## General Intelligence

LAWYER STEALS \$1,000,000.

Had Robert Louis Stevenson lived he would have seen last week one of his countrymen give a dramatic reality to his 'Jekyll and Hyde' creation. James Colquhoun, city treasurer of Glasgow, treasurer of the Free Church and representative of the city corporation in the University court, is now in goal in his native city, charged with having swindled a moderate estimate puts at a million dollars of trust moneys confided to him for investment.

Colquhoun is a workman's son born 50 years ago in Glasgow. He industriously used Scott's educational system and was qualified as a lawyer. He rapidly became one of the most trusted members of his profession, and his property was due to his almost exclusively self-made life. He was active on the committee of the Free Church and on the platform of temperance meetings. He was never personally genial or popular, but raised himself to a pedestal of repeated integrity until he was the favorite model of Glasgow Sunday school teachers in showing pupils an instance of how to become a perfect citizen.

In outward appearance Colquhoun realized the idea. He was always carefully, but not extravagantly dressed. He was cold and serious in manner, and seemed the type of severe integrity, rewarded by the highest honors his country could give. He died last week, when he abruptly resigned his public office and was sent to an insane asylum.

A statement authorized that he was suffering from temporary breakdown, owing to business anxieties, but the medical authorities refused to confirm the statement and a criminal warrant was exacted for his arrest. He was fined \$25,000, and it is believed that he will be exiled.

For several years Colquhoun had been consulting his defunct partner's interest on alleged investments which he never made. Many widows had been ruined by his property. His fellow-citizens could give still further evidence of his unscrupulousness in the scandal until they learned the vastness of Colquhoun's embezzlements and the wreckage of his fortune. He has a wife and family.

It is stated that some years ago he won \$1,000 at Monte Carlo, and since then he has gone to the gambling mania. He has been repeatedly visited by the Continental police, especially Ostend, and played for the highest stakes that the law permitted. The case is believed to be one of the most remarkable criminal trials in Scotland for a generation.

## THE HAITIAN REVOLUTION.

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Aug. 9.—The latest news from Santo Domingo says the revolutionary government is extending and that the province is in arms. It is impossible to obtain any details here. This city is calm.

The relations between the United States and Haiti are cordial. The Haitian government has authorized the creation of an American meteorological station at Cap-Haitien. The permission to establish such a station had previously been refused and the fact that permission has now been granted demonstrates the extension of American influence in Haiti.

PUERTO PLATA, Aug. 6.—The Haitian government has seized at Port-au-Prince a schooner carrying arms for Dominican insurgents. Several Dominicans in Haiti have been arrested for violating the neutrality laws. Among them is Francisco de Ejea, in whose keeping arms were found.

President Sam, of Haiti, has wired the Dominican government, with the request that it not be permitted to use Haitian territory as a base for operations. The command of Minister Couvreur, who accompanied the Haitian forces, led by General Boyer.

Truth Stranger Than Fiction.

To the Editors of Union Advocate, DEAR SIR:—The reading public and those who require a good Dictionary may be interested in knowing that the new "Universal Dictionary" is only a patched old "Encyclopedic Dictionary" which has been considered as unreliable and cheap both in Europe and America.

This four volume thing under "Universal" and many other names to hide for a time at least its real nature is only a poor reprint of an old English work projected in June 1872 by Robert Hunter.

Its reprinters advertise a staff of Editors which are largely imaginary and many of which were questioned on the matter pronounced "the work a fraud and state they have never heard of it before."

The part of the last sentence is from a letter written by Arthur K. Kerfoot the astronomer, dated Jan. 16th 1895. Its reprinters are faithfully reproducing most of the 50,000 errors and defects which conigned the work to oblivion in England the moment of its birth.

In the Pa's all claim that it contains 250,000 words Examination reveals the fact nearly 100,000 are obsolete. A count of the first 82 pages shows about 2400 words one third of which are obsolete.

Space is given on its dim pages for all such fossils as,—san, aande, abasioden, asa, abasichite. In one reprint on page 93 there are 77 words and 62 are marked obsolete and 5 more should have been, that is, 10 living words and 67 dead ones on a single page.

Again it omits such modern words as,—antipyrin, antipyrin, antipyrin, antipyrin, antipyrin, agraffe, arcolinoscope; and great you instead with such as lack the 19th Century ring, such as,—asswage, asswythe, assythe, astast, astahil, astandan, astier, astoveren.

It defines Bacillus as one of the separable narrow plates of which the genus Algaes call Diatoms is composed. An absurdity for genus is composed of Species and Bacillus itself is a genus. Do not turn pale when Hunter tells you that "Chloral is used to adulterate beer!"

Marvel not when he defines buckwheat as: "Resembling buckwheat" and the adjectival definition of Botany is rendered as follows: "In which good botany exists." The electro-type plates have been cut in this little job of patchwork about the X's they have omitted in their entirety (no less) five words of the vocabulary and eight quotations of the original work together with four lines of the definition of roemeria which have been cut out to make way for a deceptive error.

Chemists will pause in silent wonder when Robert Hunter tells them that boron fluoride is an oily fuming liquid; and that the "nitrate salt" of cocaine is generally preferred for "hypodermic injection."

Nothing perhaps is more astounding than the ignorance of the Editors and the methods taken to sell the old thing as up-to-date and reliable. The merits of this 25 lb. mass of inferior paper and print is well summed up in saying that it consists of about 6000 widely spaced pages occupying 1200 inches of cubic measure. These vast dimensions are obtained by endless repetition of obsolete and non-words, and by addition of notes similar in value and quality to those cited above.

The majority of its scanty illustrations are old wood cuts none up to the Modern Standard.

There is no evidence that a drawing was made for the work, whereas the illustrations as it is revised in 1891 inserted over 1800 illustrations and the Century and Standard over 5000 each specially drawn and engraved. The initial cost of the Standard plate of the color spectrum and color chart was \$5000 and was made by the Scientific Department of Columbia University by Hallow and Gordon and required nearly 2 years for completion.

Hundreds of sets of this old 4 volume reprint have been sold for \$6.00 and even \$4.00 per set. Four years ago 50 sets were sold to the St. Louis schools at \$1 per volume, and Wamman has long advertised one reprint at \$3.00 per set. Yet you may this very day meet an oily, varnished agent who will insist to sell you that "this great work is usually sold at from \$42.00 to \$70.00 per set and he will be pleased to furnish it on the instalment plan for the paltry sum of \$18.

I could weary you quoting from letters from every town in America to show how those who bought it feel.

But we turn in disgust from an impertinent so obvious and adapting the words of Macaulay we venture to say from the indignant emnence on which we have placed it, it will not be easily taken down.

This exposure is made in the cause of Public protection and enlightenment and adapting again the recent words of some Englishman, I may hint that if any should feel hurt by the sting of truth I am prepared for all eventualities.

APPALLING DESTRUCTION.

SAN JUAN DE LOS RIOS, Aug. 10.—A hurricane broke over the south coast at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning and swept northwest. There was no abatement for nine hours, the greatest damage being done between 9 and 10 o'clock a. m. The wires are down and communication with the interior was for a time impossible. It is now chiefly carried on by couriers.

Here, at San Juan, four houses were drowned in the harbor, eighty houses were demolished and hundreds were unroofed. The damage to property is estimated at \$500,000. Commissary stores to the value of \$50,000 were destroyed.

A despatch by cable from Ponce, sent at 10 o'clock this morning, says the town was almost destroyed. Almost all the frame buildings are down, the bridge swept away, and there is no communication between the port and the city proper.

At Albion very little remains standing except the cathedral and the barracks. Four natives perished and three United States soldiers were badly injured. As the town is without food, government relief has been despatched thither.

El Cayo was levelled to the ground, two hundred houses being demolished. Two United States soldiers were injured and many cavalry horses killed.

At Catana the entire plant of the Standard Oil Company was ruined. The loss on the property is \$200,000.

At Bayamon a majority of the houses were destroyed and the rest were flooded. Two hundred cattle were killed and the railway was severely damaged.

The village of Carolina was literally razed.

A courier who has just arrived from Humacao, capital of the province of that name on the eastern coast of the island, reports awful destruction there. The loss to property is estimated at \$300,000, but this is the least item in the disaster.

Capt. Eben Swift, of the Fifth United States cavalry, who says: "Humacao was totally destroyed by the hurricane. Forty six bodies have been recovered, and there are many more in the debris. Eighty priests of Trono King, of the 11th infantry, was injured. North, a discharged private, is missing. At the port of Humacao eighteen bodies have been recovered. Eight hundred persons are starving here."

Three persons were killed at Las Piedras, five at Juncos and three at Caguas. The steamer Slocum, Capt. Thomas, from Puerto Rico, was wrecked on the coast of San Juan, was caught in the storm, but her passengers and crew were saved, through the heroism of Mr. Single, the first mate.

The coffee crop is ruined and the loss will reach millions. Very great injury has been done also to the orange crop. No definite returns have yet been received from the southern section, apart from Ponce. It is certain, however, that the food supplies in the stricken districts have been destroyed, and in those quarters the quantity of government stores on hand is small. Relief wagons will be sent out in numerous directions.

St. Thomas, Aug. 10.—As late advices come in from Montserrat, it is seen the first reports conveyed only a faint idea of the sufferings of the people and their deplorable condition. The administration appeals for help.

At La Pointe a Pitre, island of Guadeloupe, immense damage was wrought, and, according to a report not yet confirmed, 100 persons were killed.

In the island of St. Croix, the largest of the Virgin Islands, the destruction was appalling. Thirty persons were killed, and the inhabitants are in great distress.

SAN DOMINGO REVOLUT. KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 11.—A small despatch from Santo Domingo, dated August 3, via Haiti, contains the cable intelligence telling of the spread and significance of the revolution throughout the Dominican Republic. Prominent men in civil and military circles, it appears, are taking the field, with the understanding that Jimenez is the prime mover, and that he will shortly arrive there from Cuba with munitions of war. Among his military adherents, including regular soldiers, were the well known generals Ramon Pacheco and Patlo Rayer, who are advancing westward by forced marches, for the purpose of cutting off Monte Christ from reinforcements, and to form a junction with the insurgent forces from Haiti, thus opening a way for the Jimenez expedition. Undoubtedly the popularity of the revolution is due to the use of the name of General Jimenez, should he decline the presidency, or Jimenez falls, his election, prominent leaders are already considering the alternative of calling a plebiscite in order to ascertain whether the country would not prefer to renew the vote of 1871 for American annexation or an American protectorate.
