INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS IN THE UNITED STATES.

Subscriptions to the Liberty Loan had an appreciable effect on the New York market, and it is likely the market will take a sort of rest so far as any great extended movement until the large withdrawals for the loans are more or less adjusted. In fact, there are those who tell us to look out for more than ordinary recessions. However, the general opinion among representatives seems best expressed in an absolute confidence in the general steadiness of reliable

securities of large earning capacity.

The Iron Age price average for the leading steel products during the past week was \$109.64 a ton against \$99.29 a week ago. Lead touched a new high figure of 121/2c a pound, almost double the price of a year ago. Tin is 611/3c, comparing with 43½c at this time last year. Copper is within ½c per pound of its record high price of 34½c. The United States Steel Corporation is earning the largest profits in its history, and is accumulating surplus at a rate almost "beyond the dreams of avarice," and other steel organizations, including

Bethlehem and Republic, are enjoying almost equal prosperity.

In summing up conditions and prospects, the Public Investor Service, Inc., has this to say: "There are no serious clouds on the financial horizon; there may be squalls at any time. It will be the part of wisdom to buy on any material residues and the serious clouds. terial reaction and to sell on the bulges. Ample margin protection is essential. Given that and intelligent selection of securities, based upon analysis of fundamentals, and there are larger profits to be reaped in the coming year than even in the past two years.

DOING BIG THINGS.

Big things are only little things put together. I was greatly impressed one morning as I stood watching the workmen erecting the steel framework for a tall office building in New York. A shrill whistle rang out as a signal, a man over at the engine pulled a lever, a chain from the derrick was lowered, and the whistle rang out again. A man stooped down and fastened the chain around the centre of a steel beam, stepped back and blew the whistle once more. Again the lever was moved at the engine, and the steel beam soared into the air up to the sixteenth story, where it was made fast by little bolts.

The entire structure, great as it was, towering far above all the neighboring buildings, was made up of pieces of steel, and stone, and wood, put together according to a plan. The plan was first imagined, then pencilled, then carefully drawn, and then followed by the workmen. It was all a combination of little things. It is encouraging to think of this when you are confronted by a big task. Remember that it is only a group of little tasks, any one of which you can easily do. It is ignorance of this fact that makes some men afraid to try.

WHAT OF SILVER?

An investigation of the subject discloses the fact that the demand for silver coinage purposes is increasing rapidly and bids fair soon to exceed the sup-The trend of silver has been slowly but steadily upward, and there is little of about the eventual standing of the white metal. There are many who beeve it will reach the stage where remonetization will place it on a plane with old. When this war is over and the nations, no longer concerned with actual attle campaigns, set themselves to the task of devising ways and means for aying their debts with a minimum of disturbance to the world's business, he remonetization of silver will undoubtedly receive consideration. While ot generally known, it is a fact that in the French Chamber of Deputies i was suggested recently that gold be demonetized: the object of the movemen was to force hoarders to bring out gold estimated at 4,000,000,000 francs which is still being kept in hiding in spite of patriotic appeals to owners to exchange it for notes. This is the nub of the situation. The people do not want notes—they want hard money—something that of itself has a real intrinsic value Gold being held by the Government, silver is the only hard money medium left for circulation among the people.

Some reasons why silver may be expected to advance during the war period, and even more rapidly after the war is over, are: (1) Silver is the common medium of exchange in small dealings in all Asia, Europe and North Africa, the habitat of five-sixths of the human race. (2) All the countries of Europe have been greatly reduced in their gold reserves or their gold supplies A very large part of this gold has found its way to America, which has be come the money centre of the world, and the civillan population of Europe needs silver as a circulating medium. Moreover, troops on foreign soil are demanding payment in hard money. In addition to the forces already on the Western Front inside of a year, if the war lasts that long, there will be a million American troops. With what are these soldiers going to be paid? (3) As there is no way by which the gold can be returned to Europe, how shall we ecure a medium of exchange except by sending over silver in vast quantitie to take the place of depreciated currency the people otherwise will be forced to use? (4) Where is the silver to come from to supply the demands of Europe India, China and Japan? For all these countries must have silver, and it stimated that the needs will be approximately five billion dollars. The de mand for silver in the East is so great that the Philippine Islands have sold their coined silver to India and China.

The United States Government has been buying sliver in constantly in-creasing quantities; the latest reported purchase was 700,000 ounces of bar silver on Friday of last week. The prices paid range from 75% to 77c an ounce.

The world is practically dependent on the mines of the United States and those of the Cobalt district of Canada for its silver supply. Present silver prices mean large profits to American mines producing silver, either as a primary metal or a by-product. If silver goes to one dollar, which is not un likely, the earnings of the silver mines should be greater than at any time in the past twenty-five years. The effect, marketwise, of such prosperity on the stocks of producing silver companies needs no comment.

UNITED STATES STOCK MARKETS.

The war news has grown much more favorable in the last week or two, and the undercurrent of pessimism which seemed to prevail then has subsided a large extent. With the exception of some rise in destruction of tonnage y submarines, improvement is shown in every direction—the advance of the British, the abdication of Constantine, and the better outlook in Russia where the stalking ghost of a separate peace is disappearing. The stock market cannot be said yet to be much else than a professional one, although the extra Red Cross dividend in Steel, accompanied by the unusual method of announcing a future dividend of good proportions some time in advance, has induced public buying of this remarkable security, advancing its price beyond the other levels. It is undoubtedly public buying that has done this and has postponed at least the substantial reaction which was looked for on account of the technical situation of stocks

Meantime, many securities are rivalling Steel in record of earnings-some of them even exceeding it—and before long the knowledge of this will undoubtedly induce considerable rises throughout the industrial list. Before this, however, the technical tightening of money incident upon the payment for the war loan, which must take place no matter how well arranged the bookkeeping provisions for transfer are—this money-situation may temporarily, at least induce some slowing up of activity in the general market. We shall see, perhaps later on, the effects of an unusual form of inflation, that induced by very large profit making-a form which in ordinary times might bring on an era wild speculation. But in these periods when the crash of war sobers the calculations of even the most reckless, probably the same conservative leader ship which has carried us with safety away from this form of derangement will still protect us .- Bache's Review .

THRIFT AND PRACTICAL ECONOMY.

There is altogether too much money spent for the delivery of commodities public consumption and in some of the large cities such as Philadelphia and Washington it is estimated to cost as much as \$40 per annum for each individual or \$190 for the average family.

We already have some "Cash and Carry" stores, and it is to be hoped that in the interest of the present necessity for economy to which we are just awakening, more will follow. The public has been pampered to that extent that only a short time ago one of our florists told the writer of a recent instance where a lady phoned for half a dozen carnations to her house, nearly one and a half miles distant—that evening, and it was nearly nine when the phone order was received. It is not an uncommon sight to see five or six milk delivery wagons in one block at the same hour, and again three or four bread delivery wagons in the same block within the same hour. At the present cost of feed, and labor for driver and repairs, each delivery equipment costs nearly ne thousand dollars a year.

The consumer pays thic cost in the necessary addition to what the same goods might be sold for if the purchasers would carry their purchases home with them. It is a burden upon the limited purse which might be largely relieved by a different system and the opportunity is ripe for some one to provide the remedy.

British Troops Withdraw From Struma for Purpose,

ROUTE FAVORED

Sarrail Evidently Plans to Strike for Nish.

CUT CONSTANTINOPLE LINE

Troops Massing in Thessaly, With No Obstacles Encountered.

LONDON, June 18 .- The massing of Entente troops in Thessaly, south of the center of the line now held by Gen. Sarrail's forces, taken in connection with the withdrawal of British forces on the extreme eastern wing along the lower reaches of the Struma River, seemingly is an indication that big events are in the making in the Macedonian theatre in an attempt to retake Serbia, or at least that portion of it, as far as Nish, through which runs the (amous Berlin-Constantinople railway. Along the Vardar and Morava River valleys northward through Serbia undoubtedly would prove easier ground over which to operate than northward along the Struma and through western Bulgaria to the junction of the railway at Sofia. No impediment is being placed in the way of the troops that have been landed in Thessaly and with the departure of former King Constantine from the country the people are declared to have become more friendly to the allied cause by placing their adherence in the provisional government of Eleutherios Venizelos.

Although on the eastern wing the British have given up numerous villages which they have previously burned, they are holding tight to the bridgehead position on the left bank of the River Struma in the lake Tahinos-Butkovo sector, northeast of Saloniki. That the retirement of the British was voluntary is indicated by the Bulgarian official report dealing with the man-couvre, which does not mention any fighting as having taken place. There has, however, already been some activity on the part of the British in the Vardar-Lake Doiran sector, but Soña reports that the attempt made by them to advance near Dautli was repulsed.
