His resignation was accepted, and Mr. R. A. Campbell was elected in his place. The managers who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. A. Richardson, John Wright and W. J. McFadden. On the first of August Mr. Warren's salary as caretaker was raised from \$400.00 to \$500.00 per year, on condition that he give all his time to work in connection with the church.

The managers would acknowledge the kindness of the ladies in carpeting the church throughout, thus making the edifice as comfortable as it is possible to make it.

In conclusion your committee express the hope that God's blessing may continue to follow their labor, and that we, as pastor and people, may be enabled to work together in harmony for the great object for which His church has been established.

Although we are one behind in our average attendance we have the pleasure to state that our roll as it stands at present is larger than ever before in the history of our school, being twenty two over our former best record, viz.: that of 1889, when we boasted of a membership of 647.

We account for our low average attendance chiefly from the fact that during the summer months a large number of our teachers and scholars were out of the city, and this made a heavy draught on our attendance. Besides, it is useless to expect scholars to come regularly when they are not sure of having a teacher for their class. Fortunately for our school a good number of our friends responded to a special call from our pastor for voluntary teachers to fill up the broken ranks.

Ban mer alik hav We are pleased to state that our collections have kept up pretty well with those of former years, although possibly, they might have been larger. At the beginning of the year our teachers resolved to give the collections of every first and third Sunday of every month to missions instead of one Sunday's collection per month as formerly.

We have raised during the year as follows: For general expenses \$280.75, and for missions, \$218.32, making an average of \$9.60 per Sunday as against \$9.58 of last year. Beside this some of the classes have contributed through mission boxes \$37.72 which goes to augment the fund of the Women's Auxiliary. The young men of Mr. Madill's class have also raised \$65.00, \$50.00 of which they have handed over to the Missionary Committee of the Church, to be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions, retaining the other \$15.00 to add to their reserve fund. Also the young men of Mr. Smith's class have raised \$6.10; Mr. Moffat's class \$5.00; Mr. McRae's class \$3.50, and Miss Bennet's class of girls \$9.00; all of which is to be devoted to missions, which makes a grand average of \$11.74 per Sunday.

Our librarian, Mr. McKenna, reports that out of roo8 books in the library as per catalogue, 878 are at present fit for use; roo have not as yet been returned by scholars since the closing of the librery in December, and 30 have been laid aside for repairs. At the request of the librarian, a standing Advisory Committee was formed at our last business meeting to select books from time to time to add to our library and to otherwise assist him in the discharge of the duties devolving upon him; and we are assured that, under such excellent management, the present high standard and satisfactory condition of the library will be maintained.

We have decided to try a new experiment with our Prize Banner; instead of having four banners to compete for as formerly we will have but one for the whole school, boys and girls alike, and the banner will be given each quarter to the class having the highest average attendance.

This was particularly noticeable at our last Ouarterly Review, which, instead of being held in the Church, was held in the School-room on account of the parents attending these meetings in such small numbers in the past; and it is a pleasure to state that, on this occasion, the room was crowded, many of the parents and friends being present, for which we are thankful.

In closing we feel grateful to our Heavenly Father for every goodness bestowed, for guidance and encouragement.

It is our Master's work, and as His humble seavants we trust Him for the future.

The aim of every effort in this work is that Christ's kingdom may come. Our prayer will ever be that the Holy Spirit will make effectual every honest effort, and that God in whom we trust, will give an abundant harvest in this Mission.

REPORT OF STUDENT IN NORTH END MISSION.

To the Kirk Session of Knox Church:

Gentlemen:—In view of the fact that my work for the summer in your north end Mission is about to close I beg to lay before you a brief report of the work in which I have been engaged.

The district lying between the bay on north and west, and John and Strachan streets on the east and south was the scene of my labors. It did not go farther than John street as it was considered desirable to work as thoroughly as possible the above-mentioned field.

After trying a number of schemes it was found that the best way to further the work in finding out who might be non-church-goers was to visit from house to house. In a place like the north end of Hamilton, where there are so many Roman Catholics, no other system, in my judgment, would do, because it was rarely that a person was found who could safely say whether his neighbors were Protestant or not.

SON, Secretary. About 275 families were visited in all, besides a very large number of Roman Catholics. In visiting I met with very few persons who did not profess to have a claim on some church, but amongst these many, very many indeed, were found who could only advance such a claim because of baptism or because their parents had been in connection with a church. It would seem they had a dislike to be classed as non-church-goers although, as I found out about some; they had not been in church for years.

A large percentage of the 275 families visited may be called non-church goers, and it was in order that these might be interested in the Mission that I, in so far as was possible, visited them often.

The visiting among the people was pleasant; in nearly every case I was received in a friendly manner, and all seemed to acknowledge the favor that your church was conferring upon them by placing within easy access such a splendid meetinghouse, and giving them Sabbath evening services.

I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without mentioning the assistance which I received from all the young people in the Christian Endeavor Society and also from the workers in the Mission S. S. All were anxious to carry on the work successfully, and a more consecrated band of workers could not be asked for.

In the hope that the Lord will amply bless the seed zown in and for His name during the past summer, and that it will encourage your people to go on in the work for souls,

The Mission Committee gratefully acknowledge the continued liberality of the congregation to the schemes of the Church during the past year which enables us to show a considerable increase in the total receipts from all sources. The only falling off appears in the monthly receipts by envelope which are considerably less than last year, but this is more than counterbalanced by the large increase from the Sunday School (which is now giving two collections per month to Missions instead of one as formerly) and the annual contribution by the congregation for the support of preaching services in connection with the north end mission. Notwithstanding the decreased receipts the method of receiving contributions monthly by envelope continues to work satisfactorily, and presents decided advantage over any other system vet tried. It avoids the labor and unpleasantness of personal visitation and solicitation, and at the same time lays on the conscience of each and every one the duty and responsibility of giving voluntarily according to ability, which is undoubtedly the correct principle of Christian liberality, and we would like to see it adopted by a much larger percentage of the membership of this congregation. 985 members on the communion roll only 193 appear as regular or occasional subscribers to Missions, which unmistakeably proves that the great majority are as yet uninterested in this great cause, and no doubt also accounts for the smallness of our contributions as compared with sister congregations.

The Missionary Committee refer with special gratification to the very important and successful work being done through the agency of the Mission School and its noble band of workers. Whatever doubt or uncertainty may have been felt as to the wisdom of this movement at the time of its inception have all

happily been laid at rest by abundant evidence of good work being done, and the efficiency and liberal manner in which the work has been maintained by this congregation is worthy of all praise. The large and well-conducted gatherings of interested children and adults is encouraging evidence that the Divine favor is attending it.

We have again to thank the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor for supplying the envelopes for the monthly returns during the year. Thanks are also tendered to the members of this Society and the ladies of the Foreign Missionary Society who have assisted with papers and addresses to render our monthly Missionary Meeting's interesting and profitable.

In conclusion, the members of this committee would recommend that their number be increased from seven, as at present, to twelve, and that the membership consist of ladies as well as gentlemen.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor take pleasure in presenting their Annual Report as follows:

During the past year the Society has made very substantial gain as regards membership, despite the fact that quite a number of our most active members have left us to take up their residence in other parts of the country.

Beginning the year with a membership of sixty Active and eleven Associate members, we now have on the roll ninety-two Active, twenty-two Associate and two Honorary.

The work of the Society has been carried on under the direction of seven committees, viz.: Lookout, Prayer-meeting, Social, Visiting, Flower and Temperance, and two others have been added for the coming year—Relief and Music.

Following the rule laid down in the constitution, we have held our weekly meeting for prayer and the study of God's Word with persistent regularity not having missed one week during the year. Of the fifty-two meetings held forty-seven have been of the usual character of prayer and testimony; one was devoted to the hearing of reports of convention delegates, and four were union meetings with other societies in the city; twenty-five of the forty seven meetings were led by young ladies.

It is not for us to say fully what influence these meetings have had upon those who attended them, but of this we can speak with confidence: Christian character has been strengthened and many a doubting and trembling one encouraged to take a firmer hold of God's promises and live nearer Christ, the source of all love and light and strength.

Two very successful socials have been held during the year on the evenings of April 21st and October 20th. The latter of these two being the third anniversary of the organization of the Society, invitations were sent out to all the other Christian Endeavor Societies to be present. Quite a large number responded, among whom we mention our colored friends, showing the truly interdenominational spirit which is one of the leading features of the Christian Endeavor movement.

The Visiting Committee has done herculean work during the past year—no fewer than 576 visits have been reported, of which 544 were to the sick and 32 to strangers. The Flower Committee has also been a source of great strength to the Society. Besides beautifying the pulpit every Sunday with the choicest flowers, these flowers were afterward made up into 604 bouquets and distributed to the sick in the congregation. The Society take this opportunity of thanking any members who have in any way assisted in this work by the supplying of flowers or pot plants or contributing to the funds at the disposal of the Flower Committee. The work of these two committees has been very much appreciated by the congregation, and many expressions, indicating deep gratitude, have been received by the Society from those who have been personally remembered.

The Missionary and Temperance Committees have both done some good work in their respective departments, and although nothing of a very definite character can be reported still we believe the results will be an ever-increasing conviction of giving the Gospel to those without it and of endavoring to cultivate a spirit of antagonism to the terrible evil, intemperance.

Under the direction of the Lookout Committee a house to house canvas of the young people of the congregation was made with the object of inducing them to become members. The results have not been all the Society could have wished, but we are encouraged to think that some good has been accomplished and that many others may yet be persuaded to join our ranks and work under the most loving and gracious of Masters.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate, now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said Congregation in full Communion, in accordance with a deed of trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in Full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister, or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church by the officiating Minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding each meeting. The majority of members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require; but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine Managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of vacancy occuring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require and may give notice of their me tings, either from the Pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers are patitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it need by, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members of the Congrection in Full Standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a specimenting of the Congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and to business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a Member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the congregation shall be under the control, of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister. 9th.—The whole revenues of the Congregation, from all sources, shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of Stipend, Salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation. The "Poor Fund," however shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

d

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportions of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13th.—A Committee consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the Comgregation shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the Congregation, together with the list of office bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the Congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of the said Committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th —The foregoing rules shall he in force and no mo ion to alter or amend said rules shall such motion has been given at the annual me and the Congregation; and when notice of motion shall have been not a special meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the me—not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing rules, no one shall be held to be a member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said Congregation, and no others than members in Full Communion shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational meeting.
