NAACP HEAD CALLS CIVIL RIGHTS NO LONGER A

NORTH-SOUTH FIGHT Chattanooga, March 23 - "The ight for Negro rights is no longer a North-South fight," stated Roy Wilkins, acting secretary of the Nation al Association for the Advancement of Colored People, in an address before the closing mass meeting of the Southeast Regional NAACP Conference, held here last week-end. "It s a fight of decent people every where, white and black, for a decent democratic America."

"The South will never reach its maximum economic potential as long as one-third of its population is restricted to the lowest-paid, most meniail employment" Mr. Wilkins said. Declaring that the FEPC idea is "being driven home," the NAACP official asserted, "An FEPC bill is not a social equality bill, but a bill to give all men a fair chance to get employment and promotions according to ability. FEPC will not take jobs from whites and give them to Vegroes."

Emphasizing the fact that the campaign for full citizenship in the South "is being aided by many white Southerners—church women, college students and faculties, and workers in organized labor unions," Mr. Wilkins stated that "the NAACP is not at war with the South" but rather with the inherent idea of white supremacy. He pointed out that this idea of white supremacy, as expressed "in the denial of equal education. denial of the right to vote freely, and denial of equal employment opportunities," is fought by the NAACF wherever it manifests itself.

Other members of the national office staff who addressed the conference were: Gloster B. Current, director of branches; Miss Lucille Black membership secretary; Franklin H. Williams, assistant special counsel; and daniel E. Byrd and Miss Leah Brock, assistant field secretaries.

ATLANTA U. — THE LATE EDITOR'S ALMA MATER



STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT NEGROES

ATLANTA, Ga. - Georgia Tech students attending the regular meeting of the Wesley Foundation on the campus were told this week by president Rufus E. Clement of Atlanta University that the most serious question in western civilization to day is the race question, and that racial segregation is our nation's biggest sin.

According to the speaker, educators are far ahead of ministers and churchmen in the field of race relations.

The Negro's attitude toward the white man, President Clement described in responding to a question, varies from intense and bitter hatred to a sympathetic understanding of those people who feel that they need to have somebody to look down on in order to assuage a deep sense of insecurity.



Can Human Nature Be Changed?

By REV. W. A. CAMERON

The digerence between the daily paper and the Bible comes very often to this, that the daily paper reveals to you that the rest of mankind are desperately wicked and given to sin, and the Bible says: "Yes, and you are another!" Perhaps that is why some of you prefer to read the newspaper to the Bible.

Well, "The world is very evil, The times are waxing latethey always have been since mankind could write. T. R. Glover tells us that the oldest of all Egyptian manuscript contains a lament about the degeneracy of "these modern times. N was written about four thousand years ago. You go back to the old Egyptian and the times are always very evil and degenerate. You read vesterday's paper and are soon convinced that the times are still evil and degenerate. What is the matter with mankind? Why is it that things go so wrong? Is there a remedy?

The Bible answers by referring to man's sin and God's salvation. Christian people know there is a power which can raise the fallen, which is stronger than the strongest tendency of human nature. The masters of literature know it, and will give you examples. The elder brother in the parable of the lost son is a type of those people who have lived very narrow, unobservant lives. He evidently expected that the brother who had come home after wasting his money in loose living was the same man now as in the ays of riotous conduct. If he had another fortune to use, he'd squander it. He does not allow for any conviction of sin, any healthy shame, any real repentance. It oes not occur to him that God may have done a wonderful work in the far country. When we turn to the Bible, the evidence is strong. It is almost a commonplace there that men may be radically changed in character. And in our deeper moments we know that this is our fundamental need. There will have to be new instincts, new impulses, new motives. People talk of "turning over a new Yes, but "carried forward." Are there bankruptcy laws in the spiritual life? Can you pay so much on the dollar and be clear? I do not think so. You can turn over a new leaf the first day of the year but you are the same man who went to bed December 31. No, it has to be done



ENDS AND MEANS

THE HERALD, Montreal - The motive behind British banishment of Chief Suretse from his home and tribe is obviously maintenance of peace in Bechuanaland. A minority of Suretse's subjects, led by his malcontent uncle, resent the enthroning of a white queen and there is possibility that birth of a halfcast heir may heat resentment to viol-

Maintaining eace there is clearly Britain's duty, Bechuanaland having been a protectorate under her care since 1885. But in this instance, we are far from sure that the end justifies the means

Neither are we sure that another end, pleasing the Jim-Crow-minded government of the Union of South Africa, justifies any means. time that that government was made to understand that Britain has no sympathy for the totalitarian aspirations of its race-rabid leaders.

It is the means that chiefly cause us to question the handling of Chief Suretse's case, however. Here is a young African ruler maintaining his right to marry the woman of his choice, and supported in that stand by the majority of his subjects.

The British government allegedly entices him back to London, then orders him to stay out of his kingdom and get his wife out before her baby is born. Offer of a snug annual income if Suretse will settle down among the fleshpots of London scarcely puts a better aspect on the
