A flicker of hope for a baby boy deformed by the drug thalidomide heartened parents of the child after consultation with a Toronto plastic surgeon here yesterday.

The armless, legless baby—one of several born in Ontario with deformed limbs to mothers who used thalidomide during pregnancy—will be examined again in two or three months when he is bigger and doctors can get a better idea of what can be done.

"I came out of the doctors office with more hope than when I went into it," said the father after the surgeon examined the infant for about an hour and a half.

The father did not elaborate. He said Dr. William K. Lindsay criticized him for giving interviews to the press and instructed him not to say any more to reporters.

Eartha Kitt Show Leaving For Kenya

London, Engl. (ANP)—American entertainer Eartha Kitt, here for night club and television engagements, announced jointly with Kenya Labor Minister Tom Mboya over the British Broadcasting Company's network recently that she will go to Nairobi to give performances to aid needy children there.

According to the announcement, the talented Miss Kitt will take her entire cabaret act, called "Talk of the Town" on the trip, in August. Arrangements are also being made to transport to Nairobi the stage equipment she uses in her London shows.

Miss Kitt's performances in Nairobi will aid a "Youth Helps Youth 'Corn Cob' campaign" for starving children. It is similar to other benefit performances which the famous singer has given in America and elsewhere.

The announcement came after Miss Kitt and Mboya lunched together at the Dorchester Hotel here recently. Mboya apparently recommended the project to Miss Kitt.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed that popular singer Cliff Richard has also agreed to go to Nairobi to aid in the Youth Campaign. He plans to take along "The Shadows" a group with whom he sings.

The 23-year-old father and his 19-year-old wife drove from their Chatham home with his parents yesterday to consult Dr. Lindsay. The baby, their first-born, has four fingers growing from each shoulder and feet growing from his hips. He was also born with a double hernia and is thought to be mentally retarded.

In Sarnia, where the child was born, it was estimated yesterday several thousand pills containing thalidomide (now banned from use in Canada and several other countries) were sold in a three month period in that area.

Arthur Hewig, Sarnia General Hospital administrator, said his pharmacy alone sold 1,000 of the pills.

In Toronto several officials urged the Federal Government to care for the 41 babies thus far born in Canada with

deformed limbs because of the drug.

Alderman Joseph Piccinini, Toronto Board of Health chairman, suggested the Government enact legislation to assist families that could go bankrupt trying to care for such children themselves.

Ward Markle, executive director of the Catholic Children's Aid Society, said that because the Government failed to exercise proper control of this drug it should be responsible for the care of these children.

Rabbi Abraham Feinberg, rabbi emeritus of Holy Blossom Temple, said: "The Federal Government must bear the blame for babies born as a result of the drug thalidomide."

Ontario Deputy Welfare Minister James Band said his department will investigate and report on one such case if it is of any help.

Dr. W. G. Brown, Ontario deputy health minister, said each case will be dealt with on individual merits until the extent of these births is established. He added such babies can be admitted to Ontario hospitals once they reach 5 or 6 years of age.

A cholesterol-retarding drug produced by the Wm. S. Merrell Co. of Cincinnati and removed after two years of use in the United States because of adverse effects was withdrawn in Canada last winter, Dr. C. A. Morrell, director of the Food and Drug Directorate, said in Ottawa yesterday.

A U.S. federal grand jury in Washington is investigating circumstances in the marketing of the drug. The case is understood to possibly involve Food and Drug Act violations.

London Minister Returns to Buxton

Rev. Ernest A. Richardson, pastor of Bethemanual Church since 1957 conducted his final service Sunday, July 22. He leaves next week to resume charge of the North Buxton charge in Kent County where he served from 1942 until 1947.

Both churches are of the British Methodist Episcopal Church. Mr. Richardson is vice-general superintendent of the church in Ontario.

While in London he was chaplain of the Y's Mens Club a service organization of the YM-YWCA, for five years.

He is a member of the board of directors of the Canadian branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

He graduated from the Toronto Bible College in 1922 and was made an elder in 1923. He has previously served in Toronto, the Owen Sound—Collingwood circuit, and Brantford.

Rev. C. R. Johnson, of London, now financial representative of the British Methodist Episcopal Church, will succeed Mr. Richardson at Bethemanual Church.

Tips on Summer Water Safety

These suggestions will make every day of swimming and boating a day free from tragedy.

When swimming, heed these rules:

1. Swim only where beaches are patrolled by lifeguards.
2. Don't forget that you have a responsibility for your toddlers, even at protected

beaches.

3. Never swim alone — you may not be able to save yourself.

4. When swimming a long distance, move parallel with the shore line.

5. Do not swim in or near diving areas.

6. If you are attacked by cramps while swimming,

float on your back. Stay calm and relax to ease the cramp. When possible gently massage the affected part.

7. Unless you are trained in lifesaving, do not attempt a swimming rescue. To help someone floundering near shore, extend a pole, oar, or beach towel. Lacking these hold on to something and extend your leg for a victim to grasp.

8. Before you dive, make sure water is deep enough and has no hidden objects.

9. Avoid long exposure to chilly water, hot sun and cold air. Enter cold water gradually.

10. Stay out of water for one hour after eating.

Dordek recommended following these tips for accident-

free boating:

1. Enter the boat at the side while it is firmly secured against the dock.

2. Do not overload the boat. One passenger per seat is preferred in row boats. Desired seating capacity varies with size in motor boats.

3. Wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket unless you are an expert swimmer.

4. Never stand up in a boat. It may capsize, sending you to the bottom.

5. Stay with a boat if it capsizes, as most boats will not sink.

6. When a canoe develops a leak, stay in it. The canoe will go a few inches below the surface when filled with water, and is capable of supporting six people.

7. Obey all channel markings and boating "rules of the road."

8. Return to shore immedi-

ately when a storm approaches.

9. Have a plan firmly in mind to meet common emergencies which may rise far from shore.

10. Stay away from areas where people are swimming

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Says God Needed To Solve Problem

"Chicago is a racial tinder-box", Evangelist Billy Graham told 33,500 persons as he opened his famed Crusade for Christ in McCormick place.

Admitting that the problem cannot be legislated away, he declared that the answer lies at the foot of the cross and in people's love for God.

At the same time that there is a rising tide of greed, lust, hatred, prejudice and war there has never been a time when there was more humanitarian effort, more good will and more interest in religion and social justice than there is today, the Evangelist commented.

"With a new nature and a new heart which God gives, there can be a new attitude toward the race problem, marital difficulties, poverty and all the great social and moral problems faced by the human race."

After being told that here in Chicago there are thousands who are trying to escape realities of life through alcohol, barbiturates, amusements materialism and even suicide, some 532 persons in the audience Wednesday, stepped forward to make "decisions for Christ."

Graham's invitation to "repent, and by faith receive Christ," was made as he finished a 50 minute sermon.

Services will continue nightly through June 16 and conclude June 17 in Soldier Field.

In regard to the matter of race, Dr. Graham on his arrival in Chicago on the same plane as Dr. Martin Luther King, famed integrationist leader, pointed out that his crusades "were racially integrated before the Supreme Courts school desegregation decision of 1954."

He added, "Dr. King told me several times that our stand on desegregation had helped him immensely in his work."

Dr. King, who liked Dr. Graham came to the city from Miami, that evening addressed a civic group in the Sheraton-Blackstone. He urged Negroes to prepare themselves to meet the challenge of the oncoming times.

Dr. King also held a confab with ministers of all denominations during which a huge fall rally was planned here.

In his sermon, Dr. Graham stated that the most final and serious welfare being fought today is not in Laos, Algeria, or at the Berlin Wall, but in the realm of the spirit.

"Our only weapons are spiritual. Jesus said, 'Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free.' Graham said.

"While wandering around a native village," he droned on, "I spotted a leopard."

"Don't be silly," commented a bored listener. "They grow that way."

City Hall Prayer Protest Leads To Several Arrests

Albany, Ga., July 27—Rev. Martin Luther King, 26 other Negroes and one white were arrested and jailed today during two prayer protests in front of the city hall. The group included most of the principal leaders of the anti-segregation campaign that has brought a lengthy racial crisis to this commercial and military centre in Southwestern Georgia.

Seven demonstrators who refused to get off their knees were picked up and dumped into stretchers by policemen and carried into jail.

Mayor Asa D. Kelley said he had informed the Justice Department by telephone of Dr. King's arrest. He said he felt the internationally known Negro leader was safer in prison than on the streets.

Negroes reacted angrily to the arrests. Law-enforcement officials awaited with concern the outcome of a mass meeting tonight at Shiloh and Mount Zion Baptist churches by the Albany Movement.

For the first time in the controversy, which flared up last December in a series of mass marches on the city hall, substantial numbers of whites seemed aroused.

More than 160 city policemen, state highway patrolmen, revenue officers and sheriff's deputies stood by on the alert. Governor S. Ernest Vandiver has said repeatedly that he would call out the National Guard if needed.

The demonstration followed another futile attempt yesterday by Dr. King, who is president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, to ar-

range a negotiating session with city commissioners.

The Atlanta minister, four men and five women arrived at the city hall in a station wagon and a sedan at 2.15 p.m. They lined up before Police Chief Laurie Pritchett and told him they wanted to see the commissioners.

Chief Pritchett replied that neither Mayor Kelley nor the commissioners were in the city hall.

"I'm asking you to leave and go about your business," he added.

The chief again asked them to leave and said that if they did not they would be arrested.

"We'll just pray until they see fit to see us," said Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy, treasurer of the leadership conference and pastor of West Hunter Street Baptist Church in Atlanta.

Mr. Abernathy assisted Dr. King in leading the 1955-56 Montgomery, Ala., bus boycott and went to jail with him in December, 1961, and again two weeks ago.

"You're creating a disturbance, as you can see," said Chief Pritchett, nodding in the direction of a handful of whites on the sidewalk nearby and at others and slowly passing automobiles. "Move on."

At this point, Dr. King said "Dr. Abernathy, would you lead us in prayer."

The demonstrators, who included Slater King, first vice-president of the Albany Movement but not a relative of the

minister, bowed their heads while Mr. Abernathy asked that the city and its officials be blessed.

When Mr. Abernathy had completed the prayer, Chief Pritchett said: "All right, you've had your prayer; you've made your point; now move on or you're under arrest."

The demonstrators stood fast.

Chief Pritchett then ordered his men to lead them into the city hall and then jail at the rear. They were held in lieu of \$200 cash bonds on charges of disorderly conduct congregating on the sidewalk and disobeying the commands of an officer.

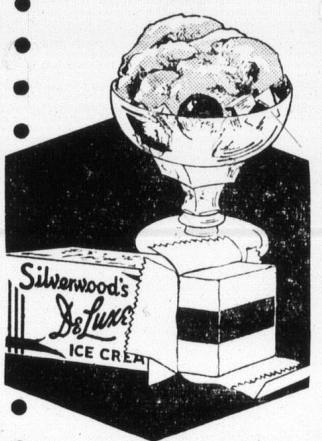
