### Urged To Fight Jim Crow Favors

Washington - An urgent appeal for united support of a tederal aid to education bill with sateguards against aid "to those areas which will use the money for maintaining a segregated system" was made this week by Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington Bureau of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored people.

In an address before the National Conference on Federal Aid to Education, Mr. Mitchell asserted that 'it is immoral to ask colored citizens . . . to accept a condition which results in white schools worth \$250 per pupil and colored schools worth \$48 per pupil. Federal aid to education without proper safeguards against segregation will underwrite and extend this kind of inequality."

Mr. Mitchell outlined the successful legal attacks made by the NAA CP on segregation in higher education, and the pending court cases directed at ending segregation below the college level. "It is especially important that education leaders throughout the country's support a program of federal aid with safeguards against discrimination. the NAACP executive said, adding that "it is inevitable" that the Association will challenge in the courts any bill passed without such safeguards.

> GILBERT SENTENCE NAACP ASKS ARMY

Washington — A request that the death sentence imposed upon Lieut. Leon Gilbert of the 24th Infantry in Korea be revoked was made this week of Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, Jr., by Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington Bureau of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

"The news of the death sentence", Mr. Mithell wrote Secretary Pace, "was a severe shock to colored people throughout the United States, especially when we have received so much information on the valiant record of the 24th Infantry Regimental Combat Team."

Citing Lieut. Gilbert's excellent record in World War II, Mr. Mitchell asserted: "To give him the death sentence in view of his ombat record is so fantastic that we urge that the Department of the Army immediately announce that he will not be executed."

The charges against Lieut. Gilbert, the NAACP official noted, "appear to be based on the same factors that cause armies to retreat with honor." Noting that the Association has received reports of prejudice against Negro corvicement in Koron and of accidental bombings of the 24th Infantry by our own planes, Mr. Mitchell asked "that the influence of these factors on Lieut. Gilbert and other servicemen be carefully studied . . . thet a full inquiry be made to see that he is not made the victim of unfair accusations and hasty trial procedures.




