The demonstration, of the same character as that of the previous Sunday, was again organized by the "Hands off Abyssinia" committee, but who on this occasion had obtained the necesary permit which was granted on the condition that they did not go in the vicinity of the Italian legation.







Missionary Gives Views

Asserts Ethiopia Can do More for Herself than Italy can

Atlanta, Georgia, November 25 -Italy cannot give Ethiopia a half of what that nation plans to give to itself in the way of a more civilized life and the advantages of Christian eduation and well-ordered government, Reverend George W. Rhoads, for the past five years a missionary in Ethiopia with the Inland African Mission, told the students of Spelman and Morehouse Colleges today. The speaker, a close friend of Emperor Haile Selassie, whom he described as "a man of God and leader of men," told of the many mprovements the Emperor had made during his short reign, including the establishment of a constitutional government, abolition of serfdom by which men weher bound to the land, and establishment of a system of land tenure whereby men might profit by the fruit of their labor. He expressed the conviction that Ethiopia would not be defeated in the present con-

The message of the Emperor which was recently broadcasts to the world but which was distorted in translation in to English expressed completly the faith of the Emperor and his people in the righteousness of their cause. Mr. Rhoads freely translated the Emperor's statement of Ethiopia to remain free as follows: "As freemen we were born, as freemen we have lived, as freemen we will die." We have never known servitude to man, we know only servitude to God. The yoke of service to Jesus Christ we have gladly borne. That yoke we will gladly contine to bear. All other yokes we refuse, as God is our

"Ethiopia has had a place in history for the last 7,000 years," Mr. Rhoads declared. "There were kings reigning in that country before the Roman Empire was founded. These people had a written language before the people of Europe were able to read the Bible in their own tongue. This country of which so much that is iniquitous and untrue is being written today is winning a place in the modern world, and will continue to play a tremendous part in world affairs until the end of time."

The visitor, who is serving as director of the Gospel Furthering Fellowship, is returning to Africa in January with a party of eight missionaries whom he has recruited.

Major Bowes Gets Protest

Discrimination Charged in Case of Florida Girl

NEW YORK-Vigorous protest was made by the NAACP to Major Bowes, of the famous Major Bowes' Original Amateur Hour, and to the Chase and Sanborn Company, at the barring of Miss Otis Holley, colored soprano, who was denied opportunity to go on tour by Major Bowes because of her color. The New York World Telegram quotes Major Bowes as stating: "This is an unpleasant situation, but hotels would refuse to receive her, there would be trouble at restaurants and difficulties on Pullman cars One colored girl we sent out gave up and came home."

The Protest

The NAACP in writing Major Bowes praised him for his previous "freedom from petty racial prejudice and your fine attitude toward such Negro singers as Edward Matthews and Paul Robeson." Major Bowes was informed that it did not question his motives but instead questioned and challenged his eimidity in facing race prejudice. Pointing out that Negro artists in the theatre and on the concert platform do travel in all parts of America, and though they do meet discrimination in hotels, restaurants and other places manage to survive. Major Bowes is asked not only to give Miss Holley the opportunity to trafel with the other amateur hour winners to correct an injustice to Miss Holley, but in order that he may not "destroy or mar the esteem in which many Negroes and white people hold you, nor to alienate many Negro users of the products of Chase and Sanborn Company.

The Major's Reply

Major Bowes replied to the Association's protest by stating that its See letter was "based upon complete misinformation,"thus implying that the World Telegram was not speaking \$1000 a minute truthfully. Major Bowes asserted that e had several Negroes in the travel ling amateur troops and that he never dischiminated race, creed or color. He stated, also that many Negroes appear on his amateur programs and that he has received many letters of thanks from colored people and from Negro newspapers. However he did not sate anything about Miss Holley or explain why she had not been sent out with one of the travelling troops.




