Constantinople, May 23.—It has been secretained that the ladies belonging to the CONSTATINGFIE, May 23.—It has been ascertained that the ladies belonging to the Russian Embassy who were assaulted while walking in Buyenkedere were the wife and daughter of the Chief Dragoman of the Embassy, and the offenders were a Turkish officer and four students. The ladies were walking in a garden when they were seized by the officer and students, who forcibly kissed them. A party of sailors belonging to a Russian dispatch boat happened to be in the garden. They heard the ladies cry for help and ran to their rescue. The offenders were captured, taken to the Russian Embassy and delivered into the keeping of M. de Nelidoff, the Russian Ambassador. The Turkish authorities asked that the prisoners be turned over to them for trial and punishment, but De Nelidoff refuses to transfer them to the Ottoman officials, basing his refusal on the ground that Turkish justice is illusory. The affair has created much comment, and it is feared it will result in complications between the Russian and Turkish Governments.

Act aright, the same rights as to separate schools are guaranteed to Ontario Catholics as are guaranteed to Quebec Protestants, and when abolition of separate schools is talked of the question at once arises, how is it to be effected in Ontario and not in Quebec!

This view of the case carries all the greater weight because our fellow-Protestants in Quebec have availed themselves far more freely of their right to establish soparate schools than have the Catholics of Ontario. There are 916 Protestant separate schools in Quebec and only some 210 Roman Catholic separate schools in Ontario. The reason for this doubtless lies in the fact that the public schools in Quebec are practically Roman Catholic schools, while in Ontario they are practically unsectarian, and inoffensive to Roman Catholic p cjudice.

If we do away with R. C. separate schools in Ontario and at the same time deprive our brethern in Quebec of the right to maintain their own schools, we shall, it seems to me, strike a far deadlier blow at Protestantism their own schools, we shall, it seems to me, strike a far deadlier blow at Protestantism their own schools, we shall, it seems to me, and maintain all the separate schools they like. The struggling Protestant garrison of Quebec deserves better treatment at our hands than this, and it is significant that no echo of the cry for the abolition of separate schools comes from the other side of the Ottawa River. To abolish separate schools in Quebec would be to place the education of the Protestant youth in the hands of the Roman Catholic clergy, or to cast upon the Protestants of that Province the herculant task of organizing and carrying on a system of education entirely without financial aid from the Government, and, we may well believe, without any favors in the way of help-ful legislation. We ought to hesitate before placing these alternatives before our co-raigionists of Quebec.

If the right to deal with the question is conceded to the Provinces, Ontario cannot interfere with Quebec and Onebec cannot interfere with Ontario, but the Legislature of each Province mu be free to make such laws as it sees fit. The whole question was care fully stated by the late Dr. Ryerson before the settlement provided for in the Confederation Act was agreed upon. In considering the abolition

I have indeed desired to change this state of things in both Upper and Lower Canada. I have gone so far as to confer with the leading Protestants of Montreal, including Presbyterians, Congregationalists and Methodists, and said to them if they would consent, and get any sufficient evidence of consent from the Protestant in habitants of Lower Canada, to the abolition of the clauses of the law for the establishment of dissentient schools. I would urge the abolition of the clauses for the establishment of caparate schools in the protestant inhabitants of Lower Canada. I then said the greatest injustice and injury to the Protestant inhabitants of Lower Canada. I then said the Causes of the law for separate schools in Upper Canada must remain equally just with those for the establishment of dissentient schools in Lower Canada.

the opinions and feelings of the Protestant minority of Quebec at the present day, although it is quite likely that some extreme nen among them may be found to declare for abolition of the dissentient schools. But until it appears that the Protestants of Quebec are in favor of abandoning the protection which the Constitution affords and of taking their chances of getting evenhanded justice under a school law framed by a Legislature composed largely of repre-sentatives of another race and faith than their own, we do not believe that the Protestant majority in Ontario would be justified in taking away the guarantees which have been secured to minorities under the solemn compact of Confederation. This is not quailing before any threats, nor ack nowledging "the power of the Quebe hierarchy to govern as well as the habitants," as the Mail puts it. It is simply carrying out the terms of Union in fidelity terms without which the Union could no have been attained; and it is behaving with prudence and discretion in the interest of peace and good government in Canada.

And let us remind the Mail that the matters were not embodied in the Constitu tion mainly for the protection of Roman Catholics in Ontario. The governing idea was to secure protection for the Protestants





A REAL ROMANCE.

Rational Care of Milch Cows. nal of Agriculture contains in full the valuable paper presented at the Dominion Dairymen's Association meeting in Ottawa y Prof. Ed. A. Barnard, of Quebec. It is entitled "The rational feeding and care of milch cows," and the problem which Prof Barnard sets out to solve is "how to obtain

Barnard sets out to solve is "how to obtain the greatest quantity of rich milk per annum from each cow at the lowest cost for food and care." "It is admitted," says Prof. Barnard, "by the best practical men, that a cow which gives ten times her weight of normal milk in the year, is a superior cow." In the foregoing sentence and elsewhere, the expression, "normal milk," is used. Would it not have added interest and completeness to the paper had the able author indicated in express terms what constitutes normal milk? and if butter fat or total solids be the measure, then what is the percentage? All constitutes normal milk? and if butter fat or total solids be the measure, then what is the percentage? All through the paper it is apparent that Prof. Barnard has kept clearly in view the important consideration—ccat of production and the many causes by which it is influenced. He points out that while the yield of milk increases with the size of equally good cows, the percentage of increase is not the same, small cows, as a rule, giving more weight for weight than the largest. On the other hand, and the point should not be forgotten, he says it is well proved that the smaller the cow the larger the ration she will absorb for maintenance per 100 pounds live weight, while the ration for production remains the same whatever be the weight of the animal, and should be composed of the same chemical elements which form the produce. A table is given showing that one animal of 3,000 pounds live weight, or 90 animals of 10 pounds each—900 pounds in all; or 50 small animals weighing 8 pounds each or 400 pounds in all, consume exactly the same productive ration per day. As an example, 500 young mice in a granary would consume per day as much food as would facten an immense 3,000-pound ox, gaining perhaps three pounds per day. Gate Posts.

Of all the inconveniences about the farm, there are few more annoying than sagging gates, while a well-balanced, nicely swinging gates is pleasure to the owner and a guarantee of welcome to the guests. Gates, barn doors and fences are certificates of character by which the public estimate the landlord. Among all the contrivances to securea good gate, none have been found, in our experience, to surpass the following: Dig the post holes 3½ feet deep, letting the earth be level and firm at bottom. Use medium sized posts with good ends sawed square off. We usually place the posts 11 feet apart, although a wider gate will not sag if set in this way. Fill the holes with well stamped earth. Take a little piece of hardwood (locust preferred) just long enough to fit nicely between the posts, and 6 or 7 inches in diameter. A round piece of wood is best. Dig a little trench deep enough to bury this piece of wood 3 inches below the surface. Set the posts perpendicular, and no ordinary gate will pull them over. The ground should be high enough under the gate to carry the water away and secure good drainage. Gravel, mill cinders or pounded stone will make a good road bed for the approaches, so that no ordinary hauling will cut a rut deep enough to bring the wheels into contact with the buried brace. Gates on this farm set in this way, have been in use ten years, and now swing so easily that a child large enough to reach the fastenings can open and close them with ease.—[A. A., Washington county, O., Country Gentleman.

Good Word for Clover.

The Breeders' Gazette has this to say on the clover question: Many farmers question whether it will pay to sow clover with spring grain upon land that is to be plowed for a crop the coming season. For the principle of it, sow seed in such cases; it will pay nine times out of ten. Indeed there is only one safe rule in regard to clover, and that is to sow it with small grains in every instance. This year the seed is cheapfand there is no excuse for omitting its free use. Clover seed often faß to make a good catch where the grain grows thick or lodges, and the sudden influx of sunlight and hot air that follows the repoval of the grain crop at harvest time sometimes kills

Various experiments with fertilizers upon potatoes go to show the benefit arising from use of sulphate of potatsh. Its influence is not confined to the improved quality alone, but to the increase of quantity. The use of 160 pounds of sulphate of potash per acre produced four times as many marketable potatoes as 400 pounds of acid phosphate, but the product of small potatoes was more than two to one the other way. It also works well with nitrate of soda and phosphate.—[Germantown Telegraph.
