Fredericton, April 5. A Bill relating to the settlement and support of the poor, and bill in amedment of an act to authorize the appointment of a stipending Magistrate for Gloucester, were passed.

Reading of evidence taken by committee on seizures of Lumber in Gloucester and Restigouche, and the papers and telegrams in connection therewith was concluded. The reading of the paper occupied nearly four hours.

Ryan (Albert) introduced a Bill for the relief of Rev. William McGuire.

Davidson introduced a bill relating to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

House in Committee agreed to bill intro duced by Smith relating to Tedish and Barachois Marshes.

A bill was received from the Legislative Council to incorporate the Fredericton Cemetery Co.

House in committee on consolidated statutes agreed to chapter "rates and taxes," after making several amendments. one of which was to reduce the limit of the amount to be paid for the assessing and committing rates from fifteen per cent. to ten per cent.

Rogers moved a section to chapter "election of members" to provide that no liquor should be given or sold within the limits of a polling district during polling day under a penalty of \$100 for each offence, or six months imprisonment.
