A CONFERENCE HELD TODAY.

A conference of the cigar manufacturers was held this morning and the situation canvassed. They claim that they are thoroughly organized and will fight any interference.

"A wrong impression was conveyed when it was announced that the increase would amount to but 10 per cent," said one manufacturer. "It will make a difference of from 20 to 35 per cent to practically all the union shops in the city. One of the largest manufacturers will have to pay 20 to 35 per cent, owing to a particular size cigar he manufactures. The others of us will have to pay somewhat higher, so the increase will run from 20 to 35 per cent, depending upon certain sizes and grades. LET THE

THE CROP OUTLOOK **GENERALLY GOOD**

Conditions of Wheat, Clover and Fruit in Counties of Ontario.

Toronto, May 10.-The Ontario department of agriculture has issued the following statement regarding agricultural conditions existing at the beginning of May:

Vegetation-Warm weather of March started vegetation from three to four weeks earlier than usual, but the latter part of April was very wet and cold, the result being that May opened with growth ahead of the average. Spring sowing-Field operations have been the earliest for many years.

The seed bed for spring grains generwas unusually good, and the new crops were making a very early and most promising showing as correspondents

Fall Wheat-This crop entered into May well forward, and presents a good appearance on the whole, more especially where it had been got in early.
Winter Rye—The acreage of this small, but where grown it is reported to be in good condition gen-

Clover-Like fall wheat, clover wintered well, and presents a good appearance at present. Fodder supplies-A correspondent, describing the fodder situation, says: The short and mild winter worked wonders," and others write to the same effect. In most districts there is a sufficiency of hay, oats, wheat, etc. All classes of live stock are at a oremium. Prices for horses are high and firm, attributed by some to the great demand from our western provinces. Their general health has been Cattle have been remarkably free from disease, but are rather thin in flesh. Milch cows are fewer number than usual, but in both dairy and beef raising sections more calves are being kept. Fat cattle are very scarce, and a good deal of inferior beef has been disposed of at good prices. Sheep are doing well. High prices for these also prevail. Swine are not so plentiful as in former years, as they have been rushed to market at prices







Scarlet Fever in London Is Still Hanging On and City Will Investigate.

So It Was Reported at a Meeting of the Board of Health Yesterday-Routine Business.

Scarlet fever shows little signs of abatement in London, and Dr. Wiliams, of the board of health, will investigate the statistics in order to discover where the source of infection is, and to see if any milkmen are in anywise responsible for the epidemic. According to the report of Dr. Hutchinson, M.H.O., submitted to the board of health yesterday, there have been 8 cases registered so far this month, or nearly one a day. In January there were 12 cases, February 39, March 22, April 20, and May 8, a total of 101 cases. There were six deaths, four of

the statistics," said Dr. Williams. "I see one milkman's name appears seven times in the list and another six times. At first glance the cases seem widely listributed, but it might be possible on closer scrutiny to discover some source of the infection and guard against it. On motion of Mr. Carrothers, the report was given to Dr. Williams, and he was instructed to give his opinion of the epidemic at the next meeting of the board.


