DANGERS IN THE WATER-

are every year becoming more fashionable. The danger incident to boating and to bathing in deep water could be largely discounted if people were a trifle more careful and cultivated that most excellent quality presence of mind. A well-known authority on the subject says:

"Men of sedentary habits should not in-dulge in violent exercise. I don't think a man over 40 years old should even run for a streetjear. A middle-aged or elderly man cannot do with impunity what he could do when a boy. Swimming is a violent exercise. It taxes all the muscles in the body. A man of sedentary habits, who body. A man of sedentary habits, who seldom goes swimming, should be extremely careful not to over-exert himself. He should wait after taking off his clothes, until in a measure cooled before entering the water. He should preferably enter it by diving head first, as the shock to the system is not so great in diving that way, as in stepping gradually into the water and driving the blood to the head. It tends to keep out the cold, and temporarily enable the swimmer to withstand sudden changes of temperature. But after all, the greatest remedy a man can have for cramps is presence of faind. Not one in 100 cases of cramp will prove serious unless the swimmer loses his head. Even if all his limbs were paralyzed he could still float long enough for help to reach him. Any person can lie on his back and float an indefinite length of time without moving a muscle except his breathing apparatus if he only thinks he can."

An old swimmer said to the Detroit News: "Most people either stay in too long or over-exert themselves. The first particularly true of small boys. Go to a stand sudden changes of temperature. But



In conclusion, the reverend gentleman impressed strongly the applicability of his text—that there must be righteous administration before the country could prosper. "There needs to be that lofty conception of citizenship," said he in conclusion, "that shall exalt people by exalting the administration of the day and making the laws of the land in harmony with the laws divine, that the blessing of God may come down upon the people so that righteousness may abound."




