A bylaw to allow the operation of Sunday cars in London will be submitted to the ratepayers in January next.

At a special meeting of the city council held at noon today, a petition was presented asking the aldermen to make application to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to fix the population of London at 50,000 or more, and also that a bylaw be submitted to the electors in January on the question: "Are you in favor of Sunday

MR. YOUNG RESENTS ATTEMPT TO BAR C.N.R. FROM CITY

Prominent Merchant Cannot Understand Attitude of London Free Press.

CITY NOT DEALING WITH ROBBERS

Wholesaler Also Expresses Resentment at Newspaper Treatment of C.N.R.

"As a businessman, I cannot understand the attitude of the London Free Press in trying to prevent the C. N. R. from coming to London,' said Mr. R. J. Young, one of London's leading merchants, in an interview with The Adver-

tiser this morning. "I am sure that citizens in general will resent any attempt in any quarter to make it difficult for the C. N. R. to conduct negotiations with the city, and t is my idea that the city should meet these big railway men with anything but an antagonistic attitude. There is no doubt that their coming to London would be of the greatest advantage to the city of London

positions. It failed to arrange for improvements with the Grand Trunk for the same reason, and it to be hoped that the present council will not waver, and will seek to treat these men with the most reasonable hearing that could be given anyone.

A Great Boon to City.

"The C. N. R., in my mind, would be the greatest boon the city has had in years. Think of what the Michigan Central, which could have been had for London, has done for St. Thomas. It has practically made that city. It is an insane thing to place anything in the way of the C. N. R. when that line is making an offer to the city. The city's interests should be safeguarded, of course, but the aldermen should not treat the railway representatives with suspicion, and let anyone make them believe that they have to deal with robbers. Anyone who has followed the career of Mackenzie & action quicker than any other railroad system in the country

Make Other Lines "Buck Up." "My prediction is that the C. N. R. would have the effect of making the other railways in London buck up." You would soon see a new Grand Trunk depot and elevated tracks, and with a real program court yout, there is not the program could be great activity.

Benefit of Radial Lines. "I think, and I feel safe in saying, that every other businessman in London is in favor of more radial railways. They would be of enormous advantage to the city in general. For instance, the Traction Company brings hundreds of cusomers into our stores who never came before. I see evidences every day of the benefit of that line to my business. People put up their horses at the small villages and come on the cars to London. If Ald. 

QUESTION. The trunk line plans of the Canadian Northern in Western Ontario have introduced a new factor-an unforeseen one into the local railway sit- the Borden Government:

The Canadian Northern has been for some time active in the electric traction field in Ontario, but it was not known until lately that its object in acquiring and building radial lines was to make them serve as feeders to its steam railway system. Its decision to extend its steam line from Toronto westward through this part of Ontario to the boundary, was not formally announced until negotiations were opened for the purchase or lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway. It was generally supposed that the surveying parties along the route were occupied exclusively with electric rail-

way projects. Will our local contemporary, which is throwing an epileptic fit every day in its rage at the proposal to give London another trunk railway system, explain how the Canadian Northern's steam railway project is an attack on the hydro-electric undertaking? Even if it were true, as is alleged, that the men behind the Canadian Northern are behind the Electrical Development Company, which generates power at Niagara, how is the operation of steam railways from Toronto to Windsor, and from London to Port Stanley, part of a scheme to fight the municipalities in the electrical field? The steam railway is coming in any event; St. Thomas, the Government shipyards are. which is in the hydro-electric belt, would welcome it with open arms, and hopes Lendon will fail to come to terms now in order. with the C. N. R. people. The question for London is purely one relating to the transportation facilities of the city. In return for the lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway, what is the on him. C. N. R. prepared to give London in the way of rental, harbor facilities, running rights for the M. C. R. and Pere Marquette, passenger and freight rates, taunk line connection, divisional shops, new hotel, etc., etc.? Hydro-electric has nothing to do with the case. To drag it into the discussion of the railway question is an impertinence, and an attempt to confuse the issue. At bottom it merely means that Mr. Beck is angry because he failed to stampede responsible citizens into approval of



Three Pictures of King Edward By Three Writers [By Special Arrangement With the Winnipeg Telegram.]

Three authors have lately busied themselves in reviewing the life work of the late King Edward VII. Everycne will remember what a sensation was caused in England a few months age by the publication of Sir Sidney Lee's article in the supplement to the Dictionary of National Biography. As Sir Sidney was not only one of the most careful of contemporary scholars, but the official biographer of Queen Victoria, his depreciation of the late King's political influence and his belittlement of that peaceloving monarch's credit for his share tribution to the history of the British in bringing about the entente cordiale with France, and a further statement to the effect that the late King "could not concentrate his mind on books" aroused a storm of criticism.

Among the books written in reply Lee is a volume issued a few weeks ago, entitled, "King Edward in His True Colors." The author, Mr. Edward Legge, is very loyal to the memory of King Edward, and endeavors to make ot, that Sir Sidney is quite wrong in his depreciation of such an eminent advocate of peace. He even goes so far as to say that Englishmen are really living under an autocracy, but "happily he (King Edward), was a benevolent autocrat, and carefully concealed the iron hand beneath a velvet glove." While I admire Mr. Legge for his loyalty, I cannot understand why he considered it necessary to relate anecdotes in his book cencerning the strained relations that existed between King Edward and Emperor William of Germany; nor can I understand why he dug up an old scandal like the baccarat case. * * *

The third book dealing with the late King Edward's career is written from still another viewpoint. It is entitled "Monarchs and Men," and comes from the pen of the celebrated and mystericus German journalist, Maximilian Harden. Conditions of virtual slavery are alleged to exist, once the men get into these camps. It is too far in the those leaving are forbidden under penalty to be given food or shelter at other camps on the long tramp out. If the men quit a series of deductions are made from their pay checks for all sorts of things. Owing to such deductions it is usual for the men to get no pay until after they worked a month or six weeks. Foreigners through their ignorance of English are the worst sufferers. The men are helpless and at the mercy of their employers, because there i no settlement nor trace of civilization for miles around, except at their


Charged Big Prices. Among other items in the complaints of the laborers are these:

The long journey means their carrying light outfits, and the neces sities which they procure subsequently at the company's stores are sold to them at exorbitant prices, as, for example: drivers' gloves \$3.50 a pair boots, \$12 a pair, and cheap pants \$12 a pair. The men are charged \$7 a week for board of the very poorest sort, which sum is deducted from their wages. One dollar per month is deducted from the pay of each man for hospital, of which there is one for bout every three hundred miles, and acilities are the poorest for getting o them. The injured are often buried ith scant ceremony. Hospital atcoance is sadly deficient. some cases the burials of foreigners Mr. Robert Conroy, of Aylmer, three have not been human. Men suffering from minor troubles are put in the yphoid sections. Thirty-five cents a month is deducted from the pay each man for the expense of handling the mails which are very rare. 

THE WORLD'S BUSINESS

otal for This Year Will Reach Engl mous Figure of \$35,000,000,000. [Canadian Press.]

Washington, Nov. 29. - In the present wear the world's international business will reach the enormous total of \$35,000,000,000, according to a report issued today by the bureau of foreign shortly. and domestic commerce. The estimate is made on official returns of exports and imports from virtually every commercial country in the world. Nearly every nation reported a greater ex- taste. change of commodities than ever be-fore had been known.

The new figure will establish a record, for it is four billion dollars greater than the trade in 1910, and more than double that done in 1890, 22 years Seventy leading countries furiished their figures to the Government statisticians. Only Argentina and Russia reported decreases, both falling off sharply. The United States so far has shown a monthly increase of \$18,-000,000 over 1911. Canada, Haiti, Honduras and Santo Domingo do most of their shopping in the United States, according to the report, while China, India, certain of the Balkan States and Turkey look elsewhere for their purchases. The balance of trade (that difference of goods sold over those imported) still remains strongly with American manufacturers and producers, the figures showing that they enjoyed a balance on the right side of the ledger of approximately \$16,000,

EXPERT WILL REPORT ON BREAKWATER

Mr. Willis Chipman Will Tell City How Best to Protect West London.

WARREN CO. STOPS WORK

No Further Repairs Are To Be Made on Talbot Street-Rinks in the Parks.

Mr. Willis Chipman, consulting en-gineer, will be asked to report on the best methods of protecting the West London embankment. At the meeting of the board of works last evening, the question was brought up in connection with the report of City Engineer Brazier, on the best way of dealing with this problem, and the poard diantimously agreed to have Mr. Chipman give his opinion on the question.

According to Mr. Brazier, there were two methous of protecting West London. The first, and the one he recommended, was to build a sloping gravel and earth empankment, faced with cement block or stone. The cost of this work would be \$27,000. The other was to build a vertical concrete wall, reinforced and piled, to protect suburb This would cost about \$60,000. Mr. brazier thought the gravel em-bankment would be plenty good enough.

Ala. Moore advised the board to secure the services of an independent expert to report on the matter.

"I suggested this earlier in the year," said. "I think it the best possible thing to do, under the circumstances. Mr. Chipman is available at the present time, and we can secure his ser-vices at no great expense. I think we should be advised what is the best course to pursue.'

Ald. Coles agreed with the proposi-tion, and Mayor Graham and Chairman Robinson were named a commit-tee to secure Mr. Chipman's services. No More Repairs,

A communication was received from the Warren Paving Company, saying that owing to the cold wea-ther it was impossible to complete the repairs on Talnot street this year. They had no objection to the city doing the work and charging it up to them.

The guarantee on the Talbot street pavement expires this year," explained City Engineer Brazier. "I think we had better notify them to complete the repairs, and if they cannot do so this year, to obtain an agreement from them to do the work next spring."
