## FIGHT RACE HATRED IN ONTARIO

(From the Toronto Daily Star)

Hamilton, Dec. 9 —"There have is president. This is the first time darkness and fascism." the convention has been held outside Toronto.

"A Negro is refused as a participant in a bridge tournament in Toronto," Mr. Grube said, "and Negroes are expected to sit in a special part of a Halifax theatre. We know only too well that many hotels in our cities, while they would deny any restrictions, in practice do treat Negro people differently from other guests.

In spite of recent legislation in Ontario, the words 'restricted patronage' still can be seen in all their shameful indecency in some places. Torontonians can see it any day they visit the main drag of Toronto island. I am told the words may be too ambiguous to be illegal but their meaning is disgustingly clear."

"These are not isolated incidents." declared Mr. Grube. "They are significant of a trend that must be fought with the same determination as the other battles for socialism and democracy. No socialist party is worthy of the name that does not take its assertion of equality without regard to race, color or creed, with a solemn determination to carry it out.

"In these confused times, man is feeling dreadfully insecure, and with good reason, in this world. The danger is precisely that he will seek a spurious security in a feeling of false and indecent superiority to others not quite like himself. Economic insecurity is often at the root of racial prejudice and the removal of that

# OF ONESELF

An Essay on Race Pride By W. E. B. DuBois

My Grandfather left a passage in his diary expressing his indignation gro" picnic. Alexander DuBois, born in the Bahamas, son of Dr. James DuBois of the well-known DuBois family of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., had been trained as a gentleman in the Cheshire School of Connecticut, and the implications of a Negro picnic were anathema to his fastidious soul. It meant close association with poverty, ignorance and suppressed and disadvantaged people, dirty and with bad manners.

This was in 1856. Seventy years a black skin was in itself a sort of patent to nobility, and that Negroes ought to be proud of themselves and heir ancestors, for the same or analagous reasons that made white folk zel superior.

Thus, within the space of threeourths of a century, the pendulum has swung between race pride and ace suicide, between attempts to build up a racial ethos and attempts o escape from ourselves. In the rears between emancipation and 1900 the theory of escape was dominant. We were, by birth, law and training, white environment. Later, it tended, American citizens. We were going more and more, to be based on to escape into the mass of Americans in the same way that the Irish and Scandinavians and even the Italians were beginning to disappear. For this reason, we must oppose riotism; we must salute the American flag and sing "Our Country 'Tis of Thee" with devotion and fervor, and we must fight for our rights with long and carefully planned campaign, uniting for this purpose with all sym

pathetic people, colored and white. This is still the dominant philosophy of most American Negroes and it is back of the objection to even using a special designation like "Negro' or even "Afro-American" or any such term.

But there are certain practical difficulties connected with this program which are becoming more and more clear today. First of all comes the fact that we are still ashamed of ourselves and are thus estopped from valid objection when white folks are ashamed to call us human. Yet, he had responded to a call for a meeting of colored folk, which touched his interests, and he came. He found men of his own calibre and training, he found men charming and companionable. He was thoroughly delighted. I know that never before, or I doubt if ever since, he had been in such congenial company. He could not help mentioning his joy continually and reiterating it.

The situation is this: America, in American Negroes, has said in the past that the Negro was so far below the average nataion in social position, that he could not be recognized until he had developed further. In the answer to this, the Negro has eliminated five-sixths of his illiteracy according to official figures and greatly increased the number of colored persons who have received education of the higher sort. They still are poor with a large number of delinquents and dependents. Nevertheless, their average situation in this respect has been greatly improved and, on the other hand, the emergence and accomplishment of colored men of ability has been undoubted. 



HIS DUKEDOM IS JAZZ

Ellington Is Royal Where It Reigns

by Ben Wigder

Duke Ellington brought his orchestra to Masonic Temple Saturday night to show Detroit a sample of the jazz music that has won him the acclaim of such great names in the music world as Leopold Stokowski and Percy Grainger.

The plaudits which have been heaped on Ellington's head since his music moved from the Harlem hot spots into the rarified atmosphere of Carnegie Hall perhaps reached their apex in the dignified comment of a noted English music critic who said:

"Ellington stands alone in jazz as the one artist who has something to say that is not only personal but universal, not only down-to-earth but also indicative of a fine and dignified musical mind."

Ellington is a big, friendly fellow who prefers to call his own work "Negro music, inspired by my men and my race." He likes to talk seriously about his work, claiming that the character of the music he writes is suited to the individual personal titles of the members of his orchestra.

His First Composition

The "Duke" was born Edward Kennedy Ellington 48 years ago in Washington, D.C., the son of Negro parents one generation away from the cotton fields. His father was a blueprint tracer for the Navy Department. Ellington acquired the nickname "Duke" in high school because of his immaculate dress.

He was given piano lessons at the age of seven but his first real love was for drawing. He received an art scholarship but passed it up for a job as a soda jerk in a fountainbar-and-poolroom spot called The Poodle Dog. And in that spot Ellington fell in love with the piano.

When the piano player lost his job for paying more attention to The Poodle Dog's whisky supply than to the key-board, Ellington got the job. He began to play what he saw and felt. And out of what he saw and felt he contrived the first of his compositions, "Soda Fountain Rag."

He learned to read musir, took lessons in harmony. Soon he and four other musicians banded together for dances and special jobs. And in 1923 Ellington took his little band, "The Washingtonians," to New York and Harlem. The night they arrived they had enough change left to buy one hot dog sandwich, which they shsared.

The Latest Triumph

Ellington's record from that date reads like an irresistible march of triumph. The Kentucky Club in 1923 the Cotton Club in 1927, "Mood Indigo," "Creole Love Song," "Solitude," which won the \$2,500 ASCAP Prize, Carnegie Hall. His latest and greatest triumph was the commission to write the music for "Beggar's Holiday," a modern version of John Gay's "Beggar's Opera," which opens on Broadway soon.

Ellington's son, Mercer, also is a composer of music but the "Duke" does not attempt to influence him any more than he attempts to force his music on the uninitiated. He will not compromise by playing the banal to get himself an audience.

The dignity, intelligence, the solid and genuine emotion that are in the man are in his music. To change his music he would have to change himself.

Garbet. Wright is a Negro who went into Garbet's grocery store in Cleveland to buy a bottle of milk and was refused. He brought suit and, in the lower court, secured a judgment against Garbet. Garbet then appealed to the Ohio Supreme Court stating that the civil rights law is unconstitutional as applied to a purely private business.

In its brief, the NAACP stated: "During the past two decades, there has been a growing awareness of the damage to society which is caused by uncontrolled use of purely private property. . . . With this change, there has been increasing restriction of the freedom of contract and freedom to use one's private property, each step in this restriction being predicated upon the responsibility of the Government to protect citizens who are helpless to protect themselves.

CHARGE GEORGIA GROUP SOUGHT TO ESTABLISH NAZI-LIKE REGIME IN U.S.

by Paul Simmons Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 10 (AP) - A harge that leaders of the local Columbian, Inc., sought by terrorism and hate, "obviously inspired by Hitler's early beginnings," to seize power in the United States and set up a Nazi form of government was nade today by Eugene Cook, Georia's attorney-general.

After disclosing his file to newspapermen, Cook had it notarized and transmitted it to Gov. Ellis Arnall as an official act of the state. The record, compiled with the aid of the non-sectarian Anti-Fascist League Specialty Shops of New York, contained charges of dynamiting a Negro home, a plot to 'beat up or lynch' prominent Georgians, drive out the Negro population and seize power by fostering ra-

> Solicitor-General E. E. Andrews, one of a dozen or more prosecutors and police officers who heard the disclosures announced that the evidence would be presented to the grand jury Friday and "prosecuted vigorously.

President Emory Bure of the Anti-Negro, Anti-Jewish Columbians could not be reached for comment, but Secretary Homer L. Loomis Jr.. said the attorney-general's charges were "a pack of lies."

Loomis, located at Columbian neadquarters, said "I am surprised at the charges."

More than 200 pages of sworn affidavits and documentary evidence gathered by the Anti-Fascist League were turned over to Cook by the league's administrative chairman, James H. Sheldon, and incorporated in his report. Much of this material was obtained, Sheldon said, by league investigators who by pretending to have fascist leanings "immediately gained the confidence of Columbian leaders."

One of the investigators, blonde Renee Forrest of New York, reported that she gained entree as a "secretary" at Columbian headquarters. With the help of another investigator, Mario Buzzi, the report said, Miss Forrest soon won over two Colum-

These two, James R. Childers, former lunchstand waiter and wearer of a Columbian "medal of honor and Lanier Waller, former marine were flown secretly to New York a week ago to help build up the deague's file against the order.

Describing themselves as "former suckers" they were at the attorneygeneral's office to bolster their sworn statements to the league. Childers said that when his membership in the Columbians was solicited he was asked three questions: "Do you hate Negroes? Do you hate Jews? Do you have \$3?" He said he then was given the khaki Columbian uniform and its "thunderbolt insignia."

Waller told of going with a Columbian leader to obtain dynamite to bomb the Negro home. Sheldon said the league also had a statement of the seller of the dynamite and a dozen sticks of explosive which Cook Canada said had been seized were exhibited to reporters.

Sheldon also reported that Waller had given a statement that the Columbians had a list of 10 enemies to be beaten up or lynched. These, he added, included Ralph McGill, editor of the Atlanta Constitution Dan Duke, assistant attorney-general prosecuting a state suit to revoke the Columbian charter, and Representative Helen Douglas Mankin (Dem.,

The attorney-general described the creed of the Columbians as an attempt to incite hatred against the Negro in the south, the Jews in big cities, Mexicans in the southwest and Orientals on the west coast.







# Morry Christmas

Christmas 1946

We shall soon hear again the bells and the carols, the greetings and the laughter.

This is a very happy season.

No other time or occasion has so great an effect upon the discipline and dispositions of men and women. There is something about it that touches human hearts as nothing else can. There is much evident kindness and goodwill. Men become brothers for a season in the name of the Holy Nativity.

The wonder of each Christmastime is, that its essential keynote is not grandeur but simplicity.

Christianity was born on a night so long ago in distant Bethlehem. The religion of the Christ Child has travelled far since then and along many roads. The very simplicities are significant to the wondrous story of the night when Christ was born, are still the unchanged essentials of our holy faith.

That first Christmas found a handful of faithful snepherds gathered at the manger in a lowly stable. With them, adoring, stood the Virgin Mother and Joseph the carpenter.

No crowds . . . No fanfare . . No proclamation.

In the generations which have followed, men have sought to praise their God by the many wonders of the works which they have wrought. Spacious churches of exquisite beauty and design; mighty organs, blending the ancient harmonies of music masters; magnificent bells, fashioned that their pealing might call the sons of men to worship; all these things bear witness to men's great gladness in the knowledge of their Lord. They help provide the "atmosphere" for the proper keeping of a modern Christmas.

Vested choirs and clergy in their robes of priestly office, with moving dignity and solemn ritual, lead the modern pilgrims along the Christian road that brings them to a newfound Bethlehem.

Bells . . Music . . Proclamations. It would sometimes seem that the old simplicities have been done away with but in very truth this is not so.

The vaulted naves of splendid churches take the place of the crumbling stable; marble Altars form the modern manger but simplicity remains and humility still triumphs amidst the glories which men have made for God. It is not in any of these things that the Presence of Christ is denoted but in the sacramental Bread.

BREAD . . . . We are zack again at the simplicities of the first Bethlehem. Bread is not only the staple food of man, it is his simple food. It can be found in the cupboard of the poorest home as well as upon the table of the richest man. It meets a universal need. It is thus, in the very simplicities of life that men find God. The story of the Birthday of Jesus Christ is again retold, when men receive Him under the simple veil of sacramental Bread.

This thought brings to our mind

a little poem.

"A Baby in a box of straw

Was all of God the Shepherds saw;
But they had heard the angels sing,

And so they worshipped Him as

King.

The Christ-Child comes to us instead Within a little house of Bread And as the shepherds worshipped, we Adore Him, in this mystery.



groes to earn a better living and, therefore, more effectively to support agencies for social uplift, is without the slightest doubt the next step. It will involve no opposition from white America because they do not believe we can accomplish it. They expect always to be able to crush, insult, ignore and exploit 12,-000,000 individual Negroes without intelligent organized opposition. This organization is going to involve deliberate propaganda for race pride. That is, it is going to start out by convincing American Negroes that there is no reason for their being ashamed of themselves; that their record is one which should make them proud; that their history in Africa and the world is a history of effort, success and trial, comparable with that of any other people.

Such measured statements can, and will be exaggerated. There will be those who will want to say that the black race is the first and greatest of races, that its accomplishments are most extraordinary, that its desert is most obvious and its mistakes negligible. This is the kind of talk we hear from people with the superiority complex among the white and the yellow race.

We cannot entirely escape it, since it is just as true, and just as false as such statements among other races; but we can use intelligence in modifying and restraining it. We can refuse deliberately to lie about our history, while at the same time taking just pride in Nefertari, Askia, Moshesh, Toussaint and Frederick Douglass, and testing and encouraging belief in our own ability by organized economic and social action.

There is no other way; let us not be deceived. American Negroes will be beaten into submission and degradation if they merely wait unorganized to find some place voluntarily given them in the new reconstruction of the economic world. They must themselves force their race into the new economic set-up and bring with them the millions of West Indians and Africans by peaceful organization for normative action or else drift into greater poverty, greater crime, greater helplessness until there is no resort but the last red alternative of revolt, revenge and war.
