Efforts of Austrian statesmen to quiet the hungry people in their demand for a peace apparently failed of their purpose, and the censorship, which permitted the promises of the Government's spokesmen to reach the outside world, again has resumed its vigor. The trouble is said to be deep-seated and le a mixture of war weariness, hunger and anti-Germanism. Seemingly the one strong hope of Austrian leaders in quieting the tumult is in the success of the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk with Russia and the Ukraine. The German attitude on occupied territories has baiked the conclusion of peace with Russia and the central powers have been unable to agree to a treaty with the Ukraine. A peace with the Ukraine would open the food-producing territory of Little Russia to the Austrians, who have been refused food by Hungary.

## **OVER 700 LIVES** LOST BY SINKING OF TWO VESSELS BY ENEMY CRAFT

Announcement of Disaster Is Announced in House of Commons Today.

HAPPENED 3 WEEKS AGO

Mediterranean Was Scene of This Loss Involving So Many Lives.

London, Jan. 23.—By the sinking of two steamers by the enemy in the Mediterranean about three weeks ago, 718 lives were lost, it was announced officially today.

The announcement was made in the Commons by Thomas J. McNamara, financial secretary of the admiralty.

Mr. McNamara's announcement gave the first news received here of any heavy loss of life in recent sinkings in the Mediterranean. A dispatch from Tokio on January 4 showed that an attempt had been made by hostile submarines to attack British transports convoyed by Japanese warships in the Mediterranean on December 30. The terranean on December 30. The Japanese admiralty announcement stated that the submarines were re-pulsed and that the warships were not damaged.

DEPENDING ON JUDGES

Exact Date of Next Call Hinges on Way Decisions Are Handed Down.

About the first of February the call will go forth for the remaining men in Class 1, who are available for military service, and who have not receiv-

tary service, and who have not received their call yet.

This is the nearest estimate that it is possible to make at present, and though no definite information is in the hands of the military authorities or the deputy registrar, it is expected that the call will be made about the first of next month or shortly after that date.

The whole quesion depends on the speed with which the decisions now pending before the appeal judges and the central appeal judges are handed down, for until the cases are nearly all decided, authorities state that they do not think further calls for men will be made.

It is pointed out that if the men were notified by registered letter to report for duty as soon as their own individual cases were decided, it would nean that men would be dribbling in by ones and twos each day, and would create more confusion than if, after a brief delay, they were all called in together in large numbers, as was done at the first of the present month.

## **NEW AGREEMENT** BEING PREPARED FOR AUDIT DEPT.

**Duties of City Officials Being** More Clearly Defined by Rules.

HELP FOR TREASURER

Money Must Be Spent in This Department to Save Money, Says Controller.

The board of control at a special meeting today promulgated a new form of agreement with the city auditors. It was passed on to the finance committee, and will be discussed by the latter committee this evening.

Controller E. S. Little explained that it was necessary to have a proper form of agreement, to that the duties of the auditors might be clarified. At the present time there was too much work for City Treasurer J. S. Bell and his staff, with the result that there was not sufficient demarcation between the work of the treasurer and the auditors.

"Mr. Bell has altogether too much to do, and we must give him help," said Mr. Little. "He must be relieved of detail work, and allowed to do the proper duties of his office. If we are going to save money we must spend



#### DR. HILL MAY QUIT **UNLESS CONDITIONS CHANGE IN LONDON**

Present System of Medical Inspection Inadequate.

#### WASTE TIME AND MONEY

Chaos Has Resulted, Says M.O.H., From Recent Methods.

"If the present situation has got to continue, I quit," Dr. H. W. Hill, M.O.H., told the members of the board of health Tuesday afternoon, after he had placed before them a report in which he laid bare what he termed the total failure of the system of medical inspection at present in use.

The situation is so acute and infectious diseases have gained such headway through lack of inspection facilities that drastic reforms are needed, according to Dr. Hill, who advised the appointment of two whole-time medical inspectors and many other changes, including the employment of a public cluding the employment of a public health nurse, an additional sanitary inspector, and the purchase of another automobile.

spector, and the purchase of another automobile.

The costliness, as well as the chaos that has resulted from the present method of having four or five physicians devote part of their time to the work was shown in the report for the past year. Drs. Harris, Dean, Downham, Ferguson and McLean had been devoting part of their time to the work, and even with the combined time of all five, less than a full day's work for one man was obtained.

Serious Delays.

It was sometimes two or three days before it was known whether inspection calls had been made, and many times calls were returned and left over from day to day. On January 7 a total of 60 calls were listed, and during the

calls were returned and left over from day to day. On January 7 a total of 60 calls were listed, and during the present month calls were laid over for as far back as a week.

Complaints were being received from citizens and school principals because of the delay in releasing people from quarantine, and because the placards were not removed promptly. Confusion also resulted from different doctors calling on the same cases, and through the doctors being unfamiliar with the work.

The department had nobody to investigate alleged infractions of the law by people who delayed reporting their cases, or who came out of quarantine

before they were legally released.

Breaks Down Work.

The failure of the department to give service was leading to neglect in reporting cases, and was breaking down the work of education of years schools and the board.

The doctors who had their own practice to attend had worked hard, but all were quoted to the effect that

the present method was a waste of time and money and a failure.

The need of better inspection was brought to the attention of the board by a delegation from the Simcoe Street Mothers' Club, which, after stating that an epidemic of septic sore throat had resulted in the deaths of four children, urged the appointment of full-time medical inspections, and also the fumigation of the schools.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—There is increasing distrust manifested here over the amouncement made by Hon, W. J. Hanna, food controller, in Toronto recently that bacon would shortly be disallowed for consumption in Canada. He singled out bacon, beef and white flour as the articles of food which would disappear from Canadian tables. The distrust arises over the fact that there is an immense surpins of bacon and ham in Canada at the present time that it is impossible through lack of tonnage to ship it all to Great Britain, and that bacon only remains good for two months.

Has Stimulated Demand.
One effect of the announcement has been to stimulate the purchase of bacon at the high prices prevailing at the present time, whereas, according to the universal law of supply and demand, the price of bacon should be drapping fast.

This recalls the statement made some months ago in Vancouver, although denied by the food controller's office that the food controller had suggested a \$10,000 fund for a campaign to induce the Canadian people to eat eggs, thus relieving the cold storage companies of the immense surplus of eggs that should be piled up. It would also have had the effect of keeping up the price of eggs.
